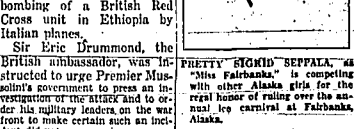

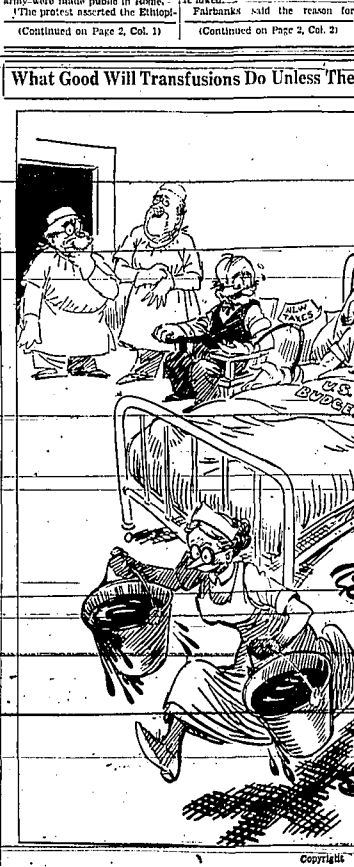

# New Food Values New Menu Ideas New Seasonal Foods

## Points To Observe In Menus of March

Whether it's in like a lion and out like a lamb or the other way about, there is still March weather to contend with. Old Man Winter may be winking and keeping his lightning front and we can expect repeated attacks during March.

We must, therefore, be very kind and look to our defense. Our first line is the physical state that is frequently called "abundant good health." It implies good health with a reserve for maintaining it. This reserve is built with an adequate diet, exercise, fresh air, rest. These essentials are easily obtained in the summer time but can be secured in winter only with careful planning. Toward the end of winter our lapses begin to show up and March may find us with a lowered resistance to winter's ailments. This is the time when careful planning. Essentials can be with to change, so much so that each day's menu should be planned.

1. At least 1 pint milk for each adult and 1 quart for children.
2. Citrus fruit, tomato juice or generous servings of other fresh fruit or vegetables.
3. Two vegetables in addition to potato.
4. Meat, fish, food, eggs or cheese.
5. Laxative foods such as bran or whole grain cereals, leafy vegetables and fruits.
6. Cereals, starches and sweets to complete the energy requirements for the day.

### Spicy Desserts

**A TOUCH of spice makes many things nice. And it does more than that. It makes many things so palatable that it simplifies the task of the housewife in introducing that variety into the diet which all nutritionists recommend.**

Such a dish as Baked Pineapple and Rhubarb, for instance, would be hard to sell to your family without the addition of cinnamon and cloves. And what would Peach Rice Pudding or Apple Cup Cakes taste like without a touch of nutmeg? And how could Peach and Cranberry Salad or Pink and Ginger Mousse get along without a little ginger?

**Decide for Yourself!**

The only way to answer definitely these rhetorical questions is to try some of these dishes for yourself, and with the spices. But we recommend that you try them first as a good diet! You tried them, and then you'll

**These Have Ginger**

**Pear and Cranberry Salad:** 10 more peeling from three ripe pears, cut in halves and scoop out the core. Place in lettuce leaves. Mash one cream cheese and three tablespoons of a pure cranberry sauce, and then cream them together until very smooth. Add a few grains salt and pipe this mixture around the edge of the pear halves. Fill the center with cream maxonella and sprinkle with chopped preserved ginger. Makes six.

**Pineapple-Ginger Mousse:** Sauté one teaspoon gelatin in two tablespoons cold water, then dissolve in one cup hot-cracked pineapple. Add one-fourth cup sugar and one-fourth cup chopped candied ginger, and allow to cook. Fold in two cups cream, beaten, pour into cream mold and pack in ice and chill for four hours. Serves six to eight.

**Apple Cup Custards:** Beat three eggs lightly, and add one-fourth cup sugar, one tablespoon cream, the contents of a No. 2 can apple sauce, three-fourths cup milk and one-eighth teaspoon nutmeg. Told in three stiffly beaten egg whites, pour into custard cups and sprinkle with raisins. Bake in hot water out and bake in a slow-325 degree-oven for about forty minutes or until set. Serve cold. Serves eight.

**Never dream of omitting the spice.** The first is Baked Pineapple and Rhubarb. Cut six cups rhubarb, peeled, in small pieces. Put in a baking dish with one cup sugar, ten slices one-eighth teaspoon cinnamon and one cup pineapple syrup. Cover and bake until tender at 325 degrees for about half an hour. Serve cold with some simple cake, such as sponge cake. Serves eight.

Mix dry ingredients, cut in fat and add milk. When soft dough forms, pat it out until 1/2 inch thick. Carefully remove to greased shallow pan. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. While warm, split and add part of creamed ham. Replace top and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. Garnish with parsley and serve immediately.

## Ham As Basis for One-Dish Meals

The smoky tang and full flavor of cured ham gives it no end of versatility when food combinations are being sought, and whether the combination be one with bland flavored vegetables or fruits, or decidedly characteristic flavor, ham may be used with equal advantage. The practice of cooking meat with vegetables is not only good from the standpoint of flavor, but is also a great help to the housewife who has activities other than spending her entire time in the kitchen cooking and washing dishes, says Mrs. S. Wilcox, home economist.

**AND VERY often the combination dish may be cooked in the oven and will need very little attention. Ham and potatoes en Casserole and meat and potatoes are usually regarded as the mainstays of every meal, and those making a splendid combination for the baking dish. Place a thick ham slice in the baking dish and over it allow the potatoes. Cover with milk, cover, and bake until both potatoes and ham are done.**

As an interesting substitute for ham and potatoes, try ham and noodles en casserole.

Place a layer of bread cooked noodles in a baking dish. Over it place a layer of chopped cooked ham, then another layer of noodles.

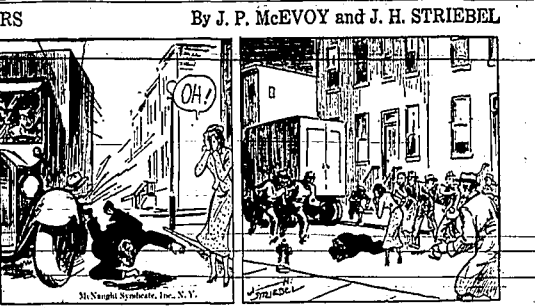
