WALLACE UNFOLDS SOIL CONSERVATION SUBSIDY PROGRAM

Secretary Sets 270,000,000-Acre Quota for Major Crops in 1936, With 30,000,000 Acres Retired

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, March 5.—Midwestern and southern farm leaders, anxious to be about their spring planting, expressed criticism of the soil conservation program, which would limit major crops to an acreage of 270,000,000 for the nation.

As unfolded here and at a similar gathering in Memphis, Tenn., a statement from Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace, the program, amounting to \$410,000,000, consists of two main parts:

- 1. A quota of 270,000,000 acres to be planted in major crops with 30,000,000 acres retired to soil building production in grasses and legumes.
2. Distribution of payments to individual farmers in two classifications...

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# CHIEF EXECUTIVE ENTERS PRIMARIES

## President Signs Petitions; Borah Launches Drive in Nebraska

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—President Roosevelt tonight took the first formal step toward signing petitions entering his name in the presidential, congressional and gubernatorial primaries.

The White House made the announcement with the statement that the president would speak at BAHAMONTE April 11, before young Democrats from Maryland and neighboring states.

The announcement followed disclosure after one by Carl O. Bachman, chairman of the Borah campaign in Idaho, that the senator from Idaho had decided to enter the Nebraska primaries April 14 in his race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

Borah is filed to enter the Ohio, whose primary is on May 12, and in Illinois. He also is expected by his friends to have dates on delegate candidates in certain New York districts in Oregon, Montana, Wisconsin for representative and North and South Dakota.

The states of Ohio, Maryland and Massachusetts have always been among his presidential battle grounds.

However, Chairman James A. Farley, of the Democratic national committee, has announced that Mr. Roosevelt's name would be filed in other primaries wherever deemed necessary.

Farley's announcement generally was regarded as part of an effort to break up the coalition of delegates at the Philadelphia Democratic convention by being sure in advance that the president will have a sufficient number of delegates to assure his renomination.

Files in Ohio

Part of the opposition so far has come from Colonel Henry Brewster, attorney for Colonel Charles A. Hodges, who has announced he would file in Ohio for the Democratic nomination.

The Maryland primaries are May 4, Massachusetts April 28 and Ohio May 12.

Break announcements did not say whether the Idahoan would have a state of candidates for the 12 delegates allotted to the gubernatorial state. It merely said:

"Senator William E. Borah, of Idaho, today definitely decided to enter the presidential preference primaries in Nebraska. An authorized representative of Senator Borah's file his petition with the secretary of state at Lincoln, March 5 was the last day for filing, and the Nebraska primaries will be held on April 14."

Welcomes Test

It is a constant of sentiment in Nebraska for Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas. While he had nothing to add to Bachman's announcement, his friends said he would welcome Landon's entry in the latter's neighboring state for a clean-cut test of the popularity of the two.

Borah will open his Ohio campaign with a speech at Youngstown March 13. He said today he had tentatively set March 21 for a speech at Chicago, but the date was not definite.

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# COMMUNIST CALLS FOR THIRD PARTY

## Broadcast Speech Brings Storm of Protest in Congress

NEW ORLEANS, March 5 (AP)—A radio speech tonight by Bruce Browder, secretary of the Communist Party of America, urging farmers, labor and the "middle class" to unite in a third political party aroused protests from many sources.

Twenty-five members of the National American League picketed the Columbia Broadcasting company's office from 8 p. m. until Browder's 15-minute speech ended at 11 p. m.

The "middle class" radio stations affiliated with CBS in New England announced they would not relay the speech.

Protest in Congress

Representative McClellan (D-Ark.) introduced a protest against the speech in the house of representatives, and two colleagues—McCormack (D-Mass.) and Blanton (D-Tex.) warned the house against communism.

The American Commonwealth Federation issued a statement supporting Browder's action, but his political party to solve it. His radio talk was granted free as part of CBS' policy of sponsoring discussion of public problems by all political parties.

CBS issued a statement saying it had forbidden Browder to advocate the overthrow of the United States government by violence and force, and had "instructed its engineers to cut him off the air if he departed from his prepared speech and tried it."

# GOVERNOR DENIES REPRIEVE REPORTS

## Execution Date Stands Unless State Discovers New Evidence

TRENTON, N. J., March 5 (AP)—Bruce Richard Hauptmann must die four weeks hence for the Lindbergh baby killing unless new evidence is discovered, Governor Harold G. Hoffman said today.

"As matters now stand," the governor said, "there will be no further reprieve."

Reports have mounted recently that the governor, who stayed Hauptmann's execution January 8, twenty-nine hours before he was to go to the electric chair, would again prolong the life of the so-called kidnap murderer.

"I haven't the legal right to give Hauptmann another reprieve," the governor said today. "If my attitude of January 7 is unchanged, unless something arises that will bring Mr. Wilentz (governor-elect) to power, and if myself into agreement to go before Justice Trenchard on new evidence, there will not be a reprieve."

# SIX DECADES BACK

The early day history of that section of Southern Idaho embracing the North and South Side irrigated sections, the Rock Creek section and the Wood River area has been frequently written about but the most colorful and comprehensive account of conditions as they existed before the days of the Twin Falls country is undoubtedly contained in Charles Shirley Walgamott's latest book which he has called "Six Decades Back."

Those who know Southern Idaho will find a wealth of interest in Mr. Walgamott's account of the Southern Idaho of sixty years ago. Transportation then was by stagecoach and horseback. There were no railroads, telephones or telegraph lines. Cattle constituted perhaps the chief industry and there were good cowboys and bad, gamblers, thieves and murderers. But there was also a predominant element of fearlessness, conscientious, hardworking men who came into the country to establish permanent homes and whose every day's work constituted a step in the progress towards healthier conditions and better things.

Gold was mined for years along the Snake River in the vicinity of Shoshone Falls and Twin Falls, trappers established their lines in the hills, deer were plentiful in the rocky sections along Snake River. But in all that area where agriculture now flourishes only the sagebrush claimed the land.

"Six Decades Back" supplies the early history of the real pioneers of Southern Idaho, many of whom are still living although a vast majority have long since gone to their last reward. Lacking in the luxuries of latter day existence, their lives were rich and full. Comedy as well as tragedy played their part; joy and sorrow walked hand in hand.

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### SHEEP AND SWINE BREEDERS GATHER

Livestock Pool Directors Select March 14 for Annual Meeting

BURLY, March 5—The annual meeting of the Idaho Sheep and Swine Marketing association and the Swine Pool association, will be held concurrently Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the county court-house at Burley.

Recently wool pool members who chose in the spring of 1935 to continue their membership through the National Wool Marketing association received their final payment from the national for the 1935 clip. The final payment consisted of 10 1/2 cents and growers were advanced 19 cents at the time of delivery of their wool, making a total of 29 1/2 cents received by these growers.

There were approximately 25,000 pounds of wool sent through the national association.

May Combine Pool Livestock pool directors have during the winter given consideration to the combining of the two pools into one marketing association and the incorporation of the same. This procedure has been given consideration from a standpoint of more economical operation and a greater protection for its membership. At the holding of the annual meeting growers will be given the opportunity to discuss the matter of combining the two pools, incorporation and the adoption of by-laws for the corporation.

It is felt by the directors of these pools that the marketing association, if combined, will not only be a more efficient organization in the marketing of other livestock commodities. Growers will need to discuss at this meeting the matter of preference as to whether of marketing their wool in 1936 and any change that may be desired in the marketing of lambs and swine.
