Ideohan Calls for Investigation of 'Injustice' in Report

BOISE, Nov. 16 (AP)—In a late-afternoon session tonight, Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon in Washington, D. C., Senator William M. Borah, applied for a writ of habeas corpus into charge of "injustice being done to cooperative and farm organizations of the committee."

The "injustice" is being done through the circulation of inaccuracies and misstatements in a certain report on the activities and operations of the federal farm board, Mr. Borah said he has been informed by farm leaders.

The report was prepared for publication by the sub-committee on agriculture and forestry, Senator McNary was chairman of the committee.

The "inaccuracies and misstatements" are being circulated, Senator Borah said, by "members of the committee" who have been "informed by farm leaders."

Use Sharp Terms
The report, in referring to the Farmers National Grain corporation—a producer-owned and producer-controlled organization—in dealing with the marketing of grain, erroneously used such terms as "dishonest" and "sharp dealing."

The session was attended by William A. Shulberg of Preston, Idaho, director of the Farmers' National Grain corporation; George C. Bauer of Chicago, executive assistant to the president of the Farmers' National Grain corporation; and W. W. Mitchell of Parma, director of the Home Valley cooperative.

UTAH LAYS CLAIM TO LIQUOR FUNDS

Supreme Court Action Paves Way for Test of Control Law

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 6 (AP)—Utah's supreme court issued writs today directing the state liquor commission to turn over its funds and a record of its financial transactions to the state treasurer by November 28, or show cause why it has not.

The action set in motion legal machinery designed to test the constitutionality of the control statute enacted by the legislature last spring. The act set up a system of state-owned package stores and agencies and created an administrative commission with broad powers.

In the petition seeking the writs, Chauncey P. Overfield of Salt Lake City attacked the operations of the commission as unconstitutional because they violated a section making the state treasurer custodian of funds. Control of funds has been in the hands of the liquor commission.

The petition further contended the commission does not have authority under the constitution to levy and sell state property for which it is not liable by reason of being "immune" against suit, except by contract.

Another action is pending in the supreme court in which other phases of the liquor control act are attacked. Mr. Overfield is represented by the same group of attorneys as is pressing the other action for resort owners of this city.

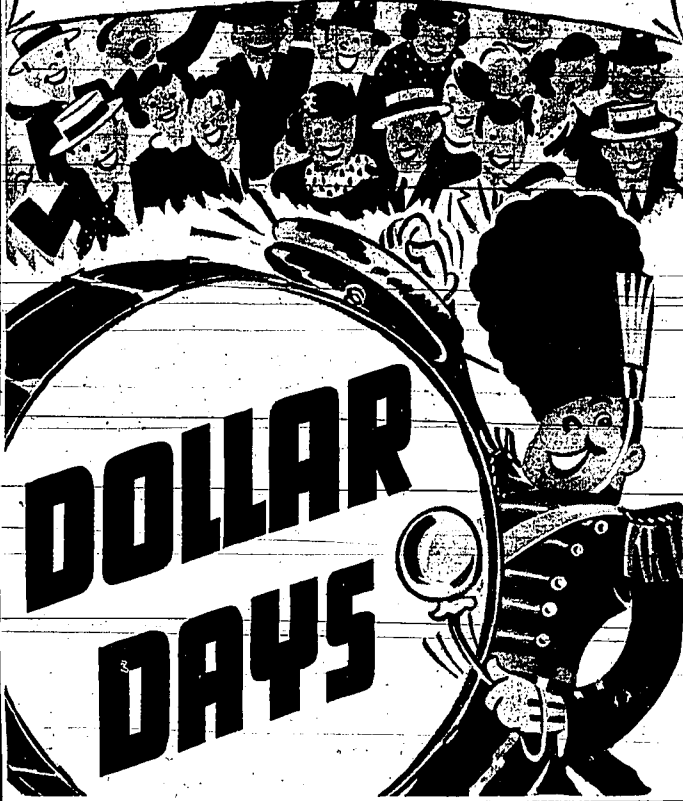
