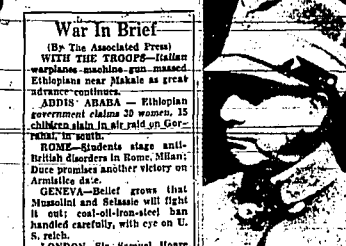

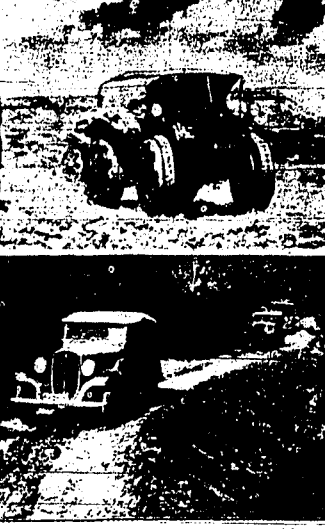

SHAKING SUPPLY LIFTS WHEAT PRICE

U. S. Crop Now Estimated at Less Than Home Consumption

MOSCOW, Nov. 4.—The wheat situation has changed considerably for the better since last July, says C. O. Youngstrom, associate agricultural economist with the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station.

In comparison with world prices, United States wheat prices have been maintained above an export level, particularly for the high quality milne wheats.

The September crop estimates placed at 559,000,000 bushels, which is somewhat less than our usual domestic consumption of around 620,000,000 bushels annually.

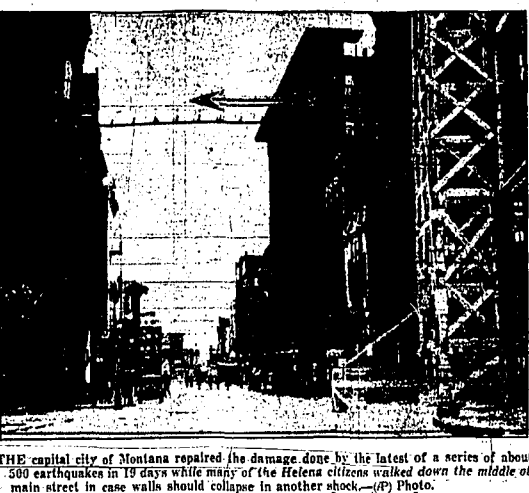
