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NEW HAVEN ROAD TAKES BANKRUPTCY

Billion Dollar Railway in Line for Reorganization After Depression

NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (AP)—The new billion dollar New York, New Haven and Hartford railway, serving one of the most densely populated areas in the United States, today sought reorganization under the federal bankruptcy laws.

This railway system, with its 3,000-mile network of lines blanketing southern New England from Boston and Providence west and south-west to the Hudson river and New York City, thus became the only major eastern road to plead for liquidation as result of the depression.

Impretable pronounced economic depression in the territory served since recovery set in, the road found the huge burden of debt incurred to carry it through the leanest year, together with mounting costs and rates, made reorganization unavoidable.

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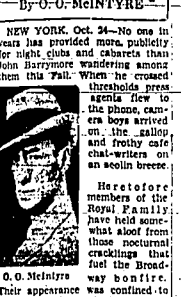

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BORAH ENDORSED FOR PRESIDENCY

Idahoan's Suggested Candidacy Meets With Wide Favor

BOISE, Oct. 23 (AP) — Sam Griffitt, Boise lawyer and leader of the Borah-for-President club, announced today that he has received scores of letters from 10 states in which persons from various walks have endorsed the veteran Idaho senator for the presidency.

Some of the letters are from Democrats and others from Republicans, Griffitt said.

Mr. Borah has been frequently mentioned as a potential candidate for the Republican nomination in 1938, but he has declined to hint what he intends to do.

Griffitt today went through correspondence he has received and from it lifted extracts from the letters. Men and women have written about Mr. Borah in the past few weeks.

"These extracts are typical of the contents of many of the letters sent to me," Griffitt commented.

Woman's Endorsement

He said he would not publish the names of the women unless he was requested to do so later.

"I feel Mr. Borah has the heart to do right and understands what our country needs more than any man we can have."

A La Juvana, Colo., teacher wrote: "I have told our local Democratic club that I intend to vote for Borah at the nomination for president, politics would have no influence on my vote."

From a Casper, Wyo., woman came: "In my estimation Mr. Borah is the only President we need and elect for president in 1938."

A California Democrat wrote: "We want Mr. Borah. He can defeat the socialist bunch now holding the Washington government."

A St. Louis, Mo., insurance man wrote: "I have been working for Senator Borah as my ideal of an honest and robust chief executive of this nation."

A Washington, D. C., lawyer: "I have been conferring with a good many leaders here and find they look upon Senator Borah very favorably."

Delegation President: "A Borah-for-President club in Washington. We have been meeting with tremendous success here. I am quite confident that we will win certain of our instructed delegation for Borah from this state."

A Minneapolis lawyer: "I have decided that Senator Borah is about the only Republican having a fair chance to win in the next election."

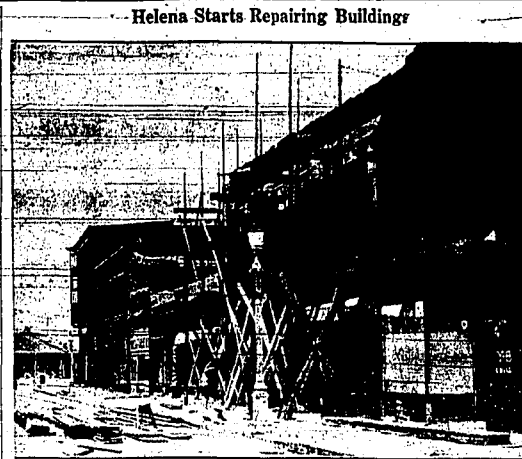
A. J. Peavey Retained as Chairman for Coming Year

HOOVER'S ATTACK WIDELY ACCLAIMED

1000 Letters Daily 99 Per Cent Commendatory of Stand

PAISO ALTO, Cal., Oct. 23 (AP)—An avalanche of mail and telegrams awaiting former President Herbert Hoover on his return from the Atlantic seaboard "assault" on the communitarianism of his recent attack on the fiscal policies of the New Deal, Paul Dixon, Hoover's secretary, disclosed today.

Buzzing mail pages and telegrams and telephone calls by the score, Dixon said, overwhelmingly praise the Oakland address as a declaration of Republican principles.

Tens of thousands of letters have come to San Juan Hill in the years since Hoover retired from the presidency. "I have never received, since I left office, so many letters as I have received since I returned," Dixon said, in the week following the speech in the Junior Republic camps of the seven Western states. For seven or eight days the average was approximately 1000 letters a day. Dixon said that the letters were classified as critical or unfriendly and ran a trifle less than one per cent of the total received.

Brand New Bloom

Almost all carried the signatures of the writers but there was one "message" merely signed "an old fashioned Republican" which was perhaps the most distinctive. It was a brand new bloom. Written on the address tag was "return" postage guaranteed if not adopted.

The Hoover code calls for acknowledging virtually every letter received and the personal signing of each. With only one paid letter and a part-time stenographer on his regular force, the Hoover household which almost invariably follow a public appearance or publication of an interview or article become a problem.

Uncle Sam does not give his ex-presidents any franking privilege or other compensation. A former president pays the same price for his name as the ordinary citizen.

Mr. Hoover's income, estimated virtually, it is said, to what he earns as a mining engineer, is declared to be a very modest sum. Hoover does not admit of the employment of a large secretarial force. The regular force is usually supplemented by calls upon the Stanford placement bureau and the student stenographers thus supplied are paid on an hourly basis.

A number of friends, some of them associates of Mr. Hoover dating back to before his return to the public life, have formed a voluntary secretarial corps to aid him during peak periods of correspondence.

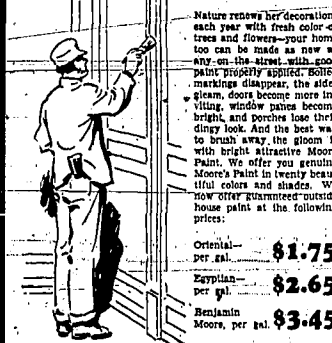

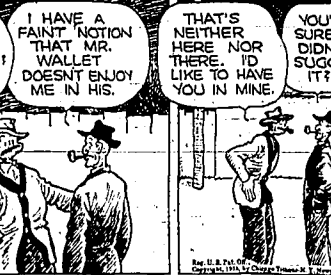

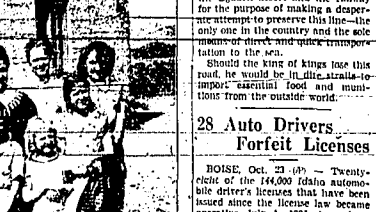
