(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Six Herbert Hoovers from whom to choose a Republican presidential candidate and a Harry Hopkins who took over control of the tides from the moon were paraded before President Roosevelt and a distinguished group of guests tonight by the Gridiron club.

In the semi-annual dinner of the famed dining club, Washington newspaper correspondents whittled news events into good humored banter which they flung with imperial hand at those who hold the reins of the nation.

Most of those who figured in the pointed drama and song were present to see themselves marched across the stage. From the scene the program emanated a report that President Roosevelt and Norman Thomas had been invited to appear at gridiron dinners.

Norman Thomas, socialist's 1932 candidate for the presidency and already talked of as the 1934 nominee, had been invited to speak also and had accepted the invitation. There was some surprise when he failed to put an appearance.

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PLANS CONSIDERED FOR CONSOLIDATING TWO IDAHO SCHOOLS

Presbyterians, Take Lead for Merger of Colleges at Gooding and Caldwell; No Official Action Taken

(By The Associated Press) PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 14.—Rev. William L. Young, a member of the college board of education of the Presbyterian church, said today plans were being considered for the consolidation of the College of Idaho and Gooding college.

Young, who returned here from a visit to the colleges, said no definite steps for the consolidation had been taken but the plan has been considered for two years.

Discussed at Gooding GOODING, Dec. 14.—Rev. William C. Bonham, secretary to the board of trustees of Gooding college, tonight took part in a discussion of a proposal for a consolidation of College of Idaho and Gooding college at a meeting last Thursday evening, but no action has been taken either for or against the proposal.

There is a bare possibility that some further action has been taken between the Methodist and Presbyterian college boards, but the matter has never been discussed in detail at a meeting of our local board, Rev. Bonham said.

He said that to his knowledge Rev. William L. Young, member of the college board of education of the Presbyterian church, Philadelphia, has never visited Gooding college.

KEY WITNESS IN MURDER VANISHES

Police Voice 'Fears for Life of Mysterious Figure in Liggett Slaying

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 14.—Fears for the life of a mysterious key witness in the Walter Liggett assassination were expressed today by police. The witness is believed to be a man who sought unsuccessfully to locate a man they believe can identify the publisher's killer.

Without identifying the man, investigators said they have learned he stood in the alley as the assassin fired his shot. He narrowly escaped being run down, managing to dodge into a front house doorway as the car braked past.

See Assassins The vehicle was moving slowly at the time and the man believed to be key witness in the case got a good look at the occupants. Witnesses said they were convinced members of the assassin's gang would attempt to locate the man unless law enforcement authorities could reach him first and place him in custody.

Division of this new witness in the case came about through William Hartman, caretaker of an apartment that that occupied by the assassin.

Hartman said the missing man, believed to have intentionally disappeared to prevent being drawn into the case, rushed into his office immediately after the shooting and telephoned him, then left Hartman's office to find the man again in a nearby building.

MAJOR A GUARDIAN DEFENDS PRESENCE AT ITALIAN RALLY

Madison-Garden Roars With Shouts of 'Duce' During Red Cross Meeting; Anti-Fascists Gather Outside

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—While anti-Fascists attempted demonstrations outside, 20,000 persons jammed Madison Square Garden tonight for an Italian Red Cross rally at which Mayor F. W. La Guardia and Supreme Court Justice Ferdinand Pecora defended their presence.

This is not the first meeting of the kind that has been attended for a purpose of mercy; the mayor said when he was called to the platform. "You are justified in your purpose in taking care of the needy."

Delegation Protest He had not been scheduled to speak at the rally, but a delegation headed by Norman Thomas, Socialist leader, had insisted that he be present, which was interpreted as endorsing the Italian military campaign.

Giuseppe Pece, publisher of an Italian language newspaper, announced \$50,000 had been raised for the Italian Red Cross. The Garden roared with shouts of "Duce, Italy, Duce."

Nearly 2,000 anti-Fascists, charged on the way in, were dispersed by Broadway traffic. They chanted "No Fascism!" and "Internationalism," and booed Pece and Mussolini.

Some police were forced to use their clubs in dispersing the anti-Fascists. One man was arrested. Pecora criticized the League of Nations as a "disaster" and "horror" and said it is a "condition and not a theory" which confronts Italy today.

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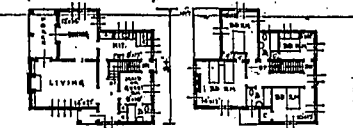

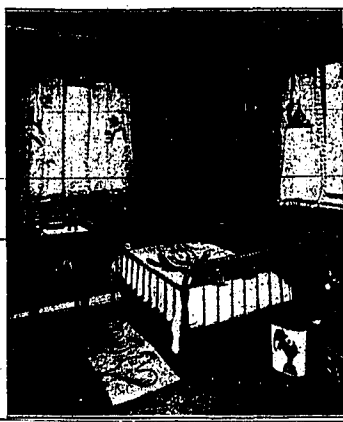
BURL CHAMBER SEEKS WPA CLEARING HOUSE

EIGHT NATIONS TO DEFAULT WAR DEBT

Only Finland Among 12 Creditors, Promises to Remit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Eight nations tonight had announced formally an intention to default on their semi-annual war debt payment to the United States, and ten others and three others were expected to follow.

Of the 12 governments whose installment, totaling \$95,414,177.64, matured at 12:01 p. m. this morning, no given notice that it will remit. All the rest have been continuously in default since June 1924.

France, Italy, Poland, Rumania, Czechoslovakia and Hungary today notified Secretary Hull through their envoys here that they were unable to meet their current payments of those already in arrears.

Great Britain and Lithuania previously had served similar notice.

There to be heard from. This left only Belgium, Estonia and Latvia still to be heard from, but there was no expectation in official quarters that they would pay.

Most of the formal diplomatic replies to the regular American reminders of arrears due were transmitted to the state department by messenger, but Ambassador Andre Lohsbach personally delivered that of the French government.

It reiterated, in response to the customary American intimation, an intention to seek "as soon as circumstances permit," a settlement of its debt—but it added that it still found itself "unable to pay."

Poland which owes \$32,233,988.25 this month, made the briefest response thus far, stating it is negotiating not even signed by the charge d'affaires, Wladyslaw Sokolowski, that the Polish government was still not in a position to resume payment of the debt.

Carthage, Tunisia, called due at this time is \$9,588,149.73, called attention to previous notes in which it had stated its reasons for inability to pay and its desire to prevailing unsettled economic and financial conditions existing throughout the world do not warrant consistent and successful outcome of negotiations for revision of the settlement now.

France is second only to Great Britain as the largest European war debtor. Its December 15 installment, plus principal and interest in arrears since December, 1922, amounted to \$250,292,292.85.

Governor Ross attended a dinner in honor of E. C. Hanson, retiring superintendent of the Oregon Lumber Lino railroad, at the Hotel Ross here tonight.

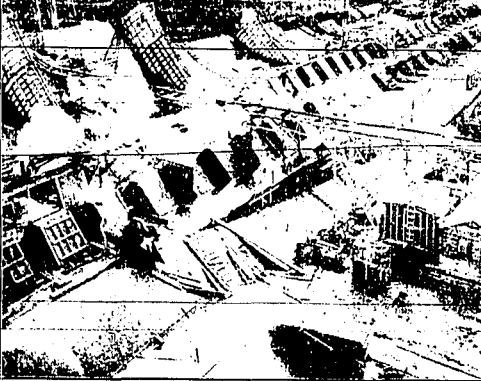

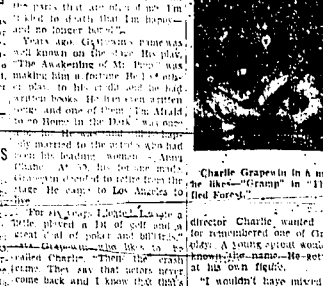

OPINION RESTRICTS INSANITY FINDINGS

Commitment Held No Determination of Right to Contract

DOISE, Dec. 14 (P)—Commitment of a person to a state hospital for insanity by an insanity commission does not constitute a judicial determination of his capacity or incapacity to contract, the Idaho supreme court held today.

The question was answered in an opinion written on the appeal of a Boiseville county case in which the ninth district court at Idaho Falls found for the defendants in an action brought by Robert W. Fleming against Heber Bihell and Eliza Bihell, his wife, to foreclose a \$1,500 mortgage on real estate.

Justice James P. Albright and District Judge John C. Rice of Caldwell, who sat for Justice Edwin M. Holden, concurred in Justice Dugan's opinion; Chief Justice Raymond L. Clevens concurred in part and Justice William M. Morgan dissented in part.

The court reversed the judgment of the lower tribunal and remanded the case for further proceedings.

Never Pronounced Cured

Bihell was committed to the state hospital for insane at Blackfoot at Blackfoot July 22, 1921, and was paroled in October 1921. He returned to the institution Dec. 14, 1923, and was released again Feb. 13, 1924, and remained out for some years, during which he executed the note and mortgage in question. He was never released with a pronouncement that he was cured, his commitment was ordered by the Bonneville county probate judge and a physician, who served as an insanity commission in accordance with Idaho law.

The lower court determined that the commitment constituted a judicial determination of Bihell's incapacity to contract, and the appeal was taken by the Bihells from that judgment.

It was pointed out by attorneys that under Idaho law contracts of persons made at the time of the making generally are regarded as void except those entered for necessities of life.

Evidence presented when litigation was started over the mortgage indicated that Bihell was mentally rational for long periods.
