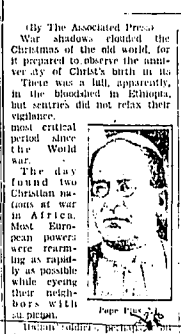

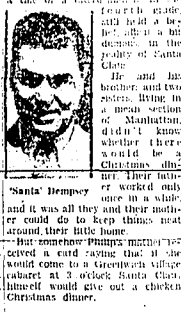

REFUGEES REPORT DEATH IN RIOTING

Late President's Widow One of Fugitives From Venezuela

WILLEMSTAD, Curacao, Dutch West India, Dec. 24 (AP)—Scores of Venezuelan refugees, arriving here aboard a Venezuelan warship, reported tonight the death of about 150 persons in Maracaibo and other lake ports as the result of disorders following upon the death last week of the dictator-president, Juan Vicente Gomez.

They said about 100,000 Venezuelans and sailors were burned or plundered in Maracaibo and that there were similar disorders in Caracas. The government was said, however, to have the situation fairly well in hand.

Among the 97 refugees were the late president's widow, his sons, Juan and Florencio; a brother, Manuel; former Governor Velasco of Caracas; and about fifty small children.

The warship was plied at their disposal by the provisional president, General Ecuador Lopez Cordero, to enable them to leave their country in safety.

The refugees confirmed the slaying of General Estanislao Gomez, cousin of the late dictator. They said there was street fighting in Caracas and several buildings were plundered and burned.

Those from Maracaibo said the police chief was in hiding.

Friction between the police and the army was reported, the police favoring the old regime and the army, the new.

NEW YORK (AP)—John Regan is a "forgotten man" 11 months of the year, but today he is royally receiving homage from thousands of children in his tinseled toy realm.

For John Regan is Santa Claus from November 23 to December 25. This is his sixth year as the stellar attraction of the Christmas season at one of New York's larger department stores.

Carries Beard Under Arm

When he comes to work, he carries under his arm a long white beard wrapped in tissue paper. One little girl sat in his lap and whispered: "I don't believe in Santa Claus, but I like to come and see you. He gave her a kiss."

'Slices Up' Parents

The work has made Regan "whiskered." He likes to "slice up" the parents, will not shake hands with little tykes whose hands are dirty—"It's only fair to the others," he explains—and has learned to catch the signals of anxious fathers and mothers regarding what they can afford to give.

"Every parent thinks his or her child is the only one in the world," he says. "And they 'stick around,' forgetting there are others who have come to see me."

It's hard work, too, shaking hands all day, talking every minute, chucking children under the chin, and handing out the little book which is a free gift of the store. 
Actor Since He Was Two


On December 23, when he takes off his whiskers and calls it a year, he goes home to his wife for his own holiday.

The Regans have no children.



MARSHALL, Mo. (AP)—Santa Claus lives here on the edge of town and "down the road a piece" where he gets muddy. He lives in a frail, blue, three-room house full of children, laughter and prayer.

"Yes, Mr. I'm Santa Claus," he acknowledged, seating himself on the colored squares of the bed quilt in the lamplit front room. "I'm a plumber and a pastor."

"I could never find out why my father named me Santa—but it's a good name, even if it is a lot of trouble."

Santa had no desire to hand down his name to any of his nine children. Six of them were in the room; two had died. Santa made a sweeping motion.

Get Lots of Mail

"I've got a house full," he said, "but it's home. They're all good kids, and if we don't have toys and turkey we get lots of mail and fun out of Christmas."

This Santa hasn't any ermine-trimmed knicker suit of red velvet in his wardrobe. He has blue eyes, but his crown and ruddy cheeks sprout no snowing snowy locks. He hasn't scale humpsteers or pluck down chininess, but he might tackle a flue on order. He's a plumber with a big heart, a big family, a small house and a small income.

From a corner he dragged out a cardboard carton holding several hundred envelopes.

"I couldn't answer these last year. I didn't have time, and then it takes a sight of stamps. I was receiving about 90 letters a day and answering about 35."

But Never Any Money

Mostly they are children's letters. A young woman in Holland sent an elaborate greeting with some ink drawings. A little girl in Mexico wanted a token. Sometimes Santa gets a tie or handkerchief, but never any money.

"If the stamps hold out, I'm going to answer all of them this year," Santa said. He laid out checks on "the Bank of Happiness" which he slips with the abandon of a rapist.

"Got to live up to my name, I guess. Santa Claus' initials are the same as Spirit of Christ—the spirit of giving, of cheer."

It's hard for Santa to cash a real check where he isn't known. And one Christmas an express agent refused to deliver a box of fruit which a California relative had addressed to Santa Claus.

Christmas at Santa's

A guitar twanged in the kitchen. "That's the boy who socks in the oat mixture," Santa explained. "He's just plain" it out.

What about Christmas in Santa's home? "The kids will get some candy, and we'll have church service and sing hymns," he said. An old organ stood across the room from the coal stove.

Mrs. Claus said supper was getting cold.

A Christmas message? Sure. "Tell 'em Merry-Christmas and God Bless 'em," Santa smiled. Then he went into the kitchen to eat his beans and potatoes.

APPEAL TO HATRED CHARGED TO F. D. R.

Liberty League Executive Comments on Campaign Opener

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (AP)—Zouet Shouse, president of the American Liberty League, has just charged that President Roosevelt's recent Atlanta, Georgia, home-coming speech was "apparently designed" to arouse class hatred.

In a radio address, Shouse said: "At Atlanta, Georgia, on November 20th last, President Roosevelt made the opening speech of his campaign for re-nomination and reelection. The speech will be notable in history—*not* because it was a brilliant defense of the administration, not because it refuted the arguments of the president's critics.

"It was notable because it was apparently designed to create class prejudices, to arouse class hatreds, to fan the flame of class antagonisms. Insofar as I am aware, no other president of the United States ever resorted to such methods in the attempt to further his political fortunes."

Damned By Impatience

Shouse said that ten days later the president, speaking before the American farm bureau federation at Chicago, asserted he and his associates "are the only people who are looking toward the destruction of class antagonism and malice," and, by inference at least, that those who oppose the Socialistic policies, the impossible experiments, the gigantic waste, the huge bureaucracy of his administration are guilty of arraying class against class.

The Liberty League president said also Mr. Roosevelt lined his Chicago speech so as to coincide with the opening of arguments in the supreme court on the constitutionality of the agricultural adjustment act and "put behind this measure all of the power of the presidential office."

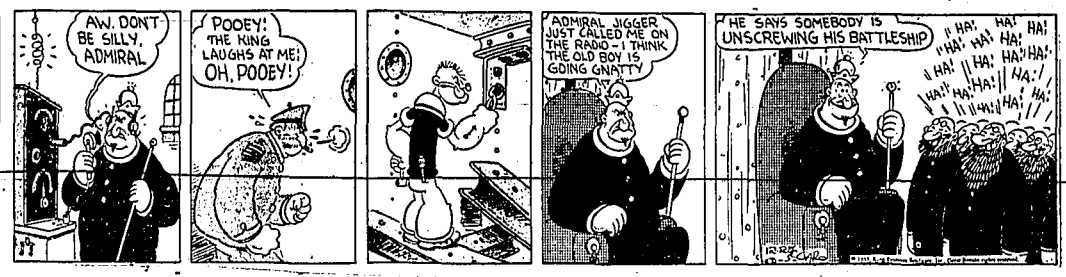

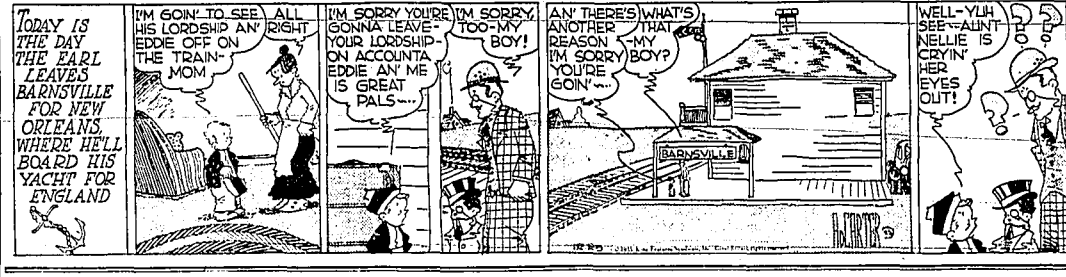

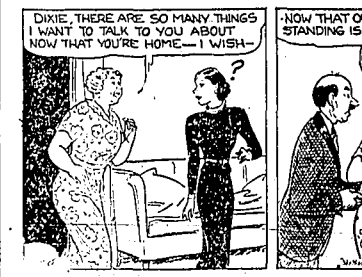

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MERRY CHRISTMAS
The Christmas Season comes and goes and down through the years of history men in Christian countries everywhere have paused in the shifting occupations of the day's work to partake in greater or lesser degree of the spirit which surrounds this greatest of all Christian festivals.

Christmas is largely a children's day. The pretty conceit of the Christmas Tree, the mystery, enfolding the legendary figure of the Santa Claus and the time honored custom of hanging up the Christmas stocking have all contributed to make Christmas an occasion for childish happiness and joy. And so Christmas is associated with the merry laughter of children while their elders bask in the reflected happiness of the hour.

And if Christmas shall be that and nothing more who shall say that its best and highest traditions have not been fulfilled? But it is more than that. It is a day of friendliness and cheer and happy thoughts. An unselfish day when men seek happiness by making others happy. A day when peace and harmony are in ascendancy and the good in mankind stands out prominently. This too is of the spirit of Christmas.

In Christian lands the world over the celebration of Christmas will take place today and the minds of men will be strengthened and refreshed thereby. This is among the biggest and best of all the manifold blessings and benefits of the Christmas.

EMPLOYMENT SECURITY
A new form of economic security for wage-earners is reported by the General Electric Company. About five thousand employees in an Ohio incandescent lamp plant have been guaranteed at least twelve hundred hours of work or pay for next year.

This is better than the usual form of unemployment insurance, because it is done voluntarily by the employing company itself, and because it is a positive measure, trying to keep workers profitably busy instead of merely compensating them when they lose their jobs.

Here is an interesting angle to it. The General Electric announcement says: "Employees in New York are excluded from the benefits of this plan, because Ohio has made provision in its unemployment law, as have some other states, to grant tax reductions to employers who guarantee employment."

Such a state policy offers a shrewd inducement to private enterprise to establish such guarantees. The state doing this doubtless stands to gain in the long run.

STUDENT PATRIOTS
As the Japanese militarists slowly proved through their occupancy of North China they are opposed not by troops, but by students. This phase of the historic process now under way in eastern Asia must interest our own young people.

On December seventeenth there was a night of fierce rioting against Japanese aggression in the ancient city of Peking. (The first riots there may have occurred a million years ago, when the children of the "Peiping Man" were fighting over a marrow-bone, but let that pass.) Sixty student-patriots were wounded. The students forced postponement of the inaugural meeting of General Sung Chieh Yuan's semi-autonomous council for Hopeh and Chahar Provinces. The General declared wrathfully that he would expel two American-educated university professors.

Stories have come out of the jungles north of Brazil that a white man is living, captive, among the Indians there. He is said to be crippled, injured in the crash of his airplane in nineteen twenty seven. Is it Rueden?

There have been several attempts to locate him. Recently a new effort has begun. A single-engine flying boat, piloted by two Americans, is to make daily flights from the tiny village of Wanotoba, to search the region of the Dutch and British Guianas and northern Brazil. In the party are an Indian guide and the man who has financed the search.

There is plenty of material for tales of romance and adventure in this expedition and the mystery which has caused it. If Paul Rueden is found and restored to his own people, it will seem the accomplishment of a miracle. If he is not found, the belief in his existence in the jungle will become a living legend.

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OUTLOOK FAVORS SHEEP INDUSTRY

University Economists See Generally Auspicious Prospects

MOSCOW, Dec. 24 — Shepherds will find more favorable than unfavorable elements in the sheep outlook for 1939, according to the University of Idaho department of agricultural economics.

Supplies of slaughter lambs from now until May 1 are expected to be the smallest for several years. Little change is expected in sheep numbers in 7 to 8 flock states, while the upward tendency of numbers in the range states may be checked by the grazing policies of the Taylor grazing administration and the forest service. A point for shepherds to keep in mind is that lamb and mutton likely will meet stiff competition from an increased supply of other meats in 1939.

In the domestic wool trade, a small 1938 clip with an unusually heavy shrink combined with a high level of manufacturing activity to reduce wool stocks materially. The wool carryover into the 1939 season should be the smallest in years. Wool trading and manufacturing activities in Europe have improved considerably, aided by extension of restrictions on imports into Germany and Italy.

Not all in the wool picture is rosy, however. Preliminary estimates indicate that 1938 production in the Union of South Africa will be up about 17 per cent from the very low 1934 level. At the same time, United States wool consumption in 1938 probably will be smaller than in 1935, especially since inventories of woolen goods have been built up during the current year.

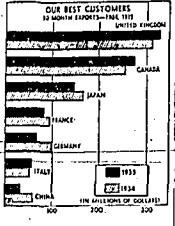
**NEW COMMERCIAL TREATIES
AND INCREASE IN IMPORTS
MARK FOREIGN TRADE YEAR**

By **FREDERICK GARDNER**
(Associated Press Financial Writer)

WASHINGTON (AP)—Efforts by the United States to clear foreign commerce channels of some of the barriers erected in recent years stand out in the 1935 trade record, rather than the flow of exports and imports.

World trade currents on the whole continued sluggish, although high tariffs multiplied exchange controls and import quotas, prolonged uncertainty over international currency stabilization and the slow climb out of depression in some countries.

From the standpoint of this country, the actual exchange of goods was dominated by a sharp increase in imports, both in farm products for home consumption and in raw materials entering into manufacturing expansion in exports of machinery, automobile products and other manufactured goods offset smaller farm exports. The total dollar value of exports, consequently, held an even keel compared with 1934.



Treaty With Canada

But trade experts found their chief source of inspiration in the signing of Secretary Hull and his "50-50" traders to negotiate reciprocal treaties on a wide scale. Their accomplishments for the year reached a high point in the announcement of a treaty with Canada, the United States' second best export market, after a change in the Canadian government and the intervention of President Roosevelt had speeded negotiations to conclusion.

Trade agreements previously had been completed with Cuba, Brazil, Belgium, Haiti, Sweden and Colombia.

War clouds and the use of economic sanctions against Italy by the League of Nations introduced dramatic elements into exchange of goods across the seas. The economic consequences late in the year were

still obscure, although some increase in war shipments was visible in trade figures.

Imports Expanded

With exports of cotton and other farm staples at the lowest levels in many years, the excess of exports over imports slumped greatly, compared with previous years. Seasonal expansion of exports in the autumn widened the margin a bit. But for the first 10 months, the excess of exports amounted to only \$96,707,000 against \$326,537,000 for the comparable 1934 period.

Imports for that period expanded to \$1,692,182,000 from \$1,571,787,000.

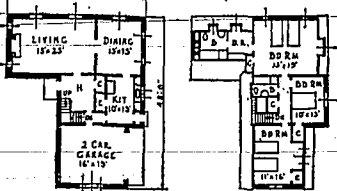
Building large in the background of the decline in farm exports, the unusual increase in farm imports and heavier purchases of raw materials, trade students saw effects of the 1934 drouth—which cut down supplies of some staples greatly and further industrial recovery at home.

Export gains were recorded mainly in trade with Latin America, Canada, Australia, South Africa and other leading producers of basic commodities whose purchasing power benefited from higher prices.

The United States provided many extra millions of dollar exchange for South American and other countries through purchases of silver and raw materials, including farm products. To these countries went mainly typical American manufactured goods—automobiles, farm machinery, electric refrigerators and other mechanical equipment.
