Fascist Leaders Bomb American Field Hospital

Leaders Smooth Way For Quick Action On Neutrality And Bonus

White House Reports Most Messages Praise President's Address; Knox Offers Program

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Jan. 4—Congressional leaders smoothed the way today for quick action on two of their headline issues—neutrality and the bonus.

Actual opening of floor debate on both neutrality and bonus legislation within little more than a week appeared as a distinct possibility. Some leaders, in fact, predicted senate or house passage of one or both might be possible within that time.

The day passed, however, without any leading member of congress moving to accept the date flung by President Roosevelt in his message last night.

Senator Hastings of Delaware, chairman of the Republican National committee, announced the criticism of the executive's message, took some notice of the details.

It is true that the way is open, Hastings said, "but unfortunately the president's address to congress makes this suggestion an impossible one."

He suggested a seven-point program, including drastic cuts in federal expenditures, a balanced budget every year, a sound currency, and a new agricultural program under state aid.

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SENATE COMMITTEE PROMISES AID FOR NEUTRALITY MOVE

Munitions Quiz Counts On Disclosures in Questioning of Morgan, Lapham To Control War Trade

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Jan. 4—Senate munitions committee members led tonight upon their forthcoming investigation of J. P. Morgan and company to draw increased support for their stark neutrality legislation.

Senator Clark (D-Mo) predicted disclosures in the inquiry regarding Morgan will have the effect of bringing support for more mandatory control of loans and credits to belligerents.

An administrative leader mapped a quick pace for consideration of neutrality proposals already before congress. Clark and Chairman Morgan said the munitions group prepared to introduce their own bill Monday.

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DESTRUCTIVE GALE WREAKS HAVOC ON OREGON COASTLINE

Wrecked Homes, Uprooted Trees and Battered Highways Bear Testimony to Fury of Western Storm

(By The Associated Press) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 4—Wrecked homes, uprooted trees, battered highways and tide-swept streets bore testimony tonight to the fury of a storm which lashed out viciously along the Oregon coastline the past 24 hours.

The storm moderated tonight. Aftershocks throughout the state were a result of recent rains but damage appeared confined primarily to areas along the shore of the Pacific.

At Coos Bay mills closed when power lines were down. Estimated 10,000 trees were uprooted at state parks; a grove of redwoods was flooded and some were kept busy rescuing small fishing boats which broke away from the wharf.

A cottage was wrecked and others damaged at Sunset beach, logs and debris were scattered. The Coquille valley was flooded and some of the cattle washed and rowed over the stream.

At Fort Oregon Garrison lake, 300 yards from the shore, high waves carried intervening land. Mills forced to close.

An official, Rome communique said in Tripoli, Italy, that four of its occupants were killed. Ethiopia appealed formally to the league to send a commission to the war area to investigate and fix the responsibility for the atrocities, alleging Italy was preparing to violate all rules of international warfare.

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OPINION DIVIDED OVER EFFECT OF F. D. R.'S ADDRESS

President's Pronouncement Seen As Help and Hindrance to Peace Cause; Europe Studies Speech

(By The Associated Press) Capitals of the world after eagerly studying President Roosevelt's message to congress—Monday-Saturday—might have a profound effect upon the critical European African crisis—but there was a sharp divergence of opinion as to what the effect would be.

Officially neither Tokyo nor Rome would "fit this shoe to its foot"—the president's indictment of aggressor nations which have "retorted to the old belief in the law of the sword."

In all major capitals the words of the American leader were studied intently and were promptly played upon by informed sources in Rome to influence the Italian government.

Another held that if congress adopts neutrality legislation withholding shipments to Italy as a temporary measure, the government of nations would go ahead with an oil boycott.

ROUND-WORLD AIR TRAVEL PROMISED

Commercial Lines Mapping Direct Routes for Globe Trotter

CHICAGO, Jan. 4 (AP) — Round-the-world flights will descend from the adventures to the routine this year. Trilled-air lines announced today on completion of a survey of recent developments in international air travel.

The globe-trotter, who prefers wings, will be able to buy a single ticket which will take him from an American airport clear around mother earth and back to his starting point, perhaps as early as late next year.

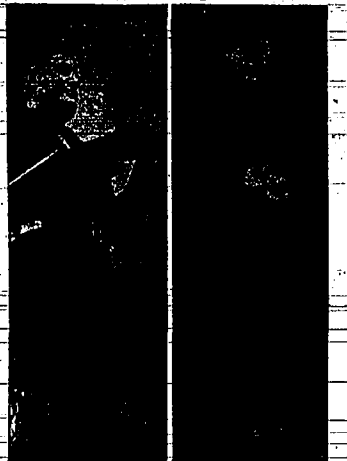
If the tentative agreements can be completed, it may be that the first commercial globe circuit by plane can start their flight sometime in April, near the twentieth anniversary of the first round-the-world air voyage.

It is possible at present to fly around the world on commercial lines via a circuitous route at a cost somewhat under \$300.

An air traveler can board for instance, a clipper plane at San Francisco for the Philippines trip to the Philippines; proceed by Royal Netherlands India, Air France or Japanese lines to Europe; continue to South America by German Lufthansa; and return to United States by way of Miami on Pan American lines.

Pan American and Imperial Airways are mapping out a more direct route from Europe to North America via Bermuda.

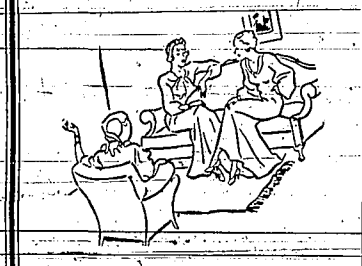

G. O. P. CONCLAVE GOES TO MOSCOW

R. P. Parry Announces Purpose to Retire At End of Term

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—The Republican state central committee named Moscow today as the place for the party's 1936 delegates convention. It was held in the city of Moscow, Idaho, and R. P. Parry, Twin Falls lawyer, announced that he will continue as committee chairman until next fall.

For weeks political gossip had it that Parry would resign early in 1936 on the grounds that he cannot spare enough time from his law practice to carry on a vigorous pro-Republican campaign.

In a brief address this afternoon he announced that he would not be a candidate for reelection to the chairmanship which he has held five years and urged that "anyone who is selected" be given the matter of selecting his successor at the party platform convention, which the committee decided will be in Pocatello August 27.

Woman in Line
 Mad. Parry's wife, Mrs. Beth Laubach of Boise, vice chairman of the committee, would have succeeded him.

"Masculine leadership, however, is preferred," leaders who objected to Parry said.

The meeting was attended by representatives from all counties except Butte, Bear Lake, Caribou, Clark, Fremont, Jefferson, Lemhi and Teton.

Maurice Green, young Boise attorney, the elected manager of the party's state headquarters, opened here three months ago.

County central committees will select delegates to the May 2 meeting.

Resides naming the state's eight representatives to the national convention in Cleveland, Ohio, June 9, the meeting at Moscow will elect a national committee and a national committee woman. The terms of Ezra Whitla of Coeur d'Alene and Mrs. Emma Glouck of Twin Falls, incumbents, expire in a few months.

Delegates Apportioned
 The number of delegates from each county for the Moscow convention is determined by law and ranges from 1 to 16.

The date of the platform convention is fixed by statute and those eligible to attend include nominees for state officers, for congress and the senate and those who are members of the state central committee and the chairman of the county central committees.

Italians Drop Explosives In Wide Ranging Flights Over Air-Raid Battlegrounds

Ten men were blown from their beds. German officers died. In the 23 Italian planes were killed and 13 wounded, a communiqué said, when the European invaders dropped 2000 bombs on the northern Italian sector south of Makale, today.

The Italian first major counter-offensive was a surprise attack on the night of Jan. 4, 1935, and is now under way in that area.

An unconfirmed report to the correspondent here of the Reuters (Christian) news agency said an Egyptian Red Crescent (Red Cross) ambulance was bombed at Daggah Bur.

The American hospital at Daggah Bur had been directed by Dr. Robert W. Hockman, American military physician, until he was killed December 13 when he picked up an exploded Italian bomb.

In a letter to relatives in Cambridge, O., written September 22, from Addis Ababa, Dr. Hockman said the unit "I am taking out to the front will consist of about seven laymen from missionary and other ranks and about 50 natives."

Swedish Victim

The Swedish victim Monday's bombing was Gunnar Lundström, a male nurse. His jaw was blown away and he died the day after the bombing.

(Public indignation in Sweden against the bombing was high and a police guard was placed about the Italian legation in Stockholm. The Swedish Red Cross asked the Italian legation to conduct a thorough investigation.)

Another Swede wounded in the raid, Dr. Fred Hylander, chief of the Red Cross unit, was brought here by airplane.

An "utterly deliberate act," was Dr. Hylander's description of the Italian bombardment.

Dr. Eric Smith, another wounded Swede, also was returned here.

"For several days before the bombing," said Dr. Hylander, "the Italian planes had machine-gunned all around the ambulance."

"The morning of the bombing, I was in the operating theater when a perfect tornado of bombs and machine gun bullets suddenly rained down on us."

"I had just time to see two lines of three planes each circling the ambulance when it was hit and I lost consciousness."

"When I opened my eyes again, it was to see the most terrible scene of carnage imaginable."

"Scores of dead, dying and wounded lay around me and the shrieks and groans of wounded men and the crackle of blazing tents. Our tent had 42 bullet holes in it."

"There was absolutely no excuse for the raid. The ambulance had been conspicuous prominently displayed, in accordance with the international convention."

"The 23 Italian planes killed were blown a distance of ten meters (about 33 feet) off their beds in our camp. It was an awful sight."

"There is no doubt the Italians intentionally attacked. Three days previously they flew over the camp. On the second day, they dropped a

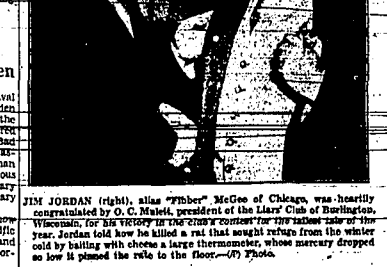
