# TUGWELL PROMISES BALANCED BUDGET

## Calculations Show Can Meet Expenditures With Income in 1938

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28 (AP)—Addressing a Democratic meeting tonight, R. G. Tugwell, under-secretary of agriculture, said his calculations showed the administration could satisfy every humanitarian demand and come to a balance of the national budget within the fiscal year of 1938.

Tugwell said plain facts did not support a contention the administration is extravagant and is liquidating a "great burden of debt" to our children.

### Fifteen Billion For Relief

By 1938, the ordinary expenditures of the government will be \$11,200,000,000, and the expenditures for relief and recovery \$1,800,000,000. Total \$13,000,000,000 at the outside. Ordinary receipts of the government will be \$12,000,000,000.

Of the 15 billion spent on recovery and relief, 97% per cent will be contributed by the government. The balance of \$450,000,000 will be subtracted from an apparent gross deficit of \$1,000,000,000 recoverable through the sale of surplus property. A total surplus of \$450,000,000 will be subtracted from the deficit of \$1,000,000,000. From an apparent deficit of more than 15 billion, a real deficit of three billion will be left.

### Threats of Violence

"These historical changes never are pleasant," he said. "I have, however, been among the most critical ones of our history."

"The most serious attack will be to attempt to bring the government's most important people who have helped most by our policies and whom we should have the strength—the farmers and the workers. It should be possible for us to say as clearly as I can that the history of the country is the history of the farmer and the worker, and we should succeed for once in establishing a farmer-worker alliance in the government which will carry all before it, reducing our dependence on half-way measures and allowing us to carry through these reconstructive ones both in agriculture and in industry without which our nation cannot survive. Our best strategy is to surge forward with the workers and the farmers of this nation committed to general achievements, but insisting the serious of order for the disposition of our farms and the timing of our attacks."

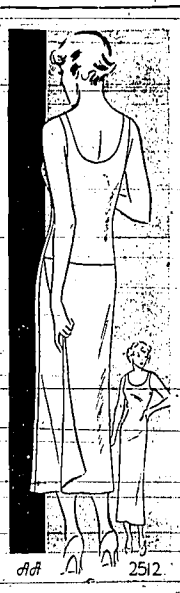

# DYING MAN FACES CHARGE OF MURDER

Discharged Employee Named Slayer of Railroad Official

CHUYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 28 (AP)—A dying railroad man, P. H. Carroll, was accused by a coroner's jury today of "willful and criminal intent" in the slaying last night of Charles C. Barnard, Union Pacific railroad official whom Carroll had blamed for his dismissal.

The jury hardly had returned its verdict as a formal inquest late today when attending physicians said they did not believe the 36-year-old former Beaumont, Tex. man could live more than 12 hours from a bullet wound, self-inflicted after the Barnard slaying.

Dr. W. K. Mylar said the bullet Carroll fired into his chest "apparently missed Carroll's heart coverings, and I believe he will die within 12 hours."

Guards stood over the prematurely wound, self-inflicted after the Barnard slaying.

Eye witnesses told Chief of Police T. Joe Cahill that Carroll approached Barnard waving a toy-size pistol, shot Barnard in the back of the head, and then turned the pistol on himself. Barnard died instantly.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28 (AP)—According to a monthly memorandum prepared by the secretary of agriculture, said his calculations showed the administration could meet every humanitarian demand and come to a balance of the national budget within the fiscal year of 1938.

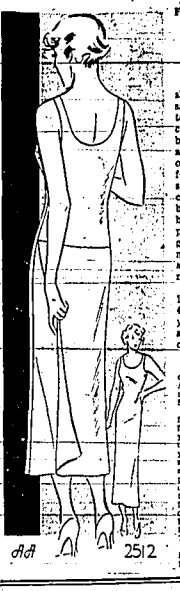

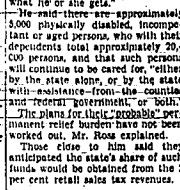

# Gridiron Spotlight Turns On Struggle At Columbus

## 90,000 Fans To See Ohio State Battle Ramblers

### Task of 'Doping' Outcome Proves Difficult For Two Mighty Teams Prepare To Battle For Supremacy

(Associated Press Sports Editor)  
**NEW YORK, Oct. 26**—It appears as difficult to "dope" the winner of the Ohio State-Notre Dame football argument this Saturday as it is to get a ticket on the 60-year-old Columbus for the "game of the year." The job will become no easier, rapidly, by the end of the week.

That's why close to 90,000 or more will jam the Ohio State double-deck stadium to see two of America's outstanding unbeaten teams battle for sectional supremacy, if not a large slice of national championship honors and an invitation to the Rose Bowl.

The host of the game is the Ohio State team, which has been ranked first in the country for the last two years. It is also a fair forecast that the winner will go on to finish an undefeated season by triumphing over Michigan at Ann Arbor, Ohio, in the "game of the year" on Saturday, Oct. 30.

Notre Dame has at least one more game to play, but there's nothing in sight capable of stopping the Buckeyes, unless the Irish go to the Big Ten.

Ohio State is a comparative figure—Ohio State looks like the winner, the "scarier" school has piled tremendous yardage in four games, on the ground as well as through the air. Taking the averages per game, Ohio State has gained three yards per play, while Notre Dame, at rushing, and three yards for every one by the Irish at forward passing.

Taken as a whole, it is doubtful if Ohio State's opposition, consisting of Kentucky, Drake, Northwestern and Michigan, could stop the Buckeyes at Columbus. The Irish are a team with talent at least three deep in each position. Notre Dame has two quarterbacks, one in Miller and Marty Peters, without which the Rockne system rarely works effectively. Ohio has the most spectacular running back in "chumpin' go Williams."

Mainly, it boils down (1) to the defense of the Irish. Notre Dame's defense will be able to check Ohio State's more complicated and bewildering offense and (2) to the ability of the Irish to be consistently through the air. The burden of proof will be on Notre Dame in each of these respects.

Finally, there is the matter of psychology. These two teams' never have met before. Under the special circumstances of this year, the game is bound to run high. Ohio State will be on home ground but Notre Dame has always been a great "road team."

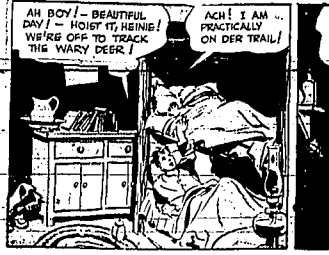

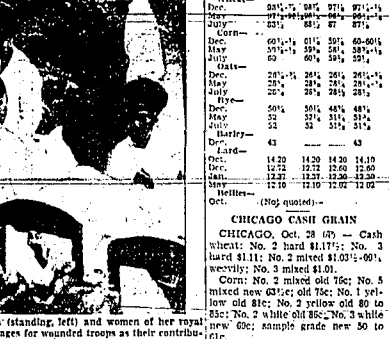

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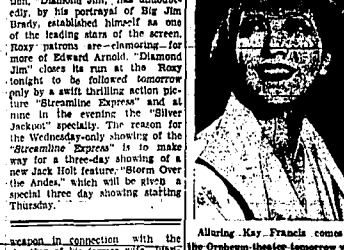
