

TRAVEL RESUMES OVER WELLS LINE

Stage and Train Service Restored Following Snow Blockade

Travel between Twin Falls and Wells, Nevada, was resumed Sunday following snow blockades that had continued for three days on the railroad and 10 days on the highway. An Oregon Short Line train carrying 17 passengers which left Wells arrived in Twin Falls shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday morning, and a southbound train over the Twin Falls-Wells line left here late Sunday afternoon.

Motor stage service which had been blocked for 10 days was resumed Sunday. Jack Perschall, owner of the stage line who was on the trip Sunday, said the road was in good condition, except for deep ruts in the toe north of the state line.


AFFIRMATIVE DEBATE TEAM WINS AT EDEN
