BESIDE COURT FOR ACCUSED PHYSICIAN

Defendant in Sterilization Case Stricken by Illness

SAN FRANCISCO, March 16 (AP)—Dr. Samuel O. Boyd, 71, defendant in a mayhem conspiracy charge in the Ann Cooper Hewitt sterilization case, may be held to answer in a court session at his bedside.

Municipal Judge Byron L. Lassus today postponed the case of Dr. Boyd and Dr. E. J. Timman until next Thursday, after Jerome H. White, Dr. Boyd's attorney, said the elderly physician is too ill to appear in court.

White asked a week's continuance, but Assistant District Attorney Samuel H. Gardner, acting with a request to hold the hearing in Dr. Boyd's room at a sanatorium, Judge Lassus and Inspector Purdy to investigate and report Thursday, when the judge will decide if the "bedside court" will be held.

The two physicians, with Ann Hewitt's mother, Mrs. Mayora Hewitt, were charged with conspiracy to commit mayhem after the girl filed suit against her husband for \$200,000, alleging that he had sterilized her mother could inherit her share of the estate of Peter Cooper Hewitt, her father.

Mrs. Hewitt is under treatment in a New Jersey hospital for what was said to be an overdose of sedative. Police charge her with taking it with suicidal intent.

THREAT TO PRESS SEEN IN MEASURE

Crusader Declares Van Nuys Bill Fatal to Political Freedom

NEW YORK, March 16 (AP)—Fred O. Child, national commander of the Crusaders, said tonight in an address prepared for radio delivery in Los Angeles that the Van Nuys bill to curtail libel suits to make political freedom of the press "dead as the do-do."

"This act has greater possibilities of crushing free press and free speech than any bill proposed in this country in four generations," he said.

"It merely declares that it shall be punishable for any person or corporation to influence or attempt to influence, through fear or intimidation, the vote of any person employed by them, for a national election."

"Since newspapers and magazines are corporations and employers, no editor would dare * * * to write an editorial * * * that might influence any of the employees of his publication by causing the slightest fear in their hearts of one political party or the other."

"If this bill passes as it is written the freedom of the press to criticize candidates or national platform policies will be as dead as the do-do."

The bill has passed the senate.

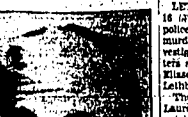

Mainly, the bill would convey to the states unappropriated and unreserved public lands within their borders.

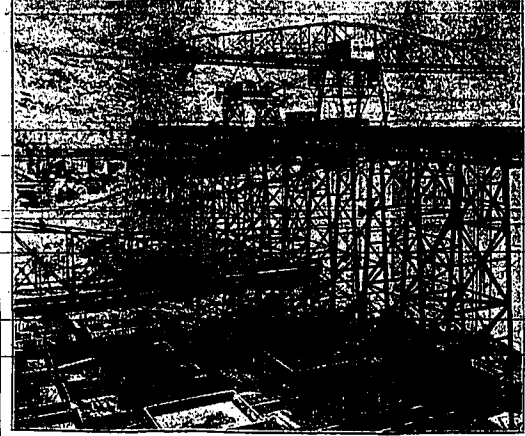
The main question as the board said is whether or not such conveyances would be beneficial to this state.

Enabling legislation would be required of our legislature if this state is to enjoy any benefits that might be available under the Hatch bill.

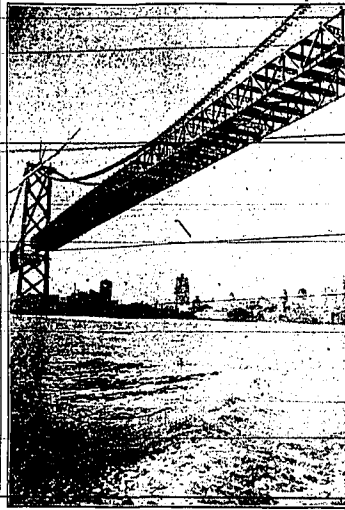

Speaker at Boise Conference Points Way to 'Salvation'

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—Charles Baker of Yakala Falls, president of the Washington state farm bureau, urged farmers at a meeting here today to pin their hopes for economic salvation upon the cooperative movement.

Baker came here to address a meeting of representatives of 12 southwestern Idaho cooperative organizations which claim a membership of 55,460.

"The volume of business, efficiency of management, cooperation of cooperatives and proper financial setup are the controlling factors in the success of any farm organization founded on the cooperative plan, and such organizations present the main hope of today's farmers for their economic salvation," Baker declared.

The meeting at Twin Falls tomorrow will be the last of a series of similar meetings for cooperative marketing and purchasing associations in Idaho. The meetings are sponsored by the Idaho cooperative council of which Earl Q. Maraling of Caldwell is president.

Besides Baker the speakers here today include P. Lee Johnson, commissioner of agriculture, who is in favor of any farm organization increasing farm prices; William "Shubert" of Preston, president of the Utah Poultry Producers' Assn. in Idaho. The sessions are sponsored by the Idaho council to the national council meeting in Washington, D. C., who reported the session he attended and W. W. Dent ofampa, master of the Idaho state Grange, who also commended the cooperative movement.

Shouse Tops List With \$36,000 as Head of Liberty League

WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—Reports filed with the house indicated today that working for political organizations has become one of the capital's most lucrative professions.

A dozen men, according to reports filed by the Republican and Democratic committees and the American Liberty League, were receiving salaries during the first two months of the year at the rate of \$10,000 a year or more. The top income was \$36,000 a year to Joseph Shouse, head of the league, with \$18,000 as expenses in addition.

Chairman James A. Hargis of the Democratic national committee and Henry P. Fletcher of the Republican national committee received no salaries.

Big salaries went to publicity men, research experts and organizers. Charles Mitchell of the Democratic national committee was highest paid press agent, working at the rate of \$20,800.

The highest salary in Republican headquarters went to John Hamilton, who recently resigned as assistant chairman to direct the presidential drive for Governor Alf Landon of Kansas. Hamilton was paid at the rate of \$15,000 a year with \$10,000 for expenses.

ways and means of punishing Germany for its flag.

What price the British would have to pay France for her cooperation in this direction was undetermined tonight. In conference circles it was believed that nothing less than a mutual guarantee in case of German attack would satisfy France.

The prevailing view in league circles was that France is to be held out to demanding the dispatch of a staff note to Berlin asking Hitler to evacuate the Rhineland—both economic and financial sanctions likely eventually to be demanded by France in event of Germany's refusal.

Council's Reply

The council's reply to Hitler granting one of his conditions and rejecting the others, dispatched by Stanley M. Bruce of Australia, president of the council, was: "I have the honor to indicate to your excellency the reply of the council to your telegram of March 15. Germany will participate in the examination by the council of the questions submitted by the Belgian and French governments on the same terms as the representatives of the other guarantee powers whose situation under the treaty is the same as that of Germany. That is to say with full rights of discussion; the vote of the three guarantors not being counted in calculating unanimity.

"In regard to the second question it is not for the council to give the German government the assurance which 'desires'."

Guarantors' obligation

The issue before the council tomorrow will be the Franco-Belgian resolution which is unanimously adopted—the votes of Belgium, France and Germany if the allied not counting—Britain and Italy as guarantors are under obligation to give immediate assistance to France and Belgium.
