Five Known Dead in Wake of Rain, Melting Snow And Swollen Rivers; Hundreds Flee To Higher Ground

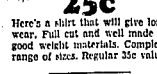

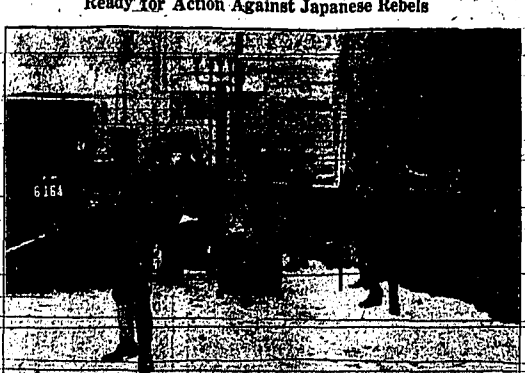

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HOOVER FROWNS ON TAX ON INSURANCE

Argues Equal Justice in Levies on Other Security Measures

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—President Herbert Hoover, sitting before the Life Underwriters association of New York City, suggested here tonight that life insurance should be free from taxation. The former president, a director of New York Life, said he would not talk tonight "for there is no political life insurance. Every race and political faith are represented in its management."

Security Factor
"It would seem," the former president said, "that when our federal government and our state governments are endeavoring to build up economic security for the individual through old age pensions and through unemployment insurance, that this great segment of economic security represented by life insurance might well be freed from taxation."

"I regret that that is not the case. The tax collector has found that it is a fertile field for easy taxes. And such taxes come out of the poor, for only 500,000 persons pay income taxes yet 3,000,000 have insurance. "It would be just as logical to tax old-age-pensions, savings-bank-deposits or any other provision of economic security."

At one point in his address, Hoover alluded to his previous speeches on monetary policies of the Roosevelt administration but did not go into them deeply.

Government's Responsibility
"The government has peculiar responsibility to this vast majority of Americans who have denied themselves and scraped and saved that benefits might come to others," he said. "That is the obligation to establish a stable currency and a stable credit system and the safeguard that is a balanced budget."

"But this is not an occasion for more comment on that, however, my views on those particular subjects are fairly well known."

Hoover described life insurance as "the first line of economic security to the average man as a whole, for the average of insurance is less than \$1,000."

"Today one of the major questions to all peoples of the world is economic security," he said. "Revolutions have swept the world during the past 20 years in search for just that. And we have here in America quietly built up one of the greatest agencies of economic security."

Tiny Clinch River To Make Vast Lake When Norris Dam Sluice Gates Close

NORRIS, Tenn. (AP)—The famed Norris dam, the 2,000-foot-long concrete structure across the tiny Clinch river in northeastern Tennessee and soon to impound a vast mountain lake of 12,000 acres, is now practically complete.

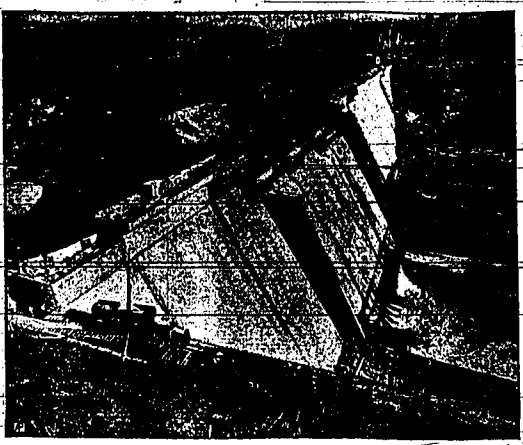
Built by the Tennessee Valley Authority at a cost of \$14,000,000, the huge structure is the first link in the "new deal" program to utilize the Tennessee river and its tributaries for navigation, flood control and power generation.

The dam, rising 233 feet from the bed of the river—about the height of a factory building—rests on two sloping hillsides, is located in the Cumberland mountains 80 miles above the Tennessee river. It is about 300 miles by river from the war-time Wilson dam at Muscle Shoals.

Finishing Touches
Construction of the dam began November 7, 1933. The final 1,000,000 cubic yard of concrete has been poured, but several finishing touches remain, including construction of a roadway across the top of the dam and completion of the powerhouse and installation of equipment.

Actual generation of power is not scheduled until about August. By mid-summer water from the reservoir will be delivered to turbines which operate two 60,000-horsepower generators, but at least two months of tests must be run before the plant is pronounced ready.

Sluice gates in the dam are scheduled to be closed in March. This will start formation of one of the largest dam reservoirs in the country—a body of water extending 100 miles like the Clinch and Powell river valleys a distance of 41 miles (including parts of five counties) and having a shore-line of about 800 miles.



Norris dam, first link in the TVA's program of development of the Tennessee river and its tributaries, is nearly completed. The sluice gates may go down in March to start impounding a vast lake on the Hay Clinch river.

The lake will be 245 feet deep in places. To get it ready the TVA had to clear its floor of a heavy forest growth, move 3500 farm and village families to other sections and relocate 200 graves, many containing the bones of early American settlers.
