Wallace Calls For New Income Distribution, Regulation Of Crops

Secretary Of Agriculture Argues In Annual Report For 'Balanced Production'

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Secretary Wallace called today for a redistribution of income in the United States, asserting such a realignment was "not a proposal but a necessity."

Calling also for a permanent crop adjustment program, for a lowering of tariff barriers and an increased foreign trade, Wallace said while discussing this latter question in his annual report:

"It is, in what we must recognize: The redistribution of income is not a proposal but a necessity. In one way or another it results automatically from any of the courses open to us. We cannot avoid it by creating this or that special device which we import to necessities, that is to permit agriculture, to make permanent the necessity for some relief to commodity prices, to secure uniform adjustment, and to create scarcity."

Reduce Income First "The resulting unemployment involves heavy public expenditures. In such circumstances we first reduce the national income and then we reduce the reduced total to avert disaster."

The other course open, Wallace said, "involves a redistribution of income, but under happier conditions."

With production stimulated through international trade, he said, "the total national income would increase, and though the increase would have to be distributed to increase consumption per capita, the operation would raise the national standard of living. By this means we are balancing the national consumption with the national production or its equivalent—and on a rising scale."

"Efficiency the secretary said, will not monopolize the benefit of a more liberal import policy "even in the earlier stages."

For Dollar Exchange "If we admit foreign goods into our market," he continued, "it will provide dollar exchange that other countries can spend."

In another phase of his report Wallace said there should be a room for city people on the land and that the "mass settlement of the unemployed on farms cannot be justified."

"Certain groups may advantageously combine farm with urban work. Suburban farming, he said, might grow food, may utilize the best elements of both urban and rural life and may cushion unemployment."

"Moreover, road funds and the automobile are gradually lessening the congestion of employment in large cities and creating opportunities for work in the less remote rural areas," the secretary said.

"Efficiency is not in itself a source of employment," he declared.

"Labor backs new industrial council Cooperation of Business in Cutting Unemployment Urged at Capital

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—Calling upon business to cooperate in cutting unemployment, a wide variety of organized labor groups today urged their support of a controversial administration effort to create a new industrial council.

"The cold shoulder," urged by the labor unions, is based upon the council-forming efforts of George L. Berry, the president's industrial coordinator, meanwhile appeared in their support, "to stop the movement."

Berry, who sponsored yesterday's formation of the business-labor conference, out of which the council was to grow, today asserted he was going ahead, and told business to stop "pulling" as to the council's character.

IDAHO WOMAN TO PLAY MAJOR ROLE IN MURDER TRIAL

Prosecution Of Accused Man In Denver Court Hinges Upon Identification by Witness—From—Caldwell

(By The Associated Press) DENVER, Dec. 10.—A woman will walk into district court, possibly tomorrow, to point an accusing finger, or to absolve a man police believe murdered her a year ago.

The woman is Mrs. Stella Ross Williams, 24, of Caldwell, Idaho. The man, sandy haired and with a mustache, is Charles T. Davis, Kentucky ex-convict, but the state says he is Harry Ross, slayer.

He is accused of killing Erwin C. Thompson, 32, Grand Junction town, engineer, who came to Colorado on vacation in the summer of 1932. He disappeared on July 1, 1932, and later his body was found near a concrete slab at a house Ross occupied.

Mrs. Williams said she met Ross here and that he took her to Grand Junction on vacation in the summer of 1932, and she believed he had killed Thompson. She said she knew nothing about the slaying.

Thompson, living in a tent in South Denver, sought refuge from a storm on July 19 in Ross' shack. Police notified.

The next day Thomas Crawford, who lives in the neighborhood, saw Ross wearing clothing that resembled Thompson's and Ross also was driving a car Crawford believed belonged to Thompson. He notified police.

FEDERAL DEFENDER OF AAA COLLAPSES

Solicitor - General Unable to Complete Plea Before Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The sudden collapse of Solicitor General Stanley Reed forced a preliminary adjournment of the constitutional case today shortly after the constitutionality of AAA had been taken under advisement.

Making his third plea to the nine justices within 24 hours of the time for the new U. S. Bankruptcy court control act, Reed abruptly stood down in the midst of pointed questioning by the chief justice.

Chief Justice Hughes immediately adjourned court, although the session was expected to continue until after the end of the court's term.

Two hours earlier, the solicitor-general had hastily denied that the constitutional adjustment scheme of the administration farm program—renamed American agriculture—was unconstitutional.

Reed, who spoke after George Wharton Pepper, former Pennsylvania Republican senator and counsel for the House Mills, had concluded an attack on the constitutionality of the program.

"The constitutionality of the program," he said, "is not in my mind the real issue. The real issue is whether the program is a violation of the fifth amendment."

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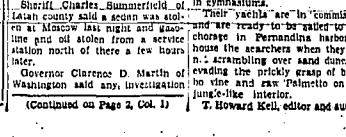
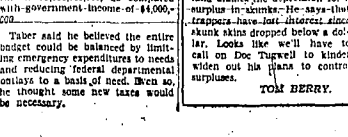
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JAPANESE TROOPS SEIZE MORE LAND IN BLOODY BATTLE

Manchoukuoan Army With Tanks and Airplanes, Invades Southeastern China—Against Resistance

(By The Associated Press) PEIPING, Dec. 10.—A Manchoukuoan army was reported by Chinese sources tonight to have invaded southeastern China province and fought a battle with special police in which many persons were killed.

Unable to check the tanks and airplanes which the invaders were said to have used, the defending police withdrew into the mountains, the reports from Kalgan stated.

In State of Siege "The area was said to be in a virtual state of siege, with the evacuation of Manchoukuoan empire being a new piece of North China territory."

In representations made by Chinese authorities here, Taka-hashi was reported to have stated that the troop movement was due to the Japanese government's demand for the return of the original proposal last Sunday, and that word of its probable acceptance in Peiping was received shortly thereafter in Paris.

Provision of Plan "Premier Laval, in announcing that France and Britain are in 'powerful accord' on the text of the proposed peace plan, said that the plan had been agreed to accept 'important changes' made by the British cabinet."

Main lines of the revised plan were authorized by reported to be the following: 1. An Ethiopian outfit to be sent to the port of Addis Ababa.

2. Three provinces to be given to Italy with the exception of the Holy Land, which is to be transferred to the League.

3. The Ogaden and Danakil countries in the East Africa region to be established in the territory eight degrees north latitude to 28 degrees east longitude.

4. A zone of colonization under an Italian chartering company to be established in the territory eight degrees north latitude to 28 degrees east longitude.

5. A zone of administrative and financial assistance to be drawn up between Ethiopia and the League of Nations.

Revision of the program was made after attacks upon it in the British House of Commons and reports of disapproval even by British cabinet members.

Facials Cheered "ROME, Dec. 10 (AP)—Benito Mussolini locked his teeth and went home tonight without a word of approval of the revised program for peace in Africa, but unofficial fascists were cheering in the streets."

Even if the plan is rejected, it is shown that the powers, after months of giving and giving for more than they proposed to do, are now in a position to demand that the League of Nations accept the revised program for peace in Africa.

"If the Republican convention were held tomorrow," Block said, "Landon would receive the nomination easily."

Hearst stopped briefly en route to California. With him were Governor Landon, publisher of the Washington Herald, and Arthur Brisbane, columnist and chief editorial writer of the Hearst newspaper.

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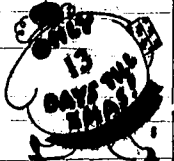

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SALES TAX APPLIES TO FULL PURCHASES

Defendorf Says No Allowance Will Be Made on Trade-In Goods

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP) — The Idaho sales tax applies to the full amount of purchases, and no deduction can be made when goods or equipment is used in lieu of money to settle for them. Don Defendorf, state commissioner of finance and administrator of the tax law, announced tonight.

Various automobile dealers' associations and individuals have come to me and protested against this requirement of the law, but the provisions are clear and we cannot grant any exceptions in such cases, the commissioner said.

Illustrative Point
Then he illustrated the point about which complaints have been made:

"A buys a new automobile for \$800. He trades in his old car and is allowed a \$200 allowance. The \$600 to be paid in cash. On what amount must B charge a tax in determining the sales tax? The answer is \$800. This applies to any exchange of property in payment of a purchase, not only automobiles."

"We have competent legal advice and the law is clear on this point," Mr. Defendorf added.

"We have had increasing numbers of protests along this line, but we can only enforce the law. The legislature must make any changes the public wishes, if the changes are made."

"The benefits of this law are according to the public through a reduction in ad valorem taxes and in other ways so the benefits of the law of the complaints we have had appear to be based on politics."

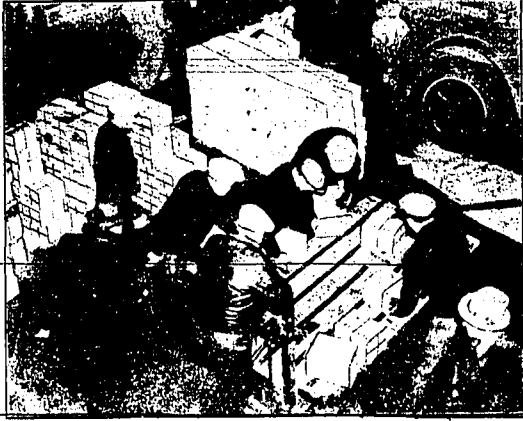

PITTMAN SEES END OF LEAGUE'S POWER

Nevada, Solon Says Author- ily of Geneva Lies in Sanction on Oil

RENO, Dec. 10 (AP)—Senator Key Pittman (D-Nev.), chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee, said in an address here yesterday that if the League of Nations fails to include fuel oil in sanctions applied against Italy, such failure will be a confession of "utterly and virtually the end of the League as a force in the world."

Speaking before the Reno Rotary club, Senator Pittman referred to the invasion of Ethiopia as "brutal and murderous."

"No League Today"

"In a sense," Senator Pittman declared, "there is no League of Nations today."

He said that without favorable action from Great Britain and France, application of sanctions by the League would be impossible.

"The League justified concerted action on the part of the nations of the world to prevent warfare, declaring that 'unfortunately there are international brigands' in the world and that they can only be stopped by the old rule of 'population action.'"

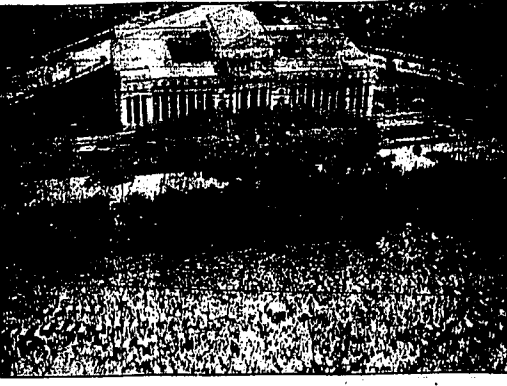
Could Stop Japan

The Senator also focused upon the Sino-Japanese situation, declaring that no one today in the world can "stop Japan." The only force that could stop the Japanese, he declared, would be the "combined navies of Great Britain and the United States."

America, Senator Pittman said, will sometime in the future come to a "shocking realization of its interests on the Pacific ocean."

"Considering the commercial angle," he said, "it should be borne in mind that this country will never again have a good market for its goods in Europe. Our only ready market is in Asia and this market is being taken over by Japan through invasion."

Scientists Aver Permanent Harm Result of Diet

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 10 (AP)—From his behavior of laboratory animals forced to wait a few hours for their meals, science has learned permanent physical harm may result when persons continually skip on foot either in a depression or in attempts to reduce weight.

Continuing to popular belief starvation decreases rather than increases appetite, shrinks the stomach, and in the end reduces an animal's capacity for food and, on the other hand, normal hunger increases mental and physical activity.

These facts were reported today by W. A. Boustedt, instructor in psychology at Tufts college, Medford, in an interview. His experiments were conducted at the psychological laboratory in Harvard university as part of a series of researches on the "physiological mechanism in motivation."

Continued tests showed that rats accustomed to regular meals could not eat as much when their feeding had been delayed by as little as 3 1/2 hours, while after a two-day fast the amount of food taken when they were allowed to eat again was 20 per cent less than the amount they had eaten before they fasted the less they ate when feeding was resumed.

Men are like that too. Psychologists who have fasted for two weeks showed a similar falling off both in appetite and capacity for food.

GRAZING ACT UNDER ATTACK IN OREGON

Sheepman Challenges Federal Rule of Range in U. S. Court

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10 (AP)—The constitutionality of the Taylor grazing act which gives the secretary of interior power to withdraw grazing lands from use, was challenged in a suit filed in federal court here yesterday.

The action was brought by Joe Abasco, eastern Oregon sheepman. His complaint declared custom and usage have allowed him to use the public domain for grazing and his flock must be destroyed if such use is denied him. He said the value of his water rights and lands will be lost if the rules promulgated by Secretary Ickes are enforced.

The constitutionality was attacked on three grounds, (1) that Secretary Ickes, in promulgating rules for permits to graze on the public domain, usurped legislative authority; (2) that congress delegated powers to Ickes expressly reserved to congress by the constitution; (3)

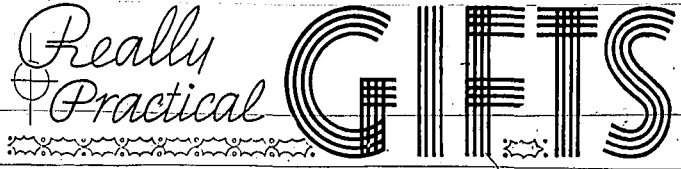

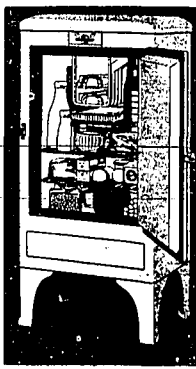

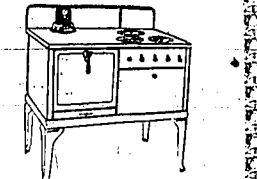
