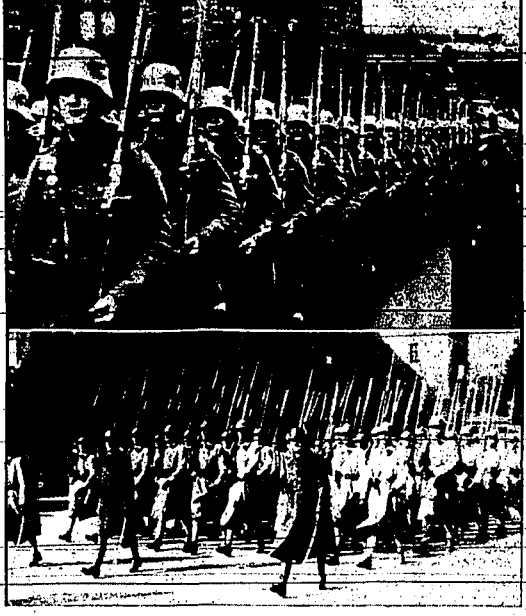

SALT LAKE CITY, March 19 — The quota of enlistments for service in the Philippine Islands has been increased ten in the Infantry and five in the medical department, Colonel William C. Webb announced. Parents Of Murder Defendant Testify

CARRIZOZO, N. M., March 19 (AP) — Mr. and Mrs. Roy Martin, parents of 18-year-old Hollis Martin, accused triple slayer, testified in district court here their son was abnormal and subject to sudden, temporary insanity because of a football injury.

The mother and father of the Albus, Oklahoma, youth, on trial on charges of murder in connection with the slaying of his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Willard Shafer, and their nine-year-old son last November, were the first to testify for the defense.

Testimony of the state's witnesses earlier in the day, described the finding of the bullet-pierced bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Shafer in the farmyard of their Honozo valley farm home and that of their son, Tommie, beaten to death in his bed. The youth defendant was staying at the Shafer's home at the time of the slaying.

### CURTAILED FARM PROGRAM LOOMS

Limited Funds May Result in Sharp Trimming of Recommendations

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—Working hurriedly to perfect details of the new soil conservation program, AAA officials said last night limited funds may result in considerable curtailment of recommendations made at four regional conferences of farmers.

Secretary Wallace warned farmers that their recommendations might be modified or rejected because of lack of funds or because the program must be built on a national basis.

Planters had asked six cents a pound for cotton which would have been produced on lands suited to other crops, but officials hinted that the payment would not be more than five cents.

Special attention is being given, it is said, to a recommendation at the Chicago regional conference that permits be made for special soil conserving practices. Definite decision has not been reached on many of these.

Recognized "good farming" practices, an official said, may receive consideration as a basis for payment. But the bulk of the funds is expected to go to farmers who shift lands from soil depleting, commercial cash crops to grounds which preserve and build fertility of the soil.
