Report That Condemned Man May Be Ready To Talk More, Meets With Denial In Official Quarters

Continuing Investigation Promised

Hauptmann Situation At A Glance

Bruno Richard Hauptmann loses apparently his last two chances of escape from the electric chair Tuesday night as the board of pardons denies his clemency plea and Governor Harold G. Hoffman says "no reprieve."

Arrangements for execution soon after 8 o'clock go forward. Hauptmann must be some way out of the news, Hauptmann tells here "auf wiedersehen" (until we meet again) shortly before adverse decisions announced.

Paul H. Wendel, who "confessed" Lindbergh kidnaping and later repudiated statement, remains in Mercer county jail under guard of state police.

New pardon court and governor's adverse rulings taken to Hauptmann by his lawyer. Reports that Hauptmann might be ready "to talk more" follow announcement of Fisher that Hauptmann sent message to wife to "talk more."

Relatives of Wendel questioned by state police and prosecution officials; Wendel also quizzed on reports of "accomplice" but reiterates denial of connection with crime.

TRENTON, N. J., March 30.—Bruno Richard Hauptmann's execution eve came tonight with only the barest of chances remaining—that he would be saved from the electric chair for the kidnap-murder of the Lindbergh baby.

Denied clemency again by the state court of pardons and with Governor Harold G. Hoffman asserting there will be "no reprieve," Hauptmann is scheduled to die shortly after 8 o'clock tomorrow.

Hope for his life was followed swiftly tonight by fresh reports of possible last-minute developments, including one that Hauptmann might be ready to "talk more," but there were official denials.

In Warden's Discretion Robert W. Hicks, criminologist acting in the governor's stead tonight, said he would see the executive tomorrow regarding the "talk more" offer.

WPA investigation and pointed out the prison warden himself could delay the execution until the end of the week to permit an intensive effort to find new evidence.

Hicks said he talked to the governor tonight and the latter intimated that Governor Hoffman might be ready to "talk more" after Hauptmann's death.

Hicks said Mrs. Anna Hauptmann, the widow of the condemned man, was "very blue but not weeping." He said that also in her hotel room in Trenton.

In a privately worded decision, the court of pardons, also known as the board of pardons, said: "It is not enough to answer one plea for clemency made by Bruno Richard Hauptmann, before the board of pardons of New Jersey, that he was the murderer of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., March 1, 1932, who was killed in the Bronx, N. Y., on the same date."

Gov. Hoffman, who virtually pleaded for Hauptmann's life before the pardons court over which he presided said: "The action of the court of pardons was the final legal action in the Hauptmann case. There will be no reprieve."

Last Hope Faded Only some starting new developments in the case were reported to change his mind and disregard the attorney general's opinion that Hauptmann should be reprieved. He expressed hope that he would be reprieved.

When only about a dozen weeks remained in the WPA project, Hauptmann told them: "Go on and tell them and if you find them sorry do tell us. We are not trying that he should talk to Hauptmann."

It was presumed that this led to her request for permission to make a second visit. The governor was reported to have told the governor what the latter stated: "I was offered reprieve on my life. BORAH AND LONDON DUE FOR COLLISION

Kansas Gathers Delegates to Offset Townsend Endorsement

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. WASHINGTON, March 30.—Prospective collisions in the campaign to nominate Senator Borah of Idaho, and Governor Landon of Kansas for the presidency challenge many Republicans' peace of mind.

Landon Gathers Delegates

Landon alone benefited in actual delegate strength during the week, and is expected to bring his total to 51 out of 1,001. Kansas has 11 and Borah none as yet.

Endorsement of his candidacy by Dr. E. E. Townsend, originator of the \$200-a-month old-age pension law, was received by Borah.

Considered together, the passing days continued much that resembled maneuvering—a word which in this case, each stretched in its way to the approaching showdown.

Topping the week since his belated speech, Borah deflected today to enter the May 15 Oregon primary. A New York delegation invited him to go in there also. They reviewed the situation, but deferred decision until early next week.

If he does so, the New Jersey primary will—may provide his first and only direct test against sentiment for Landon. The regular Republican slate, including Governor Hoffman and former Senator Edge, are entered for the Kansas executive.

By declining to enter California, because it would be impossible for him to campaign there before the count on May 8, Borah passed up an opportunity to contest with Landon.

Republicans there face a choice between a prominent, uncommitted delegate ticket, the latter favored by friends of former President Hoover.

In various other states where Borah is entered, Landon backers look to supporting uncommitted, or "favorite son" delegates.

When in-Office. The practice of such delegations has been condemned by Borah, although he has not named Landon in his public speeches, the fact that some of his "favorite sons" have gone to an office conference with Borah might not wince, the campaign has progressed further.

Governor Landon has shown no hostility to Borah. His attitude, and that of Knox, was reiterated this week in contrast to the senator.

Landon. "I have so tried to conduct myself that after the Cleveland convention the party will be in the most harmonious position so that we can present the strongest front."

If some other man should be nominated I shall work just as hard for his election next November as I would for my own.

I have no plan, or purpose, for bolting the party at the Cleveland convention; but I shall reserve the right to look over their candidates and platform very carefully."
