Thanksgiving Table Talk

"We may live without Love
What is passion but pining,
But where is the Man
Who can live without dining?"

THE writer of these lines must have been thinking especially of Thanksgiving and the toothsome viands thus conjured up. But toothsome viands would lose their taste appeal if they were not placed in a timely setting of snowy linen, sparkling crystal and gleaming silver.

Emily Post writes glibly of a formal dinner, with a man servant for each two guests and no care on the part of the hostess other than a few casual directions to the head housekeeper, but you and I, Mrs. Housewife, without servants choose to make our Thanksgiving table an original creation, designed especially for those whom it is our delight to serve.

First of all, have your duck-rusk glistening, or maybe you choose to cover your ancestral hogony with a bit of linen worn in Ireland and transported to the Canary Isles for a special occasion. On this snow white place the centerpiece. A very pretty, inexpensive and seasonal one is scented leaves and yellow tulleon chrysanthemum, or if you prefer fruit, hollow out a pumpkin and fill it with fruit flanked by comets of sparkling red cranberries. Keep the centerpiece low so that no guest may complain of discomfort. Additions in order to catch a glimpse of words with the friend across the board. Candies always stand in the air and if the holders are filled with lovely tall golden candies they will add their share of beauty.

Dinner Easily Served

- My Thanksgiving menu this year is simple but easily served by the busy housewife with no maid.
- Tomato Juice cocktail
- Oyster Blaque
- Roast Turkey, Giblet Stuffing
- Mushroom Gravy
- Mashed Potatoes
- Brussels Sprouts in Celery Sauce
- Avocado and Orange Salad
- Cranberry Jelly
- Pumpkin Pie
- Hot Rolls
- Mints, Coffee.

The tomato cocktail will be in place on our service plates when the company is seated. On the table will be cranberry jelly and mints. After the cocktail glasses are removed, oyster blaque will be served, and with the cream soup plates removed, the main turkey course comes on. It is especially desirable that we use service plates, and that the dishes say they are not to be removed until the dessert course. Father will carve the turkey which is roasting on a barley decorated platter in front of him. Flanked by a two-compartment vegetable dish holding the potatoes and Brussels sprouts. In addition to the carving set, be sure and supply him with tendon shears. For a host of these will be heard chances of profanity at the festive Thanksgiving board.

The silver necessary for this menu: On the left side of the plate, a dinner fork and a salad fork. On the right side, a cream soup spoon, a tea spoon and a dinner knife. These to be placed in order of their use, the first used on the outside. There must never be more than three forks and two knives at the plates at one time. After the turkey course is finished, the service plates together with all other dishes must be removed, the crumbs cleaned from the table, preferably with a napkin and tray, after which the dessert course with the necessary silver is brought on. If coffee is to be served with the dessert, a tea spoon will suffice. If coffee is to be served in the drawing room, no spoon will need be placed on the table.

And as we bid our guests good-night, the shades of our Puritan ancestors will most likely be heard to say "Thank be to God for all His mercies."

Low Heat Best In Cooking Meat

"If you would have meat so tender that you could cut it with a fork, and juicy enough to satisfy the most exacting palate, be sure that the cooking temperature is low," is the advice of Mrs. S. Wilson, home economist. "There is no other one thing so important as temperature in meat cooking."

A low temperature is advised for all methods of cooking meat. Roasts, according to experimenters, are best when cooked at an oven temperature of 300 to 350 degrees F. for the entire period. This temperature is low to ensure to make a juicy, tender, evenly-done roast, and yet in the time necessary for cooking, it is sufficient to make a tender, nicely browned without browning the drippings to excess. The length of cooking time, of course, depends on the temperature. At the low temperature advocated, it requires twenty-seven to thirty minutes per pound to cook a roast of beef, twenty to twenty-five minutes per pound for a medium-done roast, and eighteen to twenty minutes per pound for cooking a rare roast. Pork and lamb need require a different length of time for roasting. Egg from pork thirty to forty minutes per pound are required while for carcass pork twenty-five to thirty minutes per pound are sufficient. Lamb requires thirty to thirty-five minutes per pound.

Caviar Mayonnaise

A tasty form of "devotion" is to stuff hard-cooked eggs with a mixture of the finely minced egg yolks and caviar mayonnaise. Caviar mayonnaise is made by beating into a cup of plain mayonnaise two tablespoons of heavy cream, two or three dashes of paprika, a squeeze of lemon juice and two tablespoons of caviar, and mixing them well together. Chill filling in refrigerator, thoroughly before stuffing eggs.

Popular "Fan Fare" For After Football

Score a "touchdown" with your next party for the "gang!"

Win or lose, football fans must eat, and scores won't hurt their appetites a bit. If you yearn to play the hostess to a jolly crowd of huge, appreciative appetites, plan a supper after the game, for entertainment—it's the kind of a party that almost "gives itself" as far as effort goes. To entertain is concerned, jollity is the natural reaction from the high excitement of the game, and football atmosphere gives you an opportunity to plan a unique table setting and clever refreshments, for this is a scheme which isn't so common, and there's plenty of room for the inventive and the experimental.

The supper type of food is best after the game. It has a heartiness and informality which usually "ties in" better with the less formal atmosphere of a football crowd in some place to dance or attend to the game. No matter what you serve for refreshments, make plenty of it and serve it promptly, so that no one will wish he had stopped on the way for a sandwich.

Minimum of Delay

This can be accomplished even when the hostess attends the game herself, and what young hostesses want to feel. For instance, the minimum delay will be necessary with a menu of hot turkey or chicken, hot sandwiches, assorted relishes and pickles, roast apples, molded autumn salad, spiced cider and chocolate ice cream garnished with tiny chocolate footballs.

The ice cream is made easily and left in the freezing tray until serving time. A substitute dessert might be football shaped doughnuts on a platter which has been outlined in white or chocolate icing.

The salad is molded and chilled in the food compartment of the ice box; pickles, radishes and olives in a rice crispies in the refrigerator. The turkey or chicken has been cooked and allowed for sandwiches. It is stored in the ice box, wrapped in waxed paper, waiting to be re-heated with the made-up gravy; at the same time a baking tin of rosy apples which were heated in the furnace to put back in the oven to be re-baked.

Boil 6 large sweet potatoes, peel and slice. Pare 4 apples and slice. Arrange a layer of potatoes at the bottom of a greased casserole. Over these a layer of apples. Dot with butter, sprinkle with brown sugar and a dash of cinnamon. Continue until the casserole is filled, giving each layer its covering of brown sugar, butter and cinnamon. Mix one-half cup of hot water with one-half cup of maple syrup and pour over the apples and potatoes. Bake in a moderate oven until the syrup is thick and the apples are tender.

SWEET POTATO PUFFS

3 cups mashed 1 tbsp. sugar
1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup salt 1/2 cup sugar

Beat about 2 pounds sweet potatoes until tender. Peel and mince. Season with salt and pepper to taste; add fat, sugar and beaten egg yolks. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into the potato mixture. Turn into greased baking dish, place in a pan of water and bake in a moderate oven about 30 minutes, or until puffy and brown.

Liebling Concert Declared Triumph by Idaho Music Circles

Southern Idaho music lovers last evening heard Dr. George Leibling, one of the world's great artists of the piano in a concert of unforgettable brilliancy. Dr. Leibling displayed a complete mastery of tone quality and played his pianissimo with infinite delicacy never sacrificing accuracy. The large audience that assembled at the Methodist Episcopal church was especially receptive to the varying moods of the program.

Dr. Leibling's repertoire contained numbers from his master teacher, Liszt, Rubinstein, Bachmann, and Brahms, all of whom were his personal friends; Debussy and Chopin; and a group of six original compositions. Supplementing the five-part musical program, Dr. Leibling engagingly recounted personal impressions and anecdotes of Liszt.

Original Interpretation

His interpretation of Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata" was unusual in that he slightly varied the time of the triplets throughout the first movement with artistic effect.

Especially outstanding was Dr. Leibling's masterly interpretation of Bachmann's "Prelude in G-sharp" which makes most understandable the inspiration that Bachmann received from the Moscow of another era, when the bells rang out from 1500 churches at Easter tide.

Liebling Numbers Praised

All of his original compositions made a deep impression on his audience, but especially appealing were his "Vendian Laces," "The Fantasy on the opera 'Rigoletto,'" "Verdi-Lact," with which he concluded his program as an artistic triumph, the rousing applause of the audience did not sever him from his 100 score decision, but he returned many times to the platform for gracious bows of acknowledgment.

He was presented to the audience by Mrs. Edna Robinson, one of his former pupils, who prefaced a number of her better known compositions while sitting with him. Miss Mary Hoover, Twin Falls, is a present pupil of Dr. Leibling.

Dr. Leibling will go to Salt Lake City for a concert Sunday afternoon. He will return to California Sunday evening.
