Ex-President Offers 11-Point Program For U.S. Fiscal Reform

HOVER'S DECLARATION FOR 'RETURN' TO SOUND POLICIES STARTS CHEERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Former President Herbert Hoover spoke out tonight before a 3,000-member gathering at the Ohio society of New York in sharp criticism of the administration's "fiscal program."

He detailed an 11-point fiscal program in an address punctuated by frequent applause and cheering.

As a boy in Iowa, Mr. Hoover said, he learned "some very simple truths about finance. I learned that money does not grow on trees. It must be earned."

Essential Truths "I learned that the first rule of a successful career is to keep expenditures within the means of payoffs."

He said "there is a way to settle all these questions—that is, through abandonment of present fiscal policies and return to sound policies."

Spelling in a low, even voice, only occasionally lifting it to make his points against elements of the New Deal, Mr. Hoover made the account of a series of addresses on national problems. The first was at Oakland, California, last October.

Returns to Idaho "Tonight's was his first strictly political speech in New York since last campaign. Surrounding him were men prominent in the Republican party during Mr. Hoover's presidency."

Mrs. Hoover sat in a balcony box across the room from the speaker's table. She was given a standing ovation when she entered.

The moon was to be a visible companion and tomorrow night Professor Walter T. Whipple, director of the Francis P. Brock observatory, of Pomona college, reported his observations about 100 meteors last night.

"He came into visibility about 10:15 and was a little bright and common night."

An additional resolution which asked that the bureau make such a study was adopted by the association.

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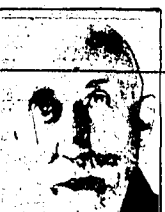

IDAHO WPA CHIEF NAMES PERSONNEL

Force of 204 Employees to Conduct Program in State

BOISE, Nov. 16 (AP) — J. L. Hood, works projects administrator for Idaho, tonight announced completion of the administrative force of 204 employees which will conduct the WPA program in Idaho and place an estimated 10,000 employable needy persons in the state at work on WPA projects.

On IERA Roll
The IERA staff, since the closing of the work program, has been reduced to about 40, with 200 being dropped throughout the state following the closing order on IERA work projects a few days ago. The IERA now has 4,908 unemployable cases, or approximately 14,724 persons on its rolls, and 4,000 employable cases representing about 41,864 persons.

The department personnel of the state office, headed by Hood, includes the following: J. F. Hughes is chief clerk of the division of office management; O. K. Hine of Boise, director of the division of finance and reports, with H. M. Pugmire of Pocatello as assistant; R. L. Edwards of Caldwell, state compensation officer; Roy C. North Carolina's aspirations for a Southern conference title and a possible bid to the national championship were dashed today by Duke's enterprising offense which crushed the Tar Heels, 25-9 in a shocking rout.

Marquette's undefeated record was shattered today when the team, 26-6, Syracuse, outplayed the Cardinals in the first period.

Duke's Sherrill, finding a really effective passing attack for the first time, knocked Cornell, 41-7, and New York University, almost as impressively, walloped Rutgers, Princeton, and the University of Maryland.

Opponents Crush Wolverine Minnesota, undefeated in 23 successive engagements, took Michigan's victory apart, 40-0, in marching on toward what looks like a certain tie with Ohio State for the national championship.

California, tending up for the meeting with Stanford, shellacked Amos Alonzo Stagg's College of Pacific Eleven, 39-0, while Stanford beat only by 14-14, at Walden, Montana, 27-0.

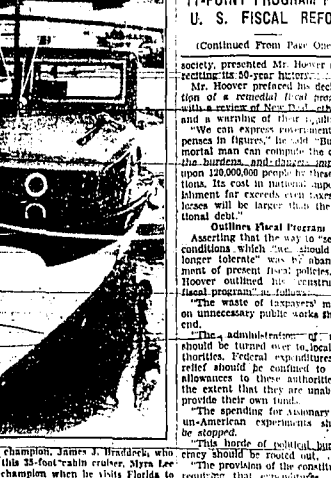
