Japan To Use Force In Drive To Set Up Rule In North China

Army Ready To Fight Anyone Attempting To Block Autonomous Movement

TOKYO, Nov. 19.—Japan's army will control the protected independent state of North China, now in the making, reliable sources indicated tonight.

Dispatches to Japanese news agencies and newspapers from China intimated this nation's army is prepared to fight anyone attempting to block the autonomous movement.

Chinese officials in Peiping said they were carrying out the independence program because of Japanese army threat to invade and occupy North China if they did not.

The correspondent said comprehensive reports had been made designed to "save the face" of Chiang Kai-shek. Other dispatches indicated Chinese officials would be satisfied to interfere with the autonomy movement.

Although the new state will nominally acknowledge the sovereignty of the Chinese republic, there will be no allegiance to the Nanjing government and no financial or economic ties.

Dispatches said the currency would be tied up with the Japanese yen and the Japanese government and that the recently inaugurated currency program of the Japanese government would be applied to the new state.

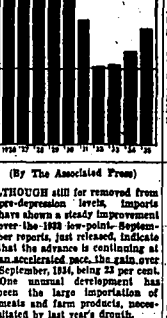

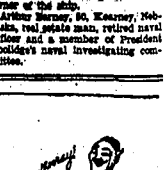

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DEFENDOR TURNS SHIAFT AT BANKERS

Idaho Finance Commissioner Sees U. S. in Business Long Time

BOISE, Nov. 19 (AP) — The rank and file of American bankers "are whining, whimpering, complaining, and the correct attitude of the United States will be forced by the demands of the people to remain the banking nation for a long time," Ben Defendorf, Idaho commissioner of finance, declared here tonight.

"The grey-headed, outworn official, who spent many years himself as a bank executive in the middle west, plainly stated his views after he returned to his office here today following an absence of three weeks, during which he attended the annual convention of the American Bankers' association in New Orleans.

"After attending that meeting of 3,000 bankers and traveling several thousand miles through the United States, he concluded that the executives of banks are sitting around like a bunch of babies.

"They are too much candy a few years ago; they became very alert to the federal government when it came in a hospital and nursed them back to health and now, without making any guarantees, they expect the government to get out of the field of credit, cease its regulation and financial assistance, and let the business alone to the banks.

"The government will not do that until there is absolute assurance that the banks are sound and will provide the necessary credit for the conduct of business, industry, agriculture and commerce.

No Reason to Fear 'Excessive' Prices Under Guffy Law

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP) — Coal users were promised lower prices by C. P. Hooper, Jr., chairman of the Bituminous Coal commission, that they have no reason to fear excessive prices as a result of the Guffy law.

He said the commission will make every effort to end the practice of "selling black sizes of coal at prices far above the actual cost of production."

But no "fair-minded" customer can expect to buy coal at prices causing heavy loss to the producer, he commented, adding that the Guffy act contains far-reaching consumer safeguards.

It is not contemplated that the establishment of maximum prices will be necessary, the power of the commission in this respect is specific, the statement said.

SALES TAX AND RELIEF

A rather complicated situation appears to have arisen in connection with the question as to what shall be done with that portion of the State sales tax funds set aside for the relief of distress in connection with the Federal relief program now that the Federal relief program has been, in effect, abolished.

This matter of the use of sales tax funds for relief purposes has been brought into the foreground by persons who offer it in explanation of the difficulty now being experienced in raising the amount required for the Community Chest.

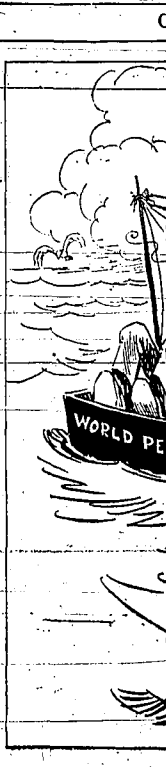

DUTIES OF GRANGE SPEAKERS INCREASE

Head of Lecturers Reports Growing Interest in National Programs

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 19 (AP)—An army of 8,000 lecturers is required in the National Grange to meet the growing demands of farmers for information of subjects ranging from legislative problems of agriculture to proper diet.

"The tremendous amount of information which we direct to our lecturers throughout the country is a very good indication of how the farmer's mind is broadening," he said.

Intensive Study Required

"Our lecturers find more and more the need for intensive study of factual matter, especially relating to the national government, so they may answer the growing number of questions that come to them at farm meetings.

"The modern farmer is reading far more than he used to, not only upon agricultural questions but upon such complex matters as monetary problems and relief of the unemployed.

"Interest has been so great in one direction, the question of financing and establishing an adequate old age pension system, that we recently made a comprehensive study of pension systems throughout the world so that our speakers would be adequately informed."

"What subject tops all others in interest?"

"The AAA," responded Farmer. "There is also tremendous interest in rural electrification and the constitution."
