**POLICE IDENTIFY GANGLAND VICTIM**

**Identification Marks Removed From One of Two Bodies**

MONTICELLO, N. Y., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Southern New York state "dumping ground" for garbage today said police sought to link them with the unidentified revolution that shot Arthur (Doc) Schilling, legislator and three of his henchmen out of control of the New York City police.

Munitions Committee Hints at Barrier on Metal, Cotton Trade

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Close scrutiny by the senate munitions committee of writings of raw materials injected a new note today in the neutrality stand taken by the United States.

Stephen Hausenbush, committee secretary, said information obtained by investigators will be included in material given to congress next week as a drive for more drastic neutrality legislation.

Under mandatory provisions of the present law which expires February 29, President Roosevelt embargoed sales of brass munitions and "implements of war" to the belligerents. Both he and Secretary Hull have taken steps to "discourage" any trade with the belligerents, but no absolute ban has been imposed.

The president's embargo proclamation forbids the sale of munitions and warlike elements as coal, scrap iron, oil, cotton, trucks and automobiles.

Hausenbush expressed the opinion today that under the present law, the president lacks the power to restrict the embargo to the munitions. The committee, Hausenbush said, contemplates the existing neutrality law and the president's proclamation as a basis for legislation should provide for an embargo on loans and credits as well as control of contraband.

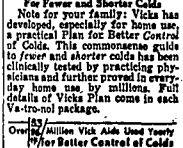

Subdued Gaiety Marks England's Royal Wedding

LONDON, Nov. 8 (AP)—Subdued gaiety filled London tonight on the eve of the wedding of the Duke of Gloucester, third son of King George and Queen Mary, to Lady Alice, daughter of King George V and Queen Mary, at Buckingham Palace at 11:30 tomorrow morning.

The wedding, which will bring to a close the celebrations of the monarch's jubilee year, is likely to be the last royal marriage in Britain with more than many years the Prince of Wales finds a bride. He will be the only remaining bachelor of the four royal sons.

The population will not see the elaborate ceremonies which have been planned for the event, originally scheduled to be held before 3000 persons in Westminster abbey. Because of the recent death of the bride's father, the Duke of Buechleuch, only a private service will be held in the small white-cloaked chapel at Buckingham Palace, the favorite place of worship of King George.

Only 120 close friends and members of both families will attend. The public will have two views of the bride—once before the wedding as she drives to the palace, and later as she and the duke proceed through the streets to St. Pancras station.

The route along Pall Mall and the Strand will be guarded by 7000 police.

The king and queen, King George of Greece (who has just been elected to return to his throne) and Queen Mary of Norway and the dowager Duchess of Buccleuch will be among those looking on as Lady Alice promises to obey as well as to love and honor her husband.

The duke will repeat his full name—Henry William Duke of Gloucester—and Lady Alice's name—Alice Christabel—to the Archbishop of Canterbury, primate of England, who will perform the ceremony.

BOISE, Nov. 5 (AP)—Idaho's 1935 wool clip of approximately 18,000,000 pounds may bring its grower a monetary return of between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000, M. C. Clark of Boise, secretary of the Idaho State Wool Growers' association, estimated tonight.

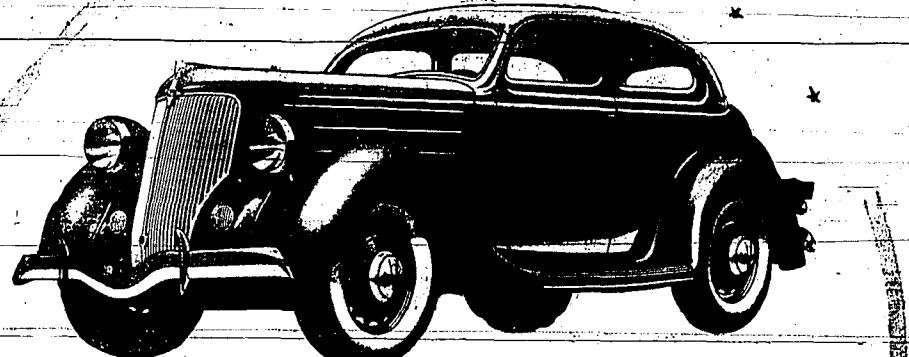

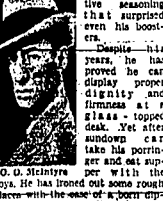

# WALLACE HITS AT CRITICISM OF AAA

### Consumers - Misunderstand Crop Control, Farm Secretary Avers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP) — Complaining that consumers were misunderstanding the AAA, Secretary Wallace today asserted that it is "necessary that neither farmer nor consumer be led astray by wild stories spread of interested parties who have little concern for consumer-farmer welfare."

"One of the amazing things about the public attitude toward the farm program in general and the processing laws in particular," Wallace said in a radio address during the national farm and home show in the event in which that attitude is not based on facts. I mean simple facts, not complex ones; facts which must be admitted whether you favor or oppose or are indifferent to the program."

The secretary referred to consumer complaints about processing laws on the west and there had never been such a list.

### Corn- Hog Contracts

As Wallace spoke, farmers' representatives from about 15 states were discussing with AAA officials methods of obtaining increased hog production next year. Details of the new two-year-corn-hog contracts will not be completed until after close of the work's seasons with the farmers. Officials indicated today, however, that there was strong sentiment for basing the next biennial payments on the number of hogs actually produced.

Under present contracts, farmers received a 10¢ a head for a 100 per cent production from their base production region.
