RANCHMEN WAR ON WILD HORSES

Oregon Court Asked to Approve Round-Up And Execution

MIDFORD, Ore., Feb. 23 (AP)—Ranchmen here called upon the law today to stamp out a band of roving wild horses which have trampled a path of destruction across southern Oregon's grazing lands.

The Jackson county court considered a request today to approve round-ups of the 75 to 100 animal outlaws for execution.

The beasts undoubtedly will be slaughtered for feed on commercial farms.

For 25 years the outlaw rovers have constituted a rangeland nuisance. They have trampled grazing lands, raised alfalfa fields, kicked young stock to death and destroyed all life.

"They are wilder than wild, and meaner than mean," Forest Ranger Leo Post said today. "Some of the six stallion leaders are fair specimens of horse flesh, but the majority are scraggy and unbranded, and are a menace to the stock."

The rangers and stockmen plan to build a long V-shaped chute, leading to a stockade. Into this, the vagabonds will be driven by cowboys and boys of the civilian conservation corps. Once corralled, the law prescribes that the horses be sold at public auction by the sheriff.
