

GOVERNMENT PROBE OF MURDER CONSPIRACY

Gangland Under Suspicion in Assassination of Walter Liggett

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 12 (AP)—A tell-tale pellet of death—a sub-machine gun bullet—swung suspicion back to gangland today in the Walter Liggett assassination.

The governor and attorney general completed the plot direct to U. S. Attorney General Cummings.

Forensic added he was hampered by circumstances and conditions in the city Cummings a year ago turned in a poison report.

In Washington, Forensic sent one of the five bullets that mowed Liggett down before the eyes of his widow and daughter Monday night. Two members of his department said it was fired from a sub-machine gun.

Expectations Consideration Pointing out that use of possession of machine gun is a federal offense, Forensic said if Washington tests also found the pellet to be machine gun ammunition, consideration for his request for "O" man's assistance.

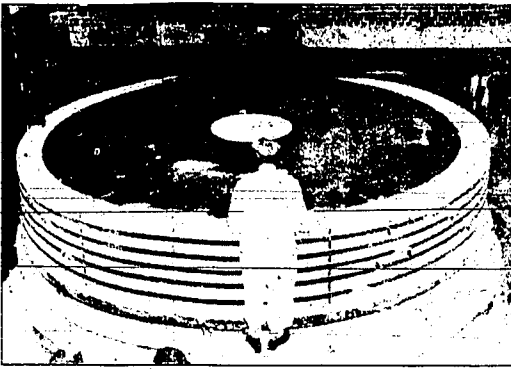
Previously, Judge Burnett had sentenced her to the women's prison at Tetchupapi, but today he said that was to give her "a good scare."

Dr. Alexis Carrel Foresees Suspension of Human Life

Veritable. An example of reversible death is a man slung through the heart. Circulation and respiration stop. The man is legally dead. However he is not hopelessly dead. If proper treatment were applied he would resuscitate. All his organs, even his brain are still alive.

A few minutes later comes the reversible death. At this stage resuscitation is no longer possible because of disintegration of the brain and the spinal centers.

Even after irreversible death has taken place, he said, the organs almost entirely alive. The organs almost tissues begin to die, each in its turn.

Spiritualists' Claims

Dr. Carrel refuted the claim of spiritualists that survival of the soul has been demonstrated and the principal points in favor of this claim.

"The importance of the facts on which such speculations are based cannot be denied," he said, "but the interpretation of the experimental results seem to be incorrect. The spiritualist neglects the fact of the existence of clairvoyance."

"Nevertheless, we know positively that clairvoyants are capable of perceiving past and future events. Therefore it is not possible to make a distinction between the survival of a psychic principle and a phenomenon of clairvoyance."

"There is no scientific proof, at the present time, of the survival after death of the mind, but in one way it is possible to say that such survival is impossible.

"It is far from being unreasonable to believe that some part of humanity may be able to say that such survival is possible."

"Can we progress further?" he asked. "Perhaps, if we learn more about the mechanism of life that brings about death. The problem can be attacked in different ways."

"The first one consists of analyzing the conditions responsible for the aging tissues."

"A second manner of approach is the search for the physical factors that determine will be brought within the reach of medicine."

Death Retarded Latent Life

These he explained as hereditary diet and mode of living, the latter two already in early stages of practice.

"Death could also be retarded," he said, "by a rejuvenation operation. Through this operation the subject would be carried back to a previous stage of his life."

Dr. Carrel cited the rejuvenation operation of Blechnow, in Brazil, of a diet, and Voronoff's in transplanting chimpanzee glands and said:

"The problem of rejuvenation is far more complex. It cannot be solved in this simple manner. Old age is due to simultaneous alterations of the tissues and the humor, and not to the deficiency of a single gland."

"If an old man were given the yoduric glands of a still-born infant, and his serum replaced frequently by a synthetic serum of proper composition, he would probably be rejuvenated."

"It is not impossible that, in the course of the next two or three centuries, rejuvenating procedures will be developed."

CANADIAN TARIFF DEFENDED BY HULL

Secretary Assures Western Cattlemen Stand to Win Under Pact

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Moving to defend the Canadian tariff which was against the protests of the western cattlemen, Secretary Hull maintained today that the controversy between the livestock industry and the American duty on Canadian cattle.

The secretary of state made this statement in a letter written to Benjamin C. Johnson, secretary of the National Cattlemen's Association, in which he explained in detail the reasons for the tariff on Canadian cattle.

The secretary said that the tariff on Canadian cattle was not a protectionist tariff, but a tariff designed to protect the American cattle industry from the competition of the Canadian industry.

DEATH SEPARATES FAMOUS BROTHERS

M. J. Van Sweringen, Railroad Empire Builder, Succumbs

CLEVELAND, Dec. 13 (AP)—Death dissolved a partnership today, which carried the brothers Van Sweringen from the obscurity of rural Ohio to the nation's largest private railroad operators.

Martin James Van Sweringen, 54, the younger, succumbed to influenza and hypertensive myocarditis, an inflammation of the muscular portion of the heart wall.

His physicians announced influenza was a contributing factor, induced by "general exhaustion and mental and emotional strain" traceable to the tumultuous financial affairs of Van Sweringen interests subsequent to the 1929 market collapse.

Oris Paxton Van Sweringen kept vigil in the lonely hours before dawn beside his brother's body in Lakeside hospital before his death at 7:15 a. m.

Face World Together

As they faced the world and won a nation's recognition, the brothers waited the advent of death — together.

In keeping with a characteristic modesty funeral services Saturday at the brothers' secluded home will be private.

Van Sweringen was born July 8, 1881, at Wooster, Ohio. Oris was 7 years older.

The inseparable brothers developed exclusive suburban Shaker Heights, the scene of their boyhood after having failed in a previous venture.

Their first venture into transportation was the purchase of a rapid transit line to serve Shaker Heights residents.

In quick succession they acquired the New York, Chicago and St. Louis railroad, the Toledo and Western, the Lake Erie and Western, the Detroit-Toledo shore line, the Chesapeake and Ohio, the Pere Marquette, the Hocking Valley, the Wheeling and Lake Erie and, finally, the Missouri Pacific and its subsidiaries.

Neither married.

Share Home With Sisters

They shared a town house and a country home with their sisters, Edith and Carrie.

Neither a hobby.

Acquaintances assert it was traditional that all business matters however trivial were settled by conference between them.

Their unobtrusive personalities won the confidence of Wall street's most powerful financiers.

After the collapse of the market in 1929 and the subsequent turning over by the Van Sweringens of a large part of their assets to New York bankers in an effort to keep their empire intact they were told by these financial interests to continue active operations of their widespread dynasty.

Testing was done by Victor Dupuis, official tester. There were 21 herds tested and of the 318 cows, 233 were milking and 45 dry. There were 205,661 pounds of milk produced in the association and 92223 pounds of butterfat. Average milk production, including dry cows, was 344 pounds and average butterfat percentage, including dry cows, was 35.2. Sixty-four cows produced 60 pounds or more of fat.

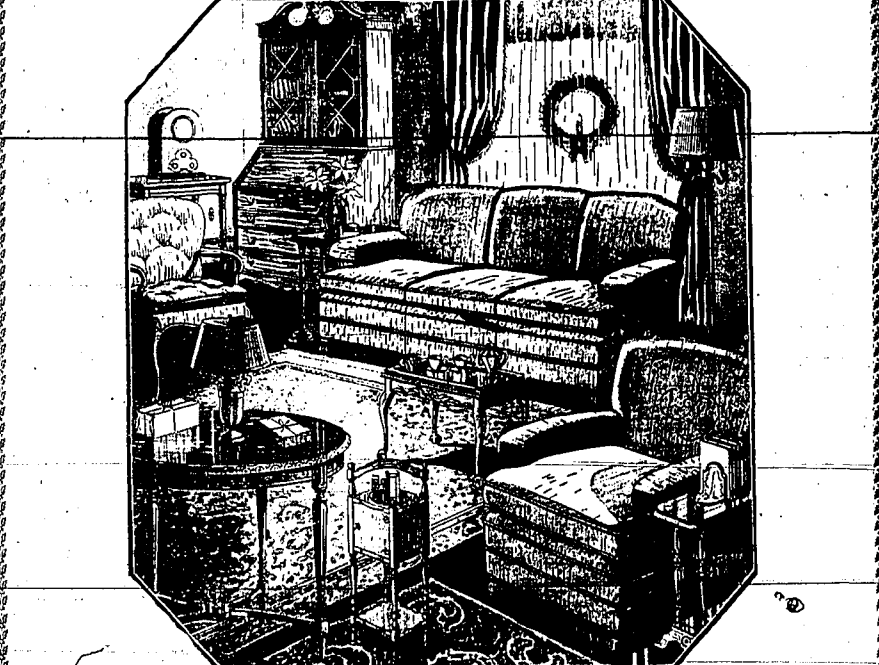

U. S. CONTINUES SILVER PURCHASES

Morgenthau's Announcement of Scattered Buying Upsets Market

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—A calmly delivered announcement by Secretary Morgenthau that the treasury was still buying silver, but contrary to precedent, was making its purchases in scattered trading centers, today threw the silver market into renewed confusion.

While brokers sought to gauge the government's intentions, the price dropped again in London and New York, but, to the surprise of some, rose in Montreal, at present America's principal unrestricted market for the metal.

Morgenthau's statement followed two days of general demoralization of the silver market, in which brokers found it difficult to specify a price, so few were the offers to buy. A general report was that the treasury, formerly a regular purchaser of large quantities, was not buying any more.

Scotches Rumor This rumor Morgenthau was at pains to scotch today. He received representatives of the press and weekly press conference and was ready with his answer to the first question fired at him.

"I have a statement on that," Morgenthau replied smiling and at once, "I am continuing to carry out the mandate of the silver purchase act which says: 'The secretary of the treasury is authorized and directed to purchase silver at home or abroad for present or future delivery with any direct obligation, coin, or currency of the United States authorized by law, or with any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.'"

Starks Departure "Now get this—at such rates and at such times and upon such terms and conditions as he may deem reasonable and most advantageous to the public interest."

"I have bought silver every day this week—on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in many different places."

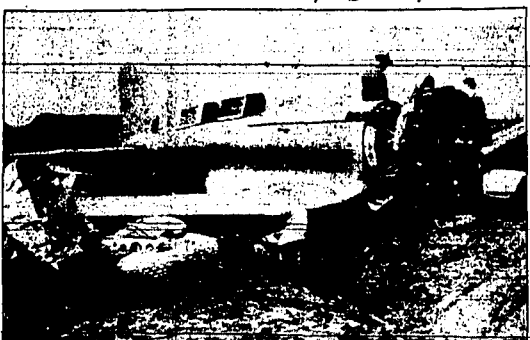
This, he concluded, marked a departure from past practice. He would not say what markets had been utilized.

The secretary's seeming uncertainty was obvious from his manner. Close before when the price of silver was falling, the treasury was at some distance from the market and the speculation intense. There was at least a hint today that the same attitude might have been followed in the operations of recent days.

It was suggested, too, that when purchases are made in London, the brokers, by a process of stimulation and deduction, determine with fair accuracy how much the treasury has been buying and then check to see that the intentions of the silver market's principal customer.

First Figures For the first three since the silver buying began, nearly two years ago, the treasury today completed its purchases at its acquisitions. These showed a total of 791,714,000 ounces, bought at varying prices, supposedly ranging from 52 cents to 72 cents. The coinage value of silver is 52 cents an ounce.

Idaho Assumes Responsibility for Care of IERA 'Unemployables'

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Peter Cohn, assistant administrator of the Idaho cooperative agency for public relief, announced tonight that there are approximately 14,740 persons on the relief rolls of the organization.

The agency on December 7 took up the unfinished work of the Idaho emergency relief administration. Among the 14,740 persons are 200 Indians, Cohn said.

"These unemployables will be given financial assistance in so far as possible from a fund which will include \$200,000 in loans from the IERA administration, \$100,000 monthly from the sales tax and contributions from the cities and counties," Cohn said.

The federal surplus commodity corporation, under the direction of W. W. Godfrey, will provide food. Headline Extended

The agency is responsible only for IERA "unemployables" who work progress administration is providing work at "autonomous" shops for "unemployables" who formerly were on the IERA rolls.

Cohn warned today that claims against the IERA that have not yet been presented to him for payment must be turned in "within the next week."

Originally, Governor Ross, administrator of the agency, filed December 10 as the deadline for submission of such claims, but the time has been advanced.

"We have cut the administrative personnel to approximately 140 persons and the unemployment office in connection with these claims is taken care of, about January 1, we hope to cut the staff to less than 100," Cohn said.

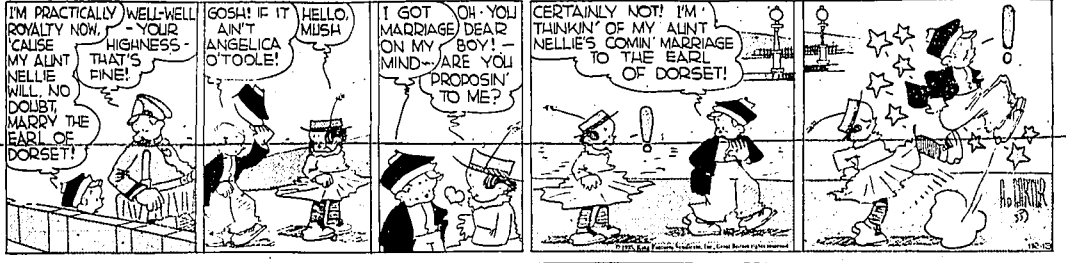

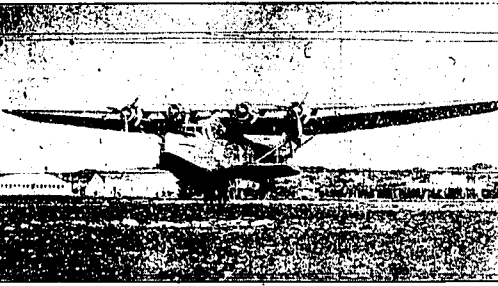
