LOCAL MAN USES GUN TO END LIFE

Officers Discover William George Dead at Residence Here

William George, about 60 years old, Twin Falls resident and farmer the past 20 years who was named as defendant in a divorce suit which his wife, Mrs. Katie Geort, started in the district court here "last" was found dead on a bed at his residence on Second avenue west when Sheriff R. F. Prater went there 46-seconds-sometime in the afternoon case late yesterday afternoon. George's head was drilled through with a bullet. A revolver with one exploded cartridge was found on the bed. Authorities said there was no question but that George had taken his own life. Mrs. George, with her daughter and son-in-law, drove up to the house shortly after officers found the body there.

DRAWN WILL
Earlier in the day, officers learned while Mrs. George consulted her attorney regarding the divorce action, George went to his lawyer and drew his will.

Mrs. George alleged cruelty and misconduct in her petition for divorce. The case was set for trial at North Platte, Nebraska, June 18, 1932, and were the parents of one son and two daughters, all married and living away from home. In her petition for divorce, Mrs. George listed as community property a 100-acre farm four miles south of Twin Falls, and the dwelling on Second avenue west, valuing the farm at \$30,000 and the house at \$3000. She asked \$200 a month temporary alimony.

Substantial Farmer
Mr. George was rated as one of the district's most substantial and progressive farmers. Throughout the period of his residence here he was interested in development of city property as well as of his farm lands. Prior to coming to Idaho he had engaged in livestock feeding on a large scale in Nebraska. Survivors besides the widow are one son, William B. George of American Falls, and two daughters, Mrs. Ray and Mrs. A. H. Thompson, both of Twin Falls. He leaves
