INTERNATIONAL DECENCY

There is such a thing, after all, as inter-national morality. This is the reassuring fact emerging from the British-French attempt to stop the African war by giving the aggres-sor the property of the wronged nation. It was as if two policemen, meeting a hold-

up man in the process of looting his victims, were to suggest a compromise by which the robber would take two-thirds of the victim's

robber would take two-thirds of the victim's money and depart in peace.

Such things have been done in the past, many a time. But apparently the world it really making progress in its collective notions of right and wrong. Not only was the League of Nations, as a whole, hotly indignant at this proposed betrayal of a small member, but even public opinion in England and Ernnes setured to a small member, but even public opinion in England

memoer, but even public opinion in England and France, reduced to sanction it. Sir Samuel Hoare, British foreign minis-ter who took the blame for engineering the shameful deal, was promptly kicked out, and Premier Baldwin, who in the recent election had an immense majority, only saved himsalf and his vovernment by an abject anology to Parliament. The British public raged against the Ethiopian sell-out, although it offered practical advantages for Britain, and the French public condemned it although French sympathics are normally with Italy

rather than Britain.

This is real progress toward international righteousness—which in the long run is common sense.

SUSPICIOUS OF BIGNESS

C. M. Chester, president of General Foods, urges large corporations to start an educational drive to acquaint the public with the contributions to social and economic growth of the nation made by such institutions. The need of such work was discovered by means of a questionnaire. Eight thousand persons, said to represent a cross section of the nation, answered these five questions:

1. Do you think wages paid by large com-

panies to their employees are too low? About right? Too high?

2. Do you think large companies' treat

ment of their employees is good? Bad? Only

ment of their employees is good: had om, so-se?

3. Da.you think the taxes puld by business are too high? About right? Too low?

4. Do you consider present government regulation of business about the right amount? Too much? Not enough?

5. Which do you think is best for the country—small businesses? Large corporations? Medium-sized firms? The answers showed a pretty general be-

The answers showed a pretty general not-lifet that large companies are not hitogether, good for the country. People are critical and suspicious of the big corporations. This at-titude may be unreasonable, but it is the nor-mal reaction to some of the events and revelations of the depression years. A campaign to reverse this opinion will have to be clearly honest and will need to prove that certain abuses of power by large corporations are being ended.




