



AAA GIVEN OK FOR FARM BUREAU

Convention Approves Reciprocal Trade Treaty in Principle

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—Approval of resolutions recommending a bilateral trade treaty, authorizing the AAA and urging a managed currency brought the 17th annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation to a close today.

With little opposition and a minimum of debate the delegates expressed their favor of the report of the resolutions committee recommending in what some members termed a struggle on the controversy of reciprocal trade agreements between the United States and Canada.

Distressed in Principle

The plank in the organization's platform of principles set forth: "We are opposed to the passage of reciprocal trade treaties which are primarily to restore agricultural exports by judicious lowering of tariff tariffs, thus admitting more goods into this country and making it possible for us to sell more of our farm products abroad. We insist that this purpose be stated in all framing reciprocal trade treaties and that there be no reduction in present agricultural tariffs on any farm products that would have the effect of holding or reducing domestic price levels below parity on such products."

The statement was termed "pussy-footing" by A. J. Olson, president of the Minnesota farm bureau. Spokesman of the Minnesota delegation warned that the lowering of tariffs on dairy produce, seed potatoes and pulpwood in the recently promulgated pact, which the commission might have an adverse effect on the farmers in the northern section of his state, New York, and their dairy industry, now bringing in 50 percent of the state's farm income, might suffer a hard blow.

Carried Unanimously

But when other delegates pointed out the federation officials would seek readjustments if harmful results developed the resolution on trade treaties was carried unanimously.

Broadening and extension of the neutrality act was suggested in another resolution which held the government should limit the amount of limit of profits of all enterprises and to curb industrial and financial activities in the event of a war involving the United States.

Introduced also for brief remarks were R. P. Perry of Twin Falls, Republican state chairman, W. H. Desvever of Burley, John W. Graham and Captain C. H. Kierstead, both of Twin Falls.

"Handout" Bars Methods
 "Attempts have been made to have Washington correspondents react from their statements when they attend the administration," Mr. Dworshak said. "Another method is to close the legitimate channels of news to correspondents, and then hand out mimeographed sheets containing official propaganda."

"Recently," he declared, "there was published at the capital a book 'Handout,' disclosing administration efforts to distort and suppress news. Several hundred other capital correspondents are now employed as spy agents for various bureaus, and it is their job to report only that news which officials wish the public to have. These newsmen receive about twice as much from the government as formerly."

"Is there any justification," he asked, "for such censorship of official news, and withholding vital information concerning the expenditure of federal funds? Activities at Washington concern the public, and there should be no inquisition with correspondents whose duties require that they uncover all official news."

Quits Ex-New Dealers
 Instead of attacking the new deal, the speaker referred to recent attempts to force him to resign from the new deal is going haywire and is heading for socialism and ruin, that after he in history has been such reckless and unchecked extravagance with public funds. Mr. Dworshak said he has resigned the attitude of George M. Peek, who resigned recently as head of the expansion bureau, head of the Idaho congressmen, who have advanced new deal policies, and also called Peek, who has attacked WPA regulations recently.

The speaker stated that the 1936 election would be a crucial one when Americans must choose between a bureaucracy and a representative government, between governments of laws and a government of men. He appealed to Republicans to pressure congressmen clearly, in an endeavor to arouse public sentiment and make possible an expression of voters without emotional appeal.

MEDITERRANEAN CRISIS DEPICTED FOR ROTARY

A brief address of unusual interest was yesterday delivered before the Twin Falls Rotary club by Superintendent of Schools W. B. Smith on the general subject of the Mediterranean as presented by England and Italy in the Mediterranean area of the club's regular weekly luncheon meeting.

The address embodied a review of many of the outstanding events of world history. Beginning with the distinguished conquest of England by the Spaniards, which the greater majority of the comparatively small English ships resulted in a victory which led to the beginning of the grand sweep of a true class power, the speaker drew an interesting parallel as between this early naval engagement and the growing tendency among the nations of the world to turn to the sea as a means of advance and defense.

COURT DECREE SOUGHT AN PROPERTY DESCENT

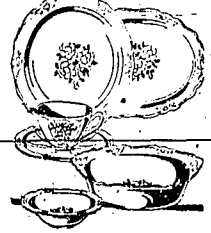
