Thousands Homeless As River Inundates Dozens of Villages

The Ohio river inundated dozens of towns and villages in southwestern Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana Tuesday night as its flood crest passed Cincinnati, leaving 20,000 homeless. The river, however, was reported to be losing some of its surplus and inundating along the lower valley said damage there would be minor.

High waters in other sections were receding as flood-torn communities sought to repair damage. Lists showed 175 dead. More than 40,000 were homeless. Flood and storm deaths by states: Maine, 2; New Hampshire, 1; Vermont, 5; Massachusetts, 10; Connecticut, 4; New York, 2; Pennsylvania, 11; West Virginia, 14; Maryland, 4; Virginia, 41; Wisconsin, 3; North Carolina, 2; Georgia, 2; Tennessee, 1; Ohio, 4; Missouri 4.

OHIO—20,000 homeless in Cincinnati as flood crest passed, inundating dozens of small communities; 90 square blocks in Cincinnati under water, but business activity in flood areas reported to be unimpaired at \$200,000,000; at Portsmouth, where 60,000 persons were reported to be homeless, the river was stationary at 59.36 feet; water falling east of Portsmouth.

KENTUCKY—Louisville floods to 32 to 34 feet of water, four feet above the flood stage, about Saturday; most Kentucky cities along the river escaped serious damage; the water at Maysville held steady at 68.8 feet, but only low-lying sections of the city were inundated.

INDIANA—Dozens of families left their lowland homes along the Ohio; inundation of 78 per cent of town of Washington in Vanderburgh county occurred; rivermen anticipated little damage.

DEMOCRATS UPSET PARTY LEADERS TWIN FALLS COUNTY

M. I. McGuire Succeeds J. W. Porter as Committeeman; Lester New Chairman; Postoffice Fight Factor

A year-old intra-party controversy over the office of postmaster here has resulted in the ousting of Democratic state central committeeman and replacement of the county committee chairman.

M. I. McGuire, Twin Falls business man, was elected to succeed J. W. Porter, veteran attorney and conspicuous figure in the party for numerous years, as state central committeeman.

R. W. Wilson of Kimberly was removed as county chairman and John E. Lester was elected as his successor.

Members of the committee charged that Wilson had failed and refused to call a meeting over since September 24, 1934, to consider the postmastership.

P. W. McRoberts, classified as a Republican, has occupied the position of postmaster here for nearly 10 years and Democratic county central committeemen have made repeated attempts to have a successor named to recommend a postmaster.

After voting the change of administration the committee passed a resolution instructing County Clerk D. W. Ward (D-TIMING) to furnish the committee with the names of the three highest ranking candidates for the office on the city service rolls and to await the committee's recommendation before any of the three will be named postmaster.

STATE INSURANCE FUND REPORTS COLLECTIONS

BOISE, March 24 (AP) — P. C. O'Kallie, manager of the state insurance fund, reported today that premium collections for February totaled \$25,911, with recently received rates in operation. January collections amounted to \$24,000. The state insurance fund writes approximately 80 per cent of the workmen's compensation insurance for companies in Idaho. The premium collections last year totaled \$25,933 of which \$24,053 was paid in compensation to workers or their beneficiaries. \$190,299 was paid for drugs and appliances and \$176 burial expense. Increases were made in five classifications and decreases were made in 42 of the 415 classifications January 1.

SET UP EXPLAINED FOR HEALTH UNIT

County Commissioner Tells of Opportunity Under New Federal Law

Under terms of the new federal health security act, Twin Falls county has an opportunity to be established on a broader scale than the county health unit which was discontinued here three years ago.

A proposed budget for the health unit provides for an expenditure of approximately \$10,000 a year, which federal and state government would provide approximately \$10,000, the commissioner said.

The commissioner suggested that a number of the school districts have employed at their own expense during the recent epidemic of influenza.

Under the proposed set-up for the county health unit, two physicians, two nurses and one sanitarian would be employed full time.

In addition, and without charge to the local sponsoring units, there would be provided the services of two nurses to assist in treating the cars and advise to epidemic months.

The county would be expected to pay one-half of the salaries and traveling expenses plus approximately \$1000 equipment and operating expenses, and would supply quarters for the health unit personnel at the nurses home at the county health office.

The health unit that operated in this county for a number of years prior to 1935 was maintained at the expense of the county in cooperation with the Rockefeller Foundation and the state and federal governments.

FIGHT ON LIQUOR TAKES NEW TACK

Prosecutor and Sheriff Allege Maintenance of Nuisances

Twin Falls county's sheriff and prosecuting attorney tackled alleged traffic in liquor outside of state towns from a new angle yesterday when they started action in five cases against three incorporated towns.

Warrants were issued by Probate Judge Guy L. Kinney late in the afternoon on complaints signed by Sheriff E. F. Prater.

The offense alleged is an indictable misdemeanor. In each case it is alleged that the accused persons have used described premises to sell and give away whiskey and all other alcoholic liquors.

Previously the sheriff and prosecutor have proceeded against alleged private liquor dealers in detention proceedings now pending in the district court, and with 11 arrests on misdemeanor charges of illegal sale of liquor.

Named as defendants in the five cases which Prosecutor Edward Babcock started last evening were: Courtney club, Twin Falls; E. L. Rogers and Dick Toehman, Kilt-Kat club, Twin Falls; W. R. Cameron and Owen Keefe, J. A. Hutchins and Charlie Davis, Kimberly.

Each of the establishments named in yesterday's complaints is involved in one or more of the prosecutor's previous actions against alleged private traffic in liquor.

RED CROSS MOVES TOWARD NEW GOAL

Growing Demands for Relief of Flood-Sufferers Increase Quota

Five days sufficed to put Twin Falls over the top with an over-subscription of its original 6000 Red Cross quota for relief of flood sufferers in the eastern states.

Latest reports from our relief directors now show the field is the total number of men, women and children looking to the Red Cross for immediately emergency relief at 375,000 persons, and the number of victims will increase as the flood crest continues.

Essential Obligations "To meet clear and essential Red Cross obligations to these suffering fellow citizens now it is imperative that we ask you to make every possible effort to secure relief contributions exceeding your original chapter quota by at least 50 per cent."

"As the flood waters recede in some areas, we must continue to feed, shelter and clothe homeless refugees and also extend medical and nursing care in order to prevent epidemics. This will continue for an indefinite period until the Red Cross can aid in repairing damaged homes and victims can return to normal lives."

"We feel confident that the people of your community will wish to increase contributions promptly and generously in order that this emergent human need be met."

BUIL BANK UPHELD ON FRAUD CHARGES

BOISE, March 24 (AP)—In an opinion handed down here the Idaho supreme court modified and affirmed the judgment obtained by the Buhl state bank at Buhl in an action brought in the Twin Falls district court to set aside two conveyances of real estate on the grounds of fraud.

The opinion was written by Chief Justice Raymond L. Olvens and was concurred in by his four associates.

The appellants were W. Wallace Olander and Arthur H. Olander. Defendants who did not participate in the appeal were Mr. and Mrs. John H. Olander of Twin Falls county, parents of the appellants.

The bank had a claim of \$8000 against property of the parents of the Olanders. It foreclosed a chattel mortgage given in security for its claim and then received a deficiency judgment against the Olanders. The bank sought to have the conveyances to the sons set aside on the grounds of fraudulent attempt to escape liability for the deficiency judgment.
