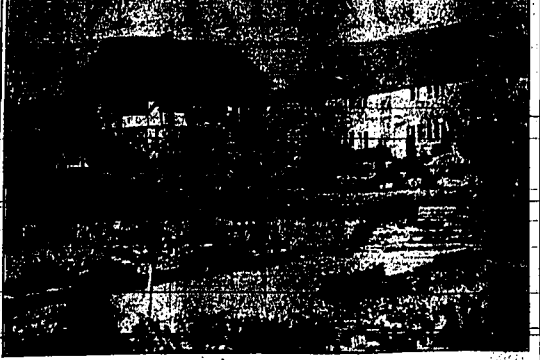

## 12 STATES DRAW CHILD PENSIONS

Idaho Among Three With Highest Average Payments

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—Twelve states and the District of Columbia are receiving funds from the social security board to pay for the care of 75,187 children that have no means of support.

These children under 16 are living with some specified relative, usually their mother, in a place maintained as a home.

Estimates gathered by the social security board from the 12 states and the District of Columbia disclosed today that in addition to the 75,187 now receiving aid, upward of another 40,000 are involved in plans that are being worked out or have been submitted by 21 other states.

**Law's Provisions**

Under the law, the board contributes one-third of the amount for each child, plus one-third of the administrative expenses, with the limitation that the federal government shall not contribute more than \$4 a month for the maintenance of the first child in a family or more than \$2 a month for the second child.

The chief purpose of the plan is to contribute help which will allow women to hold their family together after the death or disability of their husband, permitting the homes to be maintained without the necessity of sending the children to institutions.

Maryland, Wisconsin and Idaho have the highest average payments. They average \$15 a month for 5,000 children in Maryland, \$20.00 in Wisconsin and \$19.00 in Idaho.

Definite plans and estimates have been submitted for Utah, \$14.03 for 6,043.

## IDAHO SHARES IN U. S. FLOOD FUND

WPA Approves \$18,411,000 Allotment for Prevention Program

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—An allotment of \$18,411,000 for prevention of damage to life and property resulting from widespread floods was approved today by the works progress administration.

Administration Secretary L. Hopkins said WPA workers would be available for emergency flood control work in any locality which might be menaced.

Hopkins emphasized that no new appropriation of funds was involved and that the order empowered state directors to use funds already allotted to them for this purpose, with a specified maximum for each state.

The state maxima included: Idaho, \$100,000; Montana, \$16,000; Oregon, \$14,820; Utah, \$13,000; Washington, \$25,131; Wyoming, \$100,000.

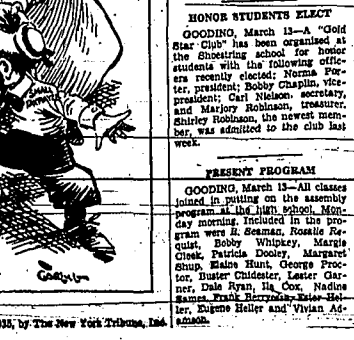

The bill would allow each member of congress five appointments annually to the naval academy at Annapolis instead of the present four. The measure also would provide funds to increase the enlisted personnel from 87,000 to 100,000 men starting next July 1.

"All Down the Line" Chairman Cary (D-K) of the house naval appropriations sub-committee said the personnel increases are necessary to meet expansion "all down the line from ships to shore stations."

One dispute was said to have centered on whether there should be increased funds for anti-aircraft guns or huge expenditures for airplanes as a defense measure. The amount to be spent for anti-aircraft guns has not been disclosed. The bill carries about \$28,000,000 for construction of 222 new destroyers. It also would provide about \$22,000,000 for ship construction, including \$14,000,000 for 12 new destroyers and six submarines.

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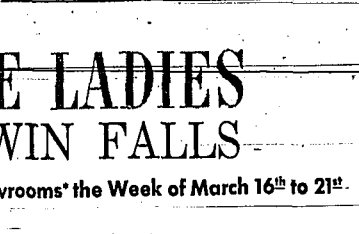

Cable to Roosevelt

This correspondence revealed that despite the absence of a formal diplomatic relationship between the two countries, France is extending its "Coloel-and-provisional-president of the republic of Paraguay" cable to President Roosevelt on March 5.

"Until now there has not been recognition of official relations with your excellency's government and with the peace conference and in consequence my government feels legitimate fears that the time periods agreed upon in the peace pact may come to an end without the terms possible to undertake despite our firm will to do so."

France referred to the peace conference at Buenos Aires in which the United States joined with the governments of Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Peru and Uruguay, and the settlements of the bitter Chaco war between Paraguay and Bolivia.

were sufficient to carry the ship approximately 200 miles, he said.

Seventy gallons of fuel were pumped from a tank in the right wing, and 15 gallons from a tank in the left wing. The combined capacity of the ship's four tanks is 510 gallons.

Articles removed from the interior of the cabin before the ship was raised included a radio broadcasting and receiving set, maps, seat cushions and other belongings of the three dead members of the ship's crew.

The ship was supported by a mass of steel cables which officials said were eight times as strong as those which broke in the previous attempt to raise the plane. These and the reduction in weight made the task fairly easy when the big Southern Pacific tug swung into action Saturday afternoon.

Lowered on Flat Car

"This time everything went as planned, however, and the big ship came slowly up and was swung over the rail cars and lowered upon a flat car. The hoist plane 'skipped' the rail car and the plane struck, lifted the ship from the car and lowered it on a specially constructed platform beside the trestle.

Immediately a crew of expert mechanics began the task of cleaning the huge ship preparatory to dismantling it and shipping it to the company's air base at Alameda, Calif.

A preliminary examination of the control and fuel lines which extend from the floor of the pilot's seat along the bottom of the plane to the wings revealed nothing unusual. Standard Oil photographers took pictures of the interior of the plane. They will also photograph the piece by piece as it is dismantled.

CURTAIN OF WAGES, WORK HOURS URGED

Berry Industrial Council Submits Recommendations to Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, March 14. (AP)—George L. Berry industrial council recommendations to President Roosevelt today that the nation adopt a permanent policy including minimum wages and maximum hours standards and elimination of "unfair" trade practices.

The recommendations were contained in a committee report adopted Thursday by the council of about 300 business men and labor leaders. The national associations of such large industries as steel, automobiles and textiles were not represented.

Freedom Recognized "The committee on national industrial policy," the report said, "recognizes that under our form of government it is commonly understood in all circles are accorded the widest freedom to engage in open and fair industrial competition with one another to exercise initiative and enterprise, and spurred by the incentive for profit, they are accorded the widest freedom to improve industrial facilities and thus most effectively contribute to the national well-being."

Notwithstanding this recognition individual rights, property, liberties and economic facts conclusively show that this objective has not been fully and completely realized.

Demands Restraint

"For this reason, the public welfare demands that government intervention restrain shall be exercised on public industry which will require its management and operation to administer business and industry in such a way as to preserve and protect social justice, equity and fair dealing to all concerned."

- The committee made four recommendations: (1) Production control only in emergency. (2) Maximum hour and minimum wage standards "to increase the purchasing power of wage earners and to make for employment in an age of continuous technological improvement." (3) Federal curbs on "unfair" and "destructive" trade practices. (4) Establishment of a permanent industrial council.

PENSION APPLICATIONS APPROVED AT BURLEY

BURLEY, March 14.—Applications for the old age pension have been approved in Cassia county under the social security program according to reports of the commission meeting here this week. A total of 113 applications were approved last week, more than any other week.

A few undeserving applicants have been found. The local offices have received and returned checks totaling \$100 for February payments, 88 old age pensioners receiving the checks. A decided shortage of direct relief applicants has been noticed due to the pension system.

Alberta Approves Price-Fixing Code

EDMONTON, Alta., March 14. (AP)—A master retail trade code providing for fixing of both maximum and minimum prices has been approved by Alberta's credit government and will become effective April 1.

Codes for separate divisions of the retail industry are contemplated under the master code but none has yet been drawn up.
