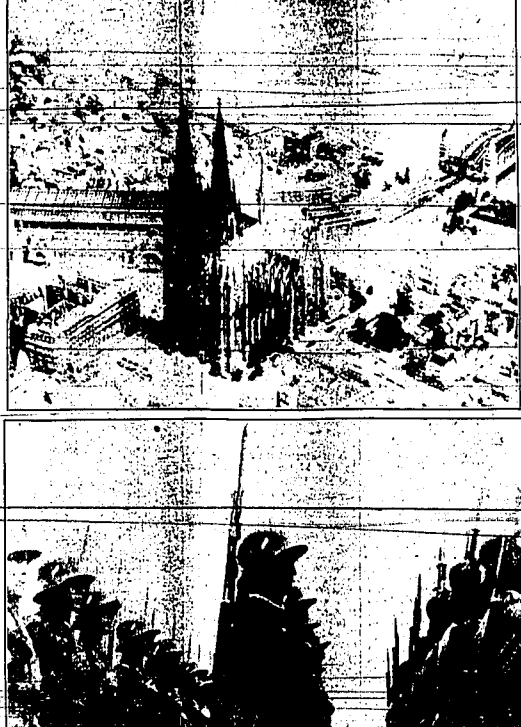

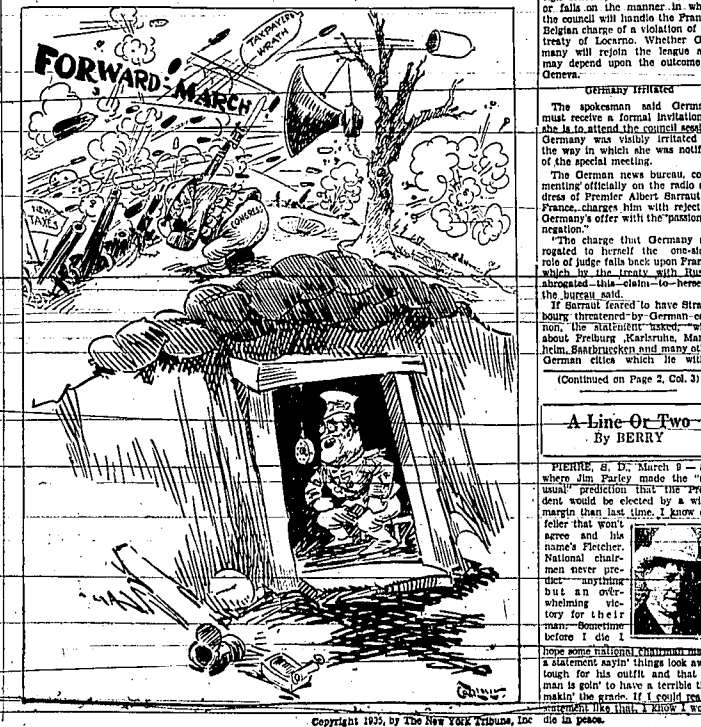

#### Hauptmann Faces Death in Electric Chair Week of March 30

TRENTON, N. J., March 9 (AP)—Talk of a reprieve for Bruno Hauptmann, the man convicted of slaying the Lindbergh boy, was said to be under consideration today, according to a source in the state prison.

A high procedure official said the reprieve would be "a very important step" in the case of Hauptmann.

The governor, Edward G. Hoffman, who signed Hauptmann's execution on January 17, is expected to sign a reprieve after March 30, the date of Hauptmann's execution.

The governor's decision will be made after the state board of pardons has been notified.

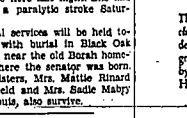

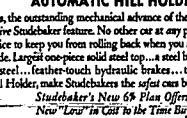

### SENATE ROWS OVER MESSAGE SEIZURES

#### 'Political Surveillance' Alleged in Lobby Investigation

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Barbed imputations of "political surveillance" and unconstitutional methods were flung at the senate lobby committee today.

At the same time the senate formally demanded an explanation of the phase of the committee's alleged mass seizure of telegrams.

At a hearing before the Senate (H-Idaho), a resolution was adopted directing the federal communication commission to make a full report on any co-operation it gave the committee and by what authority it did so.

#### Explosive Exchange

Then the senate settled down to an explosive exchange between Senator Stewart (R-Ore.) and Chairman Black (D-Ala.), with the former charging the committee with an improper invasion of the rights of privacy and the latter sarcastically denying the allegation.

Stewart asserted he did not question the rights of the senate, or of the committee, to conduct production of documents wanted in the investigation, but that the committee's methods of subpoenaing telegrams was open to charges of unconstitutionality.

"I know of no decision in which any court ever sustained the right of a court, or of a legislative body, to demand in a subpoena the production of all papers without identifying the particular papers to be produced," said Stewart, and added later:

"I am not sure but that the subpoena could be justified as a matter of cold-blooded law, but I am sure that the agencies of congress ought not to assume the role of this kind, raising suspicions, creating indignation in the minds of the people especially when there is a means of avoiding it."

"I hope that never in our free country will there be a political surveillance of the private affairs of the American people," he said.

"I hope that the guaranties of the fourth amendment will always be unimpaired and if there is to be an espionage (Russian secret police) here, if there is to be organized surveillance of the private life of the people of America, I do not want the senate of the United States or any committee of the senate to have anything to do with it."

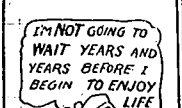
Black arose to answer at once.

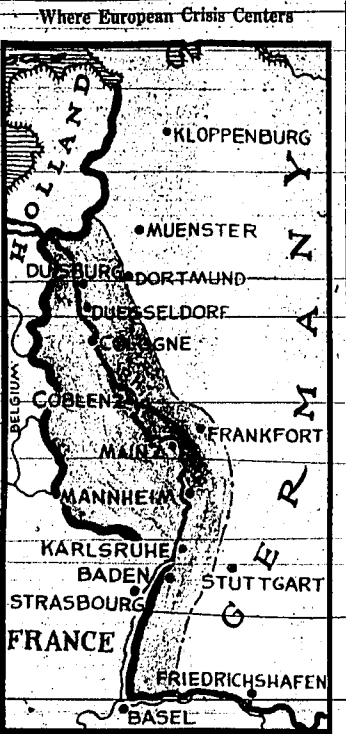

THE shaded portion of this Associated Press map shows the Rhine zone demilitarized under conditions of the Versailles Treaty—the area into which Adolf Hitler dispatched troops. The left bank comes under treaty provisions. The right bank was to be demilitarized by Germany itself. Military occupation of the forbidden area precipitated a grave crisis in Europe, with both France and Belgium withdrawing all leaves for their soldiers in answer to Germany's action.

OAKLEY, March 9—Thomas F. Shaw, Oakley, was paid an impressive tribute at largely attended services Sunday afternoon at the Latter Day Saints tabernacle at Oakley. Mr. Shaw died Thursday evening at the Rupert hospital.

Mr. Shaw, who operated the Shaw cattle ranch on Trapper creek, had been a prominent resident of Oakley for the past 30 years. He was well-known throughout this section of the state.

Interment was in Oakley cemetery beside the grave of his father and another.

Mr. Shaw is survived by his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Shaw, who had been associated with him in the cattle industry.

### Wind Delays Raising Of Sunken Air Liner

SALT LAKE CITY, March 9 (AP)—Choppy waters of Great Salt Lake frustrated attempts to raise the sunken wreckage of a Standard Oil company of California air liner today. Officials said another attempt would be made tomorrow at 10 a. m. after tracks on the Lucin cutoff at Collin, Utah, are clear.

The plane landed in the lake last October 5, during a night flight from Oakland, Calif., to Salt Lake City. Its crew of three men died.

The sunken bulk was located two weeks ago.

The plane was lifted from the floor of the lake and towed 20 miles to the Lucin cutoff. It will be hoisted onto the trestle and dismantled sufficient to the coast where an investigation will be made to determine the cause of the tragedy.

### MONTANA FIRE HALTS RAILWAY TRAIN SERVICE

### Law On Side Of Student Strikers

ALAMEDA, Calif., March 9 (AP)—Two days of civic turmoil abated under the weight of two legal opinions that the city board of education's ouster of School Superintendent William O. Paden, central figure in the strike, was invalid.

Fifty-two hundred striking high school students returned Monday morning to classes.

The students disappeared Saturday evening after 24 hours of guarding the office of Mayor Hans W. Rooker against reported threats of fire eviscerators to seize the municipal government.

District Attorney Earl Warren and City Attorney William J. Locke have advised that Paden was the legal superintendent of schools.

The board of education members who voted for the Paden ouster indicated they would abide by the legal opinion. Paden himself had the support of the one minority member giving him a majority of the five.

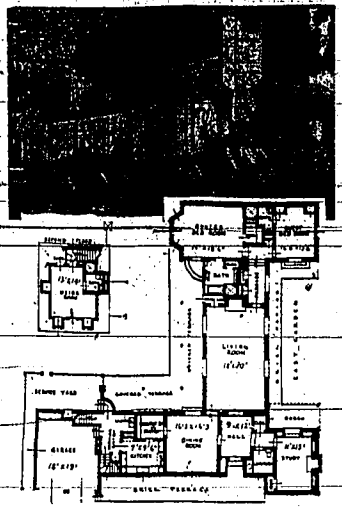
This is a WPA project and we have no objection to it," said the chief of police in Idaho, Brown said.

He devised the first automatic stripping mechanism by which animals take their own pictures, and was first to practice camera high shooting of birds traveling at high speed.

# JOHNSTON RESIGNS POST-ON-COUNCIL

## Park Commissioner Quits With Parting Blast at City Administration

Asserting that "any person who takes my place is going into a thankless job to be a mere puppet for a power-craze," J. O. Johnston, member of Twin Falls city council for the past three years, last night announced his resignation as Twin Falls commissioner of parks and public buildings to take effect at once.

"There's nothing left for me to do," Mr. Johnston said, "I've been stripped of all authority, even in my own department, and I refuse to continue taking the responsibility for appointments and decisions made by other members of the council against my wishes."

Mr. Johnston's resignation came as a direct result of a split vote in the council session Monday night of last week, when A. B. Hopkins, former horticulturalist, was named as superintendent of city parks after the Commissioner Johnston had nominated Emory Stoddard to fill the post. Mayor Duncan McD. Johnson and Councilman W. E. Taylor and O. H. Coleman voted in favor of Hopkins while Councilmen J. G. Johnston and L. O. Johnston voted on record in favor of Stoddard.

Street Commissioner Elected on the same ticket with Mayor Johnston and O. H. Coleman they were J. G. Johnston and L. O. Johnston was named commissioner of streets and waterworks. J. M. Dimond was named as superintendent of his department.

Split in the harmony of the council came last spring shortly before the election when Mayor Johnston made it plain that he would not support Dimond for reappointment as superintendent of streets.

Johnston then entered into the campaign issues as a supporter for Bert A. Sweet in the mayoral race.

Mayor Johnston was re-elected as was Councilman Chapin, and W. E. Taylor was named to fill the vacancy created by the expiration of the term of J. E. White. At a reorganization meeting, Taylor was named as commissioner of streets and waterworks, a post formerly held by White.

Council's Get Men  
I planned to go on in charge of parks after they took the streets and waterworks away from me, Johnston said, but I couldn't get the men I wanted and there was nothing left for me to do but resign.

They took my department away from me, they fired Jack Dimond, they switched me over to the parks and I figured that I'd be left alone.

I claim to know what I know, I know that I can fix the city parks in better shape than they are in at the present time.

This all started a long time ago, shortly after I took office and returned to have my part in special meetings with only three members of the council present. Then I wouldn't have any part in special meetings as a result of the city buy a load of pipe that the mayor ordered. After they put me away with the parks and buildings they would have a whole lot for the city hall over my objection.

Doesn't Know Hopkins  
"I didn't quit, however, until they switched me over to the parks and the park superintendent would be I don't know Mr. Hopkins. He may be a good man, but I don't know him and I do know Emory Stoddard."

I wanted Stoddard in that job to save the city some money. He is a competent man and I have worked on the job enough to know what is required. I wanted the man in the job that I knew I could trust to do things right. I thought the council wouldn't see it my way.

If the people want Dunc, Cooley and Bill Taylor to run in special meetings, I'll use either Johnny Welch or Henry James from Memphis as a fifth member, with Bub Walters and Jack Wilson available for re-election. I may keep another of the young fellows, also.
