(Copyright, 1936, By The Associated Press) LONDON, March 17—A high British authority said tonight "it was not conceivable" a lasting solution for European problems could be found at the present meeting of diplomatic representatives of Locarno pact powers.

The diplomatic group, temporarily dispersed by Nazi acceptance to send delegates to the League of Nations council session considering violation of the Locarno treaty by Germany, met in the Rhineland, dispersed in the face of the British statement.

'One Of The Boys' \$1,000,000 KIDNAP PLOT REVEALED IN SPECTACULAR RAID

Police Accuse Suspects as Members of Ring Responsible for 'More Than a Dozen Murders'

(By The Associated Press) NEW-YORK, March 17—Police tonight accused seven men and three women, arrested early today in an spectacular raid, of a plot to kidnap Thomas Manville, heir to the asbestos millions, and described them as members of a ring responsible for "more than a dozen murders."

Three of the men were charged with kidnaping Manville, who was held in a safe in the home of Joseph Butler, son of Richard Butler, former assemblyman.

Police said seven of the suspects had been identified as participants in a series of bank holdups, jewelry robberies and a number of other crimes. Several of them have long police records.

Detective Discloses Plot The alleged Manville kidnap plot was disclosed by a detective, who asked that his name be withheld. He said the raiding party knew before the members broke into a rooming house at dawn and seized the prisoners that they had been planning some crime.

He revealed he had received two letters and a telegram within the last few days threatening him with kidnaping and demanding \$1,000,000.

Flood Sweeps Over Town Where 2,000 Died In 1889; Other Sections Menaced

Thousands Imperilled, At Least Six Dead; Mounting Damage Runs Into Millions

(By The Associated Press) JOHNSTOWN, Pa., March 17—Flood waters surged to a depth of more than 15 feet through the streets of Johnstown tonight while hundreds of marooned residents huddled in downtown buildings awaiting a recession in the waters "so they might flee to higher ground."

The Coonigher river went on rampage again in almost the same way it did 47 years ago to take a toll of more than 2,000 lives. One person drowning was reported in tonight's deluge here but a family of five perished in a flood at Rosburg, Pa., in a first of a coal camp.

Return to Highlands Thousands of township folk' refuge in the highland suburbs after being warned last night to leave their homes.

Estimates of the damage could not be made by official sources tonight but it is believed that the damage would run into millions of dollars.

Flumes traveled through the town of Johnstown dam, a small reservoir 10 miles north of the city, had collapsed but telephone company employees were working to avert a disaster.

They asserted the water stopped rising late tonight.

The terrific current impeded rescue. Miss Lullia Miller, an operator, told of her efforts to bring motor boats into a part of the flooded town. She said:

"I don't believe they would do much good. The water is running so fast that it is impossible to make a landing."

One Known Death So far as could be learned, only one man was killed in tonight's flood. A youth, Henry Belind, drowned when a bridge collapsed while he was walking across it.

Miss Marjorie Lightner, a telephone operator, reported "between eight and ten feet of water" covered the town.

"The whole downtown area is under water," she said. "Every street has been flooded."

Johnstown was virtually isolated except for a telephone connection with the Bell Telephone exchange. Several families on duty while flood waters swirled about the town.

Several hundred persons from buildings, theaters and stores by lantern light in a first of shifts after darkness settled over the city.

Hundreds refused to leave their homes and were taking refuge on second floors. Some families moved their kitchen equipment to upper floors.

Street signs, marooned in business districts, were almost covered with water.

The flood waters were reported still rising tonight after pouring into business buildings and spreading out to higher territory in residential sections.

Highways Under Water Travelers reaching Somerset, Pennsylvania, 30 miles from Johnstown, reported highways around the town were under water.

Johnstown is a steel center, in central Pennsylvania. It has a population of about 70,000 and about 300,000 more live in the suburbs.
