DICTATORSHIP?

A fundamental change in the duties of Congress has undoubtedly been brought about as a result of the Roosevelt policy of demanding the enactment of laws prepared under his own direction, without material amendment and for the most part without too much in the way of debate.

Thus at Salt Lake City Senator Carey of Wyoming declares that Congress has been deprived of its Constitutional privilege of making laws and instead has become a mere rubber stamp for the administration.

Whether we like it or not the point referred to must continue to grow in importance and the day will probably come when the people of the United States will have to stand up and be counted on this question of adherence or non-adherence to the Constitution of the United States.

It may be that the Constitution is amended and should be altered to meet changing conditions. If this is the case only the people have a right to order such a change.

As to bureaucracy, the Constitution provides no place for it. It has proved a menace to free government and personal liberty in every country where it has gained a foothold.

EARTHQUAKES

Earthquakes at various points are reported with increasing frequency but up to now the Intermountain country appears to have escaped this type of visitation.

There is no more terrifying form of earth-ly disturbance than the earthquake. Unlike the electrical storm or the tornado there is generally not the slightest warning.

The extent of the area affected by the disturbance is unusual. Towns and cities as far away as Spokane, Lovington and Boise felt the shocks, in some cases to an extent which drove residents of apartment houses into the streets and emptied theatres.

There is no known means of protection against the earthquake. In warmer countries known to be subject to such disturbances the use of a light, yielding rather than rigid form of construction has been found to be most resistant to shocks but the advantage is small as buildings so built are less fire resistant than others and what the quake leaves the flames are apt to devour.

There will be much of sympathy for the unfortunate residents of Helena.

UNUSUAL

The State Liquor Commission has an attorney who is paid a salary of two hundred fifty dollars a month. But when it was necessary to go into court and defend an action brought by the State Attorney General's office to declare the act creating the Commission unconstitutional two other attorneys were employed and, incidentally, paid a fee of two thousand five hundred dollars.

The procedure seems a little unusual but probably there was a reason. "There is however another point of equal interest. George Donart of Walseo, one of the attorneys who shared the two thousand five hundred dollar fee, was a member of the Legislature which created the Liquor Commission and one of the chief supporters and sponsors of the act. There is room for question as to whether, under the law, he is legally entitled to accept a fee for his services.

THE SUBSISTENCE OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Says Mr. Roosevelt: "On the whole, economic conditions were decidedly better for the fiscal year just closed than in the preceding year and, of course, vastly better than in 1933 and still better." But as business is concerned that is absolutely correct. Business has improved, in spite of the opposition of many business leaders to the recovery program.

These figures differ because each group has a different definition of what constitutes an unemployed person. Yet each set of figures shows the same trend. During the past two years unemployment has actually increased.

And small we have given the problem of unemployment; until we have met the challenge for a redistribution of purchasing power; until recovery has benefited the consumer in the same proportion it has benefited the producer—we cannot begin talking about victory and resting on our oars.

INTOLERANCE AND DICTATORSHIP

There has naturally been considerable indignation in the United States over developments reported from Germany having to do with racial and religious differences. The situation brings to mind the fact that in a dictatorship, whether it be communist or otherwise, freedom of the press and religious liberty soon go by the boards.

Nearly everyone is young enough to remember what happened in Russia when the red dictators got control. Not only were certain religious centers abolished, but religion itself has practically been wiped out.

In Italy, when Mussolini created a fascist state, the same thing happened. Freedom of the press was the curtailment of religious freedom by the government. Freedom of the press has long since gone.

The lessons for America are not hard to find. We may become indignant, but we cannot, of course, interfere with the internal affairs of another country. That is the business of the people of that country, although we can always hope that they proceed in an altogether different and wiser manner.

But the affairs of the United States are the business of our people. It is no accident that the rise of dictatorship is always accompanied by the abolition of the press and by the curtailment of religious freedom.

There has been a tendency in the United States toward a centralizing of power in Washington. This can only mean greater bureaucracy, and less liberty. No matter how good and kind we may think our present rulers to be, the very moment our government evolves from constitutional control into a dictatorship we may expect at least the destruction of freedom of the press and the ending of religious freedom.

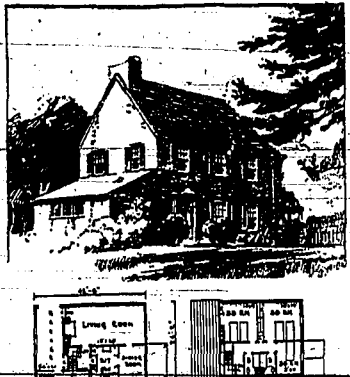

Hitler Outlines Marriage Rules To Protect Blood

Der reichsleiter forbade under penalty of a jail sentence, marriage under these conditions:

1. When either party is afflicted with a contagious disease which might impair the health of an offspring.

2. When either party is incapable of managing his or her own affairs or is under a guardian.

3. When either party is suffering from nervous or other ailments which are considered against the interests of the community.

When either is suffering from an inherited disease, excepting, however, when the proposed mate is afflicted with the same.

Couples must obtain a certificate of health from the public health office before marriage if possible and falsification of a certificate is subject to a jail sentence and nullification of the marriage.

All marriages contracted in foreign countries against the new law are also held invalid.

Hunting of Migratory Birds Opens in 28 Northern States For 30-Day Season; Shooting From 7 A. M. to 4 P. M.

With the duck hunting season scheduled to open at 7 o'clock Monday morning, sportsmen throughout the northern part of the United States are set to spend today in getting artillery and ammunition in readiness for the kill. The open season on migratory waterfowl—ducks, geese, jackknives, brant and coot—will extend for 30 days, beginning October 21 and including November 19.

Game warden, last night warned hunters to heed federal regulation which provides that shooting be permitted from 7 a. m. to 4 p. m. daily during the open season.

The 30-day season starting Monday is open uniformly in 28 states in the northern zone: Idaho, Colorado, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Wisconsin, Washington, and Wyoming.

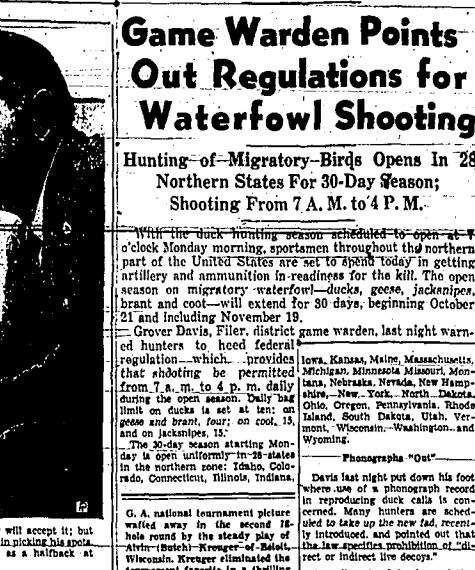

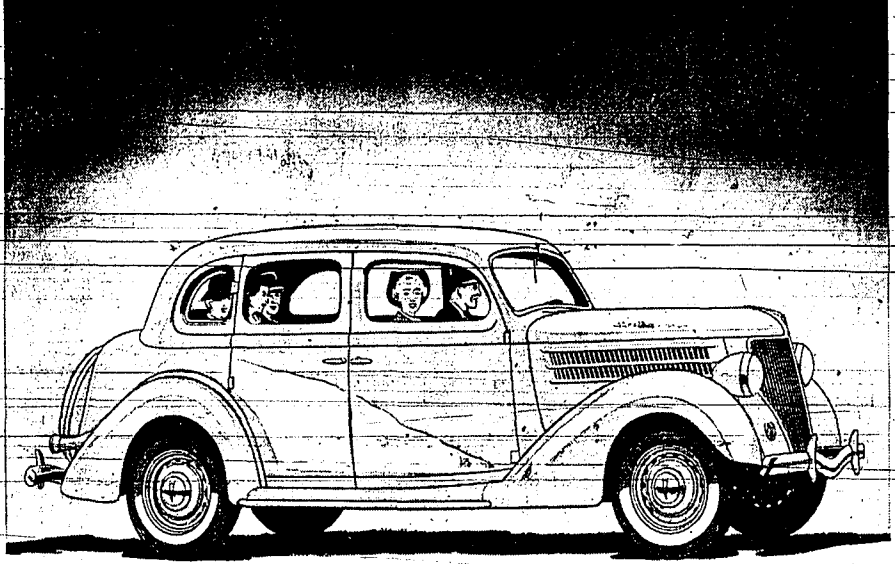
