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PLANNERS OPPOSE SLASH IN CROPS

Twin Falls County Committee Lifts Total Tilled Area

Twin Falls county's agricultural planning committee is not in favor of reducing the county's crop acreage, according to its conclusions announced here today.

On the contrary, the committee recommended production of crops 22.77 per cent, compared with 183,000 acres in crop in 1934; 212,000 acres in 1935, and 217,000 acres in 1936.

For Fewer Beans The committee recommended reduction of only one crop—beans, because of their low acreage as compared with actual acreages of 10,000 in 1934; 9,418 in 1935 and 9,200 in 1936.

The committee also recommended an increase in the acreage of wheat, suggesting use of 42,000 acres for that crop, on the theory that much of it would be sold to "export" markets for wheat and clover.

The committee found no reason for increasing either the number of farms which was 2,765, or the number of acres which was 31,041 in 1935.

The county's total land area is 242,000 acres, of which 248,000 acres is irrigated.
