WPA WORKERS AID FARM BOOKKEEPERS

\$15,000 Made Available for Summarizing of Records

BOISE, Dec. 7 (AP)—In the interests of future farm management work, the Federal Works Progress Administration has made \$15,000 available for use in summarizing 4000 of the best farm records kept in Idaho during 1935. Karl Hobson, assistant university extension economist, announced here today.

"We expect to secure a great deal of information by means of this project, that will be of considerable value in future farm management work and which may be used in connection with other adjustment programs," Hobson commented.

Farmers Stock Assistance
Approximately 10,000 agricultural adjustment administration farm record books were distributed during the year by the extension service workers and AAA organizations, and county agents. Many farmers have assisted many of the farmers with record-keeping problems during the year, he said.

Community meetings are being planned now, in most of the counties, for summarizing and closing their record books.

Many farmers will bring their books to the county agents, others will obtain aid from teachers of vocational agriculture, AAA agents and other sources.

One or more WPA workers will be assigned to each of the 27 counties, which have county agents to supervise the work.

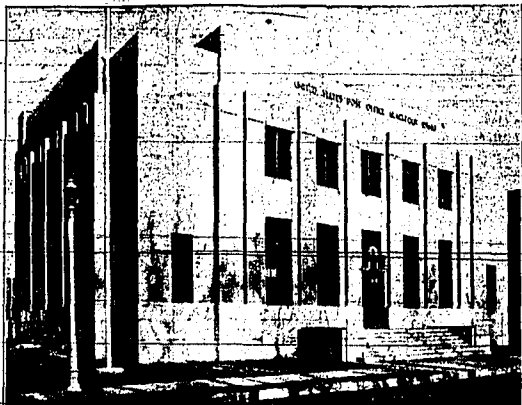
THROUGH GATHERS FOR MOOSE LODGE SESSION

STRANGLE HOLD

A general oil embargo against Italy would virtually strangle that country's motors over night and in order to place such an embargo in effect it would be necessary to secure the cooperation of only three or four countries.

According to the National Geographic Society three countries produce about eighty-one per cent of the world's supply of petroleum. These are the United States, Russia and Venezuela.

The principle of the embargo or "sanctions" may yet constitute a weapon of greater menace than bullets and bayonets, airplanes and tanks.

If such an embargo is organized against Italy the result is apt to present a problem beyond the power of even a dictatorship to solve.

The military fate of Italy, certainly the outcome of the war with Ethiopia, is apparently held within the hands of the three or four chief petroleum producing countries of the world.

WHY CHRISTMAS SEALS?

By the annual sale of a great many cheerful little Christmas Seals at a penny apiece, funds are raised all over the country for fighting tuberculosis.

A committee in one area, reporting its year's achievements, tells of fluorescent examinations of high school pupils, establishment of a graduate school for training nurses in the case of tuberculosis, health camps for boys and girls and a wholesome spring cleanup.

PENALIZING GOOD CITIZENSHIP

If this newspaper interprets correctly rules now in effect throughout the nation no person who registered for relief after November 1 is to be certified by relief agencies for transfer to Federal WPA jobs.

The foregoing official procedure opens for itself. Under the ruling a premium is placed on improvidence while persons who have made an honest effort to maintain themselves are penalized.

Under the present plan the man who in the past accepted relief or relief work only to meet an extreme emergency—to supply his family temporarily with necessities—and then got out and hunted for private employment—is out of the picture.

JOINING NORTH AND SOUTH

Much money has been spent unwisely by federal relief agencies, but so far as Idaho as a whole is concerned there is no more worthwhile project than agriculture.

Idaho is a peculiar state, geographically. The southern part once its rich place gold mining fields had been stripped of their surface wealth, gradually turned into an agricultural paradise.

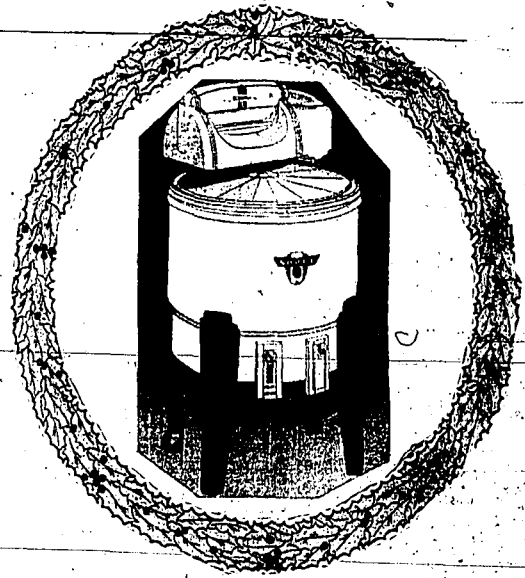
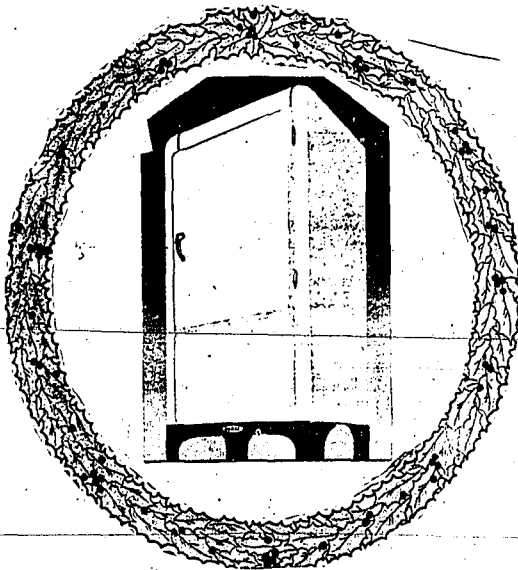

KNOX GIVES VIEWS ON FARM PROBLEMS

Chicagoan Outlines 'Possible' Program for Agriculture

CHICAGO, Dec. 7 (AP)—Colonel Frank Knox, Republican nominee for the republican presidential nomination, in a statement today outlined what he termed a "possible farm program," based on a scientific approach to the problem.

Men of science, he said, have pointed the way to a "two-fold solution" of the dilemma which confronts the country from the addition of 50,000,000 acres of cultivation by European countries since the World war.

"The agronomist tells us that for generations we have been mining the previous fertility from our soil," the statement said. "On the one hand, for every man, woman and child in America has an equitable interest in maintaining the fertility of the soil, would it not be sound national policy for the federal government to reimburse, in part at least, the cost to the farmer for restoring fertility and reclaiming lands now eroded?"

Restoration Project

"Let us assume that it takes two years to restore normal fertility, by withdrawing 25,000,000 acres of the 375,000,000 acres normally under cultivation annually from normal productive use for a period of two years, our entire farming area is thus renovated and renewed. It would take about 15 years to com-

Aid in Finding Mildred Hook's Body Appreciated

Joseph P. Hook, Tacoma writer whose daughter, Mildred Hook was mysteriously slain by her former band, Douglas Van Wack, in a railroad car near southwest of Twin Falls, has requested the News, in a letter delivered yesterday, to express gratitude to the many men and women of Twin Falls and the vicinity who assisted in every way possible to find my girl's mutilated body.

Written after the girl's funeral at Tacoma last Tuesday, the letter said:

"After laying Mildred away to rest, I now turn to the task of returning thanks to the many men and women of Twin Falls and the vicinity who assisted in every way possible to find my girl's mutilated body. I'm afraid the task is going to be too great for me; no man can find the words that could even begin to express to the rest of Idaho our gratitude. . . . Some of them sent cards and letters of sympathy. . . . I CAN WRITE, but cannot reach the rest because do not know their names."

Speaks for Family

The Tacoma man expressed himself in behalf of himself and Mrs. Hook and their sons, Clyde and Vincent. With the purpose of assisting in the search, the girl's brother, Arthur, in Twin Falls shortly before the discovery of her body, three days after she was slain, and identified it at an inquest held here the same day.

Accused of the murder of Pontalene Cooper, state traffic officer who attempted to halt Van Wack as he sped through Buhl with his allegedly kidnaped former wife last November 20, Van Wack has been held a prisoner in Twin Falls county jail since he surrendered the next morning to "volunteer" possemen at the roadside within three miles of where the girl's body was found.
