Violence Plays Part in Spreading Strikes

Representatives of Unions and Employers Indicate Little Progress Toward Settlement

Negotiations toward settlement of three big strikes Tuesday progressed virtually as laboriously as the thousands of New Yorkers taking long flights of steps about because of the elevator operators' walkout.

Spokenmen for both sides in the strike of Manhattan building service employees, meeting in the chambers of Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia, indicated little actual advance toward a settlement.

The hotel workers' union said employees of seven more hotels joined in the walkout adding 5,000 to 6,000 workers to the thousands already out.

Union headquarters announced 78,000 building service workers were out at company yards 71,000 in 3,849 buildings yesterday.

Each side accused the other of using violent tactics. The Metropolitan association of building owners, an emergency organization, announced it had negotiated an agreement with the union.

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MISSIONARIES TO CONQUER COMMUNIST ARMY

Grave Fears Aroused for Americans When Reds Sweep Into Shansi Province—Defenders Mobilize

SHANGHAI, March 3.—A Chinese communist army swept into Shansi province tonight and more than a score of American missionaries believed to be in the path of the invasion.

New Sino-Japanese complications also were threatened by the red advance from the southwest.

Chinese communists are reported to have captured the town of Taiyuan, capital of the province, by the aged warlord, Marshal Yen Hui-shan, and a virtual state of martial law reigned.

Some battalions of Shansi province troops already have been ambushed and wiped out by the reds, said advisers reaching Shanghai Tuesday.

The mission station there, comprising a hospital and several schools, is being guarded by Chinese-owned troops.

Marshal Yen Hai-shan was reported to have ordered his main force to meet the reds at the town of Taiyuan, 100 miles from the provincial capital.

GENEVA, March 3 (AP)—The League of Nations appealed to Italy and Ethiopia today to make peace, but optimism was noticeably absent among officials.

The sanctions committee of 18 will meet tomorrow to discuss the technical committee to proceed to draw up a detailed plan for enforcement.

The deck is to remain cleared for action and is loaded.

If Italy and Ethiopia refuse the overture for peace, the sanctions committee of 18 will meet March 11 to vote on an oil embargo and possibly other sanctions.

Great Britain Enters World Armament Race

Vast Program for Defense of Empire Centers About Air Force Expansion

LONDON, March 3.—Strengthening the existing dangers to peace, Great Britain joined the world armament race today by announcing a defense expansion program so vast and flexible that no attempt was made even to calculate its cost to the nation.

The program centered about expansion of the air force as "the most urgent and most important of our defense requirements in the present situation."

But far-reaching increases for the army and navy, together with plans for mobilizing the air force and production of munitions also were disclosed.

Warning to Nations

A white paper, or government report, issued after months of preparation, by cabinet committees, was interpreted in diplomatic quarters as furnishing a warning to Italy, Japan and Germany.

It has been unofficially estimated that around £300,000,000 (about \$1,500,000,000) would be required to meet new schemes over a 3-year period.

Much of the increase in regular expenditure due to royal air force expansion program.

Despite this, big increases in fighting strength, together with the expansion of the air force, are being announced along with the disclosure that Britain plans shortly to build five new aircraft carriers.

ITH THE NORTHERN ITALIAN ARMY IN ETHIOPIA, AT THE FRONT, March 3.—Italy's northern army, continuing a series of successful attacks, today smashed the last complete Ethiopian army on the northern front.

A force of 30,000 Ethiopians under Ras Imru was routed after a three day battle on the western sector, along the Takaze river.

There the Ethiopians had advanced toward Lake Tana, headquarters of the Italian army.

Following the same smashing tactics in force on the northern front since the high command there every ounce of Italian power into the campaign beginning February 25.

The Ethiopians finally were driven into full flight towards the front of the line to the Olega and Takaze rivers.

They were believed to be extremely heavy in the bitter fighting, but were the greatest success of the Italian army.

The first Italian advance since the outbreak of the war was reported to have won 1,000 and 2,000 Italian "thousands" of soldiers.

Italian Emergency Measure Creates Public Credit Institutions

ROME, March 3 (AP)—Italy's public credit institutions today in the most sweeping banking decree since the outbreak of the war.

The drastic step, one of many taken during the war emergency, was approved by the council of ministers.

It was believed to be a "preliminary step" toward the creation of a public credit institution.

First glimpse of the appeal called government officials to say they were "in a difficult position."

The cabinet, transformed into a national emergency committee, today issued a public credit institution.

Many banks must now pay off stockholders and liquidate their reserves.

Other big banks, already semi-state institutions, were confirmed under the law.

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**LONG-SHORT-HAUL BILL UNDER FIRE**

Repealer Heads Toward House Debating Arena

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—The long-short-haul repeal bill today was headed for the house debating arena, already denounced on one hand as a "subterfuge" to let railroad drive water carriers out of business and defended on the other as necessary to permit the rails to live in the face of water and bus competition.

The bill would permit railroads to charge less for a long haul than for a shorter one over the same route in the same direction.

The house rules committee reported out a rule on the measure under which five hours general debate, preceded by an hour on the rule itself was allowed.

Intermountain representatives served notice they would fight the bill to the end when it comes up on the house floor a week or two hence.

During final hearings charges were made that "propaganda" had been marshaled in behalf of the bill.

Representative Peter (D-Ore.) contended that "there has never been any propaganda for any bill like this unless it was the holding company bill." O'Connor replied that "most of the thousands of communications to this committee have been against the bill."

Representative Driver (D-Ark.) said his desk was "literally covered" with communications on the bill, and Representative Peter charged there are lobbyists up here that primarily are interested in exciting the public.

Hidden Objections Peter, denouncing the bill as "one of the most stuporous bills ever before congress," contended it should not even be permitted on the floor.

"There must be some objective behind the bill," he said. "What is it? It must be to make this (indicating the so-called Inter-Mountain territory on a map) part of the country pay higher rates than (the railroads) can get fair rates now if they can show they deserve different rates."

Peter alleged that "no more money is coming from the West coast because boats are there to compete. So they are going to get it from us in the interior who are paying ruinous rates now."

Pending for the bill, Representative Martin (D-Colo.) member of the interstate commerce sub-committee which held week-long hearings last session, said the rules committee that the legislation was warranted, if for no other reason than to "preserve" the records for use of national emergency.

Opposed by Eastman At the outset of this session's full committee hearings, West Geo. Co. coordinator Joseph H. Eastman opposed the legislation.

Similarly, the bill was supported and denounced violently before the committee went into a 15-minute executive session at which "interference" to the floor was granted.

Opposing it, Representative White (I-Iowa) said the effect of the legislation would be to put Spokane and other Intermountain towns at "subsidiary."

"This is just a plan to make the people of the interior bear the burden of the cost to the coast," he charged.
