

Ex-President Urges New Relief Set-Up For Clean Election

Hoover Demands Decentralized Organization Based On 'Voluntary Spirit Of Human Service'

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 16.—Herbert Hoover, in a caustic indictment of the new deal, demanded tonight the removal of relief into a decentralized set-up based on "the voluntary spirit of human service."

In an atmosphere of a national political convention the former Republican president proposed in an address to the members of the John Marshall Republican club and their men and women guests in a hotel banquet room bedecked with American flags and Christmas decorations, a 4-fold plan to decentralize relief work.

Crowd stands and cheers. An orchestra played "California Here I Come" and the crowd stood and cheered as Mrs. Hoover introduced as the "most distinguished leader of our party" began his speech.

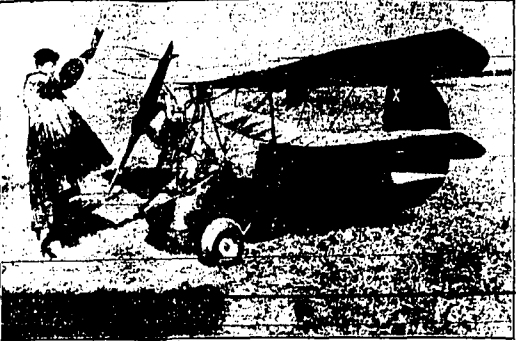

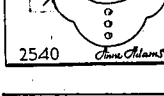

BOISE, Dec. 16 (AP)—Idaho is in line to receive \$15,000 to \$20,000 annually from the United States public health service for use in setting up and maintaining a certified public health organization, Dr. P. T. Poard of San Francisco, regional consultant on field activities of the service, announced tonight.

Dr. Poard made his statement after a conference this afternoon with Lewis Williams, state commissioner of health, and Dr. B. D. DeWitt, medical advisor to Mr. Williams; W. V. Leonard, department chemist and sanitary engineer, and L. Peterson, department bacteriologist.

The public health service activities in Idaho have been stimulated by the appointment recently of Dr. Poard as a full-time public health expert, Dr. Poard explained, and we plan to give Idaho all the breaks possible in assisting in promoting its program.

COURT ORDERED TO ENJOIN BROADCAST

Federal Jurist Calls Theft of News by Radio Unfair Competition

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 16 (AP)—The federal court at Seattle was ordered by the Ninth circuit court of appeals to enjoin radio station KVO5 of Beaufort, Washington, from pirating news gathered by The Associated Press.

In an opinion written by Judge William Dorman, the circuit court declared the theft of such news and its broadcast by the radio station in advertising programs was unfair competition.

The district court at Seattle originally had denied The Associated Press an injunction. It had sought to end the practice.

Newspapers of the Pacific Northwest, the decision declared, "are unconsciously injured in performing a public function as well as in conducting a legitimate business" by the taking of news.

Because it is free

The opinion pointed out that consideration would be given to the likelihood of KVO5's auditors "containing the public function" and it is free and does not require subscriptions for a newspaper.

"KVO5 lays great stress on the 'public interest' in news gathering and distribution," the opinion said, "and the public obligation of the publisher and distributor of newspapers. The Associated Press. We believe these considerations have been properly pressed upon us. The first question of the federal constitution has recognized the public function of the press in the provision for its freedom.

"While no constitutional right is here involved, this constitutional recognition emphasized the exceptional character of the right which is sought to be protected in a federal court sitting in equity.

Freedom of the Press

"When the constitution speaks of the freedom of the press, it refers to the freedom of private and non-governmental persons or bodies, engaged in news gathering and dissemination, from interference by governmental agencies. It is not to be construed as a license to say that the public function in the gathering and dissemination of news is presumed by the constitution to be in private hands.

"Under our capitalistic system, this means that news distribution as a public function will be largely left to business men acting under the impulsion of the profit motive.

"The public, therefore, has an interest in protecting the business of news gathering and disseminating against the impairment of its efficiency by the inevitable result of their business income being diverted to the misappropriation of the proceeds of the enterprise of the time during which the supreme court has held there exists in it a 'quasi public' interest.

"It is therefore proper to say The Associated Press is seeking protection not only of its legitimate business but also as both parties assist in its discharge of a public function of fundamental value and importance."

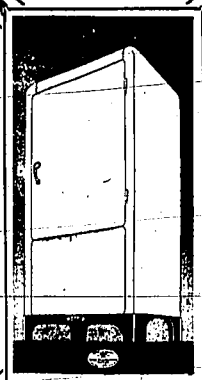

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DATE ASSIGNED TO VAN VLACK'S TRIAL IN DISTRICT COURT

Triple Slayer Suspect Enters Plea of Not Guilty to Charge of Murder of State Traffic Patrolman

Douglas Van Vlack of Tacoma, 31-year-old alleged triple slayer, will go on trial in the district court here next January 20 on a first degree murder charge in connection with the slaying of Fontaine Cooper, state traffic officer, according to a tentative setting that District Judge Adam B. Barclay announced in the district court here yesterday after Van Vlack entered his plea of not guilty to the charge.

Following brief proceedings in the court yesterday, Mr. Larson said that the defense counsel was still considering the advisability of asking for a change of venue to remove the trial to another county, and had not yet reached a definite conclusion in that regard. Van Vlack is charged with the murder of the state traffic officer, and is accused also of the slaying of Harry Sheriff, Henry C. and of Van Vlack's former wife, Mildred Hook of Tacoma. The two officers, Cooper and Oliver, were shot and fatally wounded near Twin Falls November 25 when they halted Van Vlack and his former wife when he was alleged to have abducted her from Tacoma. Four days later her body was found, the head crushed and drilled with a bullet, in a railroad cutting south of Twin Falls, within a few miles of where Van Vlack surrendered to police the day after the shooting of the officers.

Crowd on Hand Van Vlack's second appearance in the district court soon drew a hand-picked crowd of spectators smaller than the one assembled last Friday when he was arraigned on the murder charge, and took time to enter the courtroom approximately 50 persons, including a few women, were in the courtroom when Van Vlack was taken from his solitary jail cell and ordered above to enter his plea to the charge.

He stood again facing the court, his back to the spectators, while Judge Barclay reviewed the accusations and the information that had been filed by prosecuting Attorney Edward Babcock.

His voice was low and husky as he answered the judge's question: "Are you guilty or not guilty?"

His attorney who previously had suggested the possibility of attacking the prosecutor's information with the view to discovery of error that would give Van Vlack "an other chance," offered no objection to the form of the accusation yesterday, but confined his remarks to requests for continuance of the trial beyond the present court term. Judge Barclay expressed doubt of the court's authority to set the trial on the current term, and directed that previous appointments would delay the trial in this case to December 20 if it were held during the present term.

Well-Known Orchardist and County's First Auditor Succumbs

Harry T. West, 71, prominent pioneer orchardist of the Twin Falls tract, and resident of Kimberly since 1923, died suddenly Sunday at the Twin Falls county general hospital following a brief illness. When the Twin Falls county was created in 1923 he was appointed chief of the court, auditor and recorder. For a number of years he was closely associated with Senator W. E. Horn and Frank Martin, and other state political leaders.

For the past 20 years he had devoted most of his time to the operation of his extensive prune orchard. Mr. West was born May 26, 1864, in Aurora, Illinois. He was coming to Twin Falls, he was a resident of Ada county and served there six county clerk for several years. He was one of the first directors of the Twin Falls Canal association, which later became the Twin Falls Canal company.

Funeral date set Funeral services for Mr. West will be conducted this afternoon, at 2 o'clock at the White mortuary chapel, Rev. George O.
