## AAA DEVISES NEW POTATO PROGRAM

### Division of Surplus and Marketing Agreement Feature Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—A double-barreled program, intended to increase the price of the 1938 potato crop, was announced today by the AAA.

Included in the plan was a proposal for diverting surplus potatoes into live stock feed, four starch or alcohol, aided by a government subsidy. Another section projected a marketing agreement to cover Colorado, Idaho, Nebraska and Wyoming.

Coincidentally, the AAA administration scheduled a series of public hearings throughout the western states to discuss the proposed marketing agreement and the effort to divert part of the present crop.

**Diversion Plan**  
The division plan would work as follows: The AAA would make payments to growers for diverting potatoes. The payments to equal 25 cents for each 100 pounds of potatoes turned from the usual market channels. At the outset, payments would be limited to 10 percent of this year's crop but this proportion might be increased later. Payments would be made on potatoes which meet or exceed the specification for U. S. commercial or U. S. No. 2. Payments would not be made on culls or other low grade potatoes.

The proposed marketing agreement would provide for control of interstate shipments from states involved. Should prices continue at low levels despite the regulation the AAA would take steps to control the high grades of potatoes could be regulated through proration. State-graded seed potatoes would be exempt.

**Secretary Rules**  
If the marketing agreement should be signed by 50 per cent of the handlers in the area affected, and approved by two-thirds of the producers in the area, the AAA said Secretary Wallace might issue an order making the provisions of the agreement binding upon all handlers within the area. The agreement terminating June 30, 1938, would be administered locally by handler and producer committees.

Formal hearings on the proposed marketing agreement only have been scheduled at Denver, Colorado, October 24; Scottsbluff, Neb., October 26; Idaho Falls, Ida., October 26, and Twin Falls, Ida., October 31. Three hearings will be supplementary to informal discussions to be held next week at Grand Rapids, Mich., October 21, St. Paul, Minn., October 22, Pocatello, Ida., October 24, Denver, Colorado 25 and Kansas City, October 25.

**Partly Out of Reach**  
J. B. Hutson, director of the potato division, said "The amount of the current marketing season potatoes have been selling at less than half their fair exchange value. It is doubtful whether any action can be taken which will raise the price of the 1938 crop of potatoes to parity. We would feel, however, that our efforts had been worthwhile if our efforts had been maintained at three-fourths of parity or around that level."

A substantial rise in the price to the grower of potatoes probably would cause the consumer to pay little more than he is paying at present.

The program is a part of a general plan designed to stabilize the price of potatoes over a period of several seasons. "If we succeed, the consumer will be benefited instead of being injured."

The AAA said the parity price

for potatoes at present is 80.8 cents per bushel. The average price received by growers last year was said to be \$1.7 cents and the price this year prior to October 1 averaged about 11.5 cents below the corresponding period for last season.

The AAA said the diversion plan would be operative in surplus regions when the market was flooded and that an increase of high grade potatoes to between one half and three-fourths of parity is expected to automatically result in cessation of diversion.

It was emphasized that the plan to increase the price of this year's crop had no specific connection with the tax control plan to become effective December 1.

On grounds of alleged desertion dating from September, 1933, George Lancaster sued for divorce from Elaine Lancaster whom he married in Lancaster, New Mexico, March 10, 1922. There are no children, and no community property is involved. Harold L. Yeamans of Boise is his attorney.

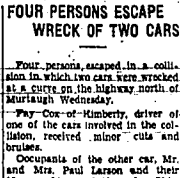
## FOUR PERSONS ESCAPE WRECK OF TWO CARS

SAFETY WITH FIREARMS

As long as firearms still remain in use accidents are bound to occur but it does seem rather ridiculous that so large a percentage of our population who use guns are unwilling to observe the few simple rules which spell the difference between safety and the constant likelihood of accident.

No man should take a loaded gun into an automobile. He may do so a hundred times without accident but always the occasion will arise when the gun will be discharged. Sometimes the careless one alone suffers, at other times a friend pays the penalty.

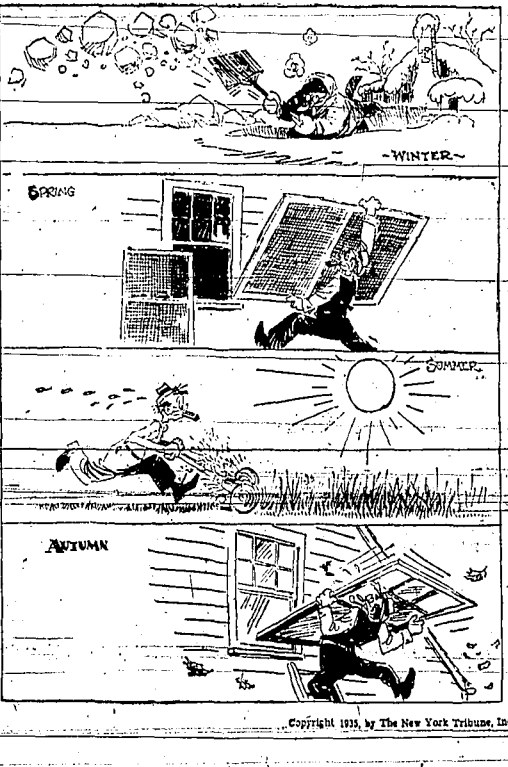

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**RUM LAW DEFENSE COSTS STATE \$2500**  
Weiser Legislator, and Pocatello Lawyer Collect Fees

**BOISE, Oct. 17 (AP)—**State Senator George Donatz of Weiser and Ben W. Davis, Pocatello attorney, received \$2,500 for defending the state liquor control act in the fifth district court at Pocatello a few weeks ago, records at the state auditor's office showed today.

Senator Donatz was one of the authors of the law and Mr. Davis is a prominent Pocatello lawyer. Both are Democrats.

They were the principal attorneys in the case; Frank Meek, the liquor commission attorney, was in the case as well as the state attorney active part in the defense at Pocatello.

Action was instituted by Attorney General Bert H. Miller to test the constitutionality of the law, and the court in substance held the act constitutional but found certain phases of it defective.

Donatz and Davis were employed by the liquor commission, which is composed of Robert Coulter, chairman, M. B. Veaman and Homer Moore.

The general voucher was approved by Mr. Coulter and was passed upon by the state board of examiners, during the absence of Mr. Miller, a member of the board, while he was away in Moscow on legal business last week.

The voucher bore the signatures of Governor Hoos and Secretary of State Frank Clark.

It was paid by warrant No. 10079 Oct. 15, 1935, clerical records at the office of Mr. Myrtle P. Ewing, state treasurer, showed.

Asked if the fee was large for such services, the attorney general smiled and said:

The board of examiners was at first opposed to granting the claim of the attorney general's office for expenses of \$11,612 that this office incurred in testing the law in the Pocatello court.

He recalled that Senator Donatz assisted in drafting the liquor law that was under attack.

Mr. Davis was the city attorney of Pocatello when Governor Hoos was mayor of that city.

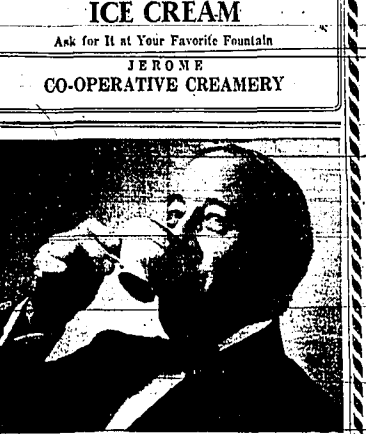

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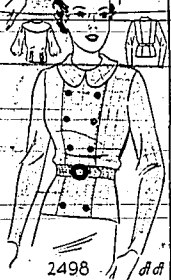

### COMMODITY PRICES AT FIVE-YEAR-HIGH

#### World Wheat Situation Responsible for Rise in Grain Values

**NEW YORK, Oct. 17**—Commodity prices, influenced strongly by expanding demand, are now at the highest around the best level since late in 1920.

Although restricted supply in many cases has forced higher prices, trade authorities believe a revival of demand is becoming an increasingly important factor in the current rise. In a few lines, such as copper and lead, recovery opportunities have been a factor.

The Associated Press daily index of 20 major raw commodities closed today at 78.05, well above the year ago level of 76.14 touched June 23 and nearly at the peak of 79.54 attained October 9.

Grains have led the upward movement. Since June 1, the average price of wheat has risen 74 per cent and the average of current values of 92 per cent.

"The rise in grain prices" it is reported by Standard Statistics company, "is traceable largely to prospects for improvement in the world wheat situation.

**Result of Drouth**

"The production of wheat in all producing countries this year represents the smallest harvest in 13 years, the result of drouth in most countries and black rust damage in North America."

The influence of restricted supplies in that section also has exerted heavy pressure in most crops, for example, were quoted at 43.60 hundredweight in Chicago June 25 and "top of the year" at 41.00, and today they sell for 51 1/2 hundredweight.

Coincident with the rise in most prices, hides currently are at the best level of the year which represent a rise of 50 to 65 per cent over the low point in 1933.

As an indication of the condition of the United States department of agriculture reported that as of October 1, the stocks of meat in cold storage declined to the smallest total on record.

As the price of expanding demand causing price increases—copper is cited by trade authorities—prices have held at 92.25 a pound for domestic copper for the best part of two weeks as a result of sustained demand from consumers who have been buying the metal steadily since it touched a low of 8 cents after the W.R.A. copper code was abandoned. The current price is the best in more than four years.

# FHA ORGANIZATION EMPHASIZES SPEED

## Idaho Executives of Federal Lending Agency Attend Local Conference

Emphasizing a new step to speed action on applications for FHA loans, and promulgating a definite decision on each application within 10 days after it is received at the Boise office, executives of the Federal Housing Administration in Idaho addressed a conference in Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce rooms last evening that was attended by more than 50 representative bankers, realtors, building materials dealers and other interested persons from towns throughout the south central Idaho district. The meeting was the first of a series of similar conferences to be held throughout the district.

### Plans to Record

FHA executives and field workers will remain in Twin Falls today, and will be at chamber of commerce rooms after 9 a. m. in conference with respective bankers and other persons interested in the FHA program, it was announced.

Harry Whitmer, Idaho FHA director, pointed to FHA loans totaling approximately \$123,000 authorized in Twin Falls during the past year, and outlined a program of FHA expansion for the coming year, to provide for re-financing of existing mortgages, modernizing of homes, building of new homes and purchase of home conveniences.

He referred to assurances of cooperation that financial institutions have given to FHA, stating that many questions that arose in earlier history of the new lending agency have been clarified. He also spoke also of the organization of state FHA headquarters, emphasizing its facilitation action on applications for loans.

Other speakers included Colonel F. C. Hummel of Boise, chief underwriter, and Richard Williamson, chief mortgage examiner.

## Building Requirements

Colonel Hummel discussed building requirements, stressing the importance of the standpoint of the welfare of home owners and safeguarding of their investment.

He stated that the FHA is to examine applications for loans to guard against faulty construction. The total of 25 camps will include four companies from Idaho, one from Oregon, two from California, Kentucky, West Virginia, Ohio, New York and New Jersey.

### ATTORNEYS' HELP PLEDGED IN TESTS

Liberty League Group Offers Free Defense of Constitutional Rights

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—A free defense of the constitutional rights of any citizen unable to pay legal fees was offered last night by a lawyer spokesman of the American Liberty league.

James H. Beck, former United States solicitor general and member of congress, told a radio audience: "We must defend the papers and interests of the new deal who are audaciously undermining the very foundations of the constitution."

Beck's address emphasized objections on the attempt by new deal spokesmen to curtail freedom of speech as exercised by the national lawyers committee of the American Liberty league.

He said of this committee of 99 prominent attorneys: "They have expressed and will continue to express their judgments from time to time as to the validity of legislation, and if when any American citizen, however humble, is without means to defend his constitutional rights in a court of justice, one or more of these lawyers will, without any compensation from the source, defend the rights of the individual, and in this way carry out, in the most effective way, their oath to support, maintain and defend the constitution."

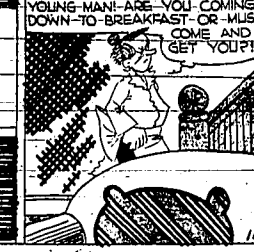

## INVITATIONS ISSUE FOR POTATO PARLEY

**Limited Group to Discuss Price-Raising Long-Term Program**

BOISE, Oct. 17 (AP)—E. R. Benson, university agricultural economist, announced tonight that a meeting will be held in Pocatello October 20 to discuss proposals for raising the price of the potato crop and for consideration of the long-term potato program.

Representatives from Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California and possibly Montana are expected to attend, he said.

"The place and time of the meeting has been set by the director of the potato section of the agricultural adjustment administration, who will also attend," said J. B. Nutson, chief of the potato, tobacco and peanut division of the AAA, and C. Thompson, executive in charge of the educational program on potatoes, all set of Washington, D. C.

Those who attend the meeting will come by invitation and they will include representative growers and shippers, leaders of farm organizations, representatives of the state department of agriculture and the university extension service.

"This is not a hearing for the general public," he emphasized.

"Hearing dates have been definitely set but tentative dates are announced at Washington, D. C., on October 28 and 29 at Idaho Falls and October 31 and November 1 at Twin Falls."

"In addition, we have hopes that a meeting will be held in Caldwell for southwestern Idaho growers."

"We are not yet in possession of a response to our suggestion."

Benson said speakers going into details of the meeting, but details are to be mailed out to farmers immediately.
