Italians Report 7,000 Ethiopians Killed In Huge Decisive Battle

Emperor Haile Selassie Declared Leader Of 20,000 Picked Warriors Defeated In Heroic Struggle

(By The Associated Press) ASMARA, Eritrea, April 1.—A one-day battle between Italian northern army troops and the imperial bodyguard of Emperor Haile Selassie just north of Lake Anseba resulted in victory today for the fascist's forces and flight of the attacking Ethiopians. The bodyguard, estimated at 20,000, left behind 7,000 dead. The complete blackshirt victory in a direct battle with the Negus' troops left the imperial bodyguard north of the lake at the head of the highway to Dessale in the heart of Ethiopia. The Italians counted the victory as the most important of the war. It takes All in Attack With one Italian column entering the scene the Negus' Libana Tefu apparently chose to retreat yesterday morning in an attempt to take the army corps and a division of Eritreans along forcing their way southward east of the lake at Mai Cui. The bodyguard stormed the hill, flank in its center south of the Cherere river. The Italians entrenched in the hills around Mai Cui, the Ethiopians came out of the misty dawn, attacking with rifles and machine guns. Within half an hour the entire front of 30 kilometers long was under the attack of the Italian forces in a terrific battle. Three times the Ethiopians rushed the Italian troops with bayonets and wounded. He declared his reason for the telephone call was his fear that a serious Russo-Japanese clash might develop.

MONGOL SOLDIERS DEFEAT INVADERS Heavy Losses Mark Battle; End of Fighting Causes Relief at Moscow

MOSCOW, April 2 (The Associated Press)—Soviet dispatches from Ulan Bator early today said Mongolian troops had recaptured all territory lost to the Japanese Manchukuo troops, pushing the invaders back into Manchukuo with heavy losses. # BORAH AND LANDON CAMPAIGNS CROSS

## New Jersey Primaries Loom as Field of First Meeting

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—Crossing of the combatants to nominate Senator Borah of Idaho and Governor Landon of Kansas for the presidency loomed today as the New Jersey primaries the field of meeting.

After weeks in which the Kansas strength with the state Republican organization had become apparent, Borah finally decided to have his name on when the vote comes May 19, New Jersey has 23 delegates.

East conditions that the two names would be in conflict in Ohio, Nebraska and California each had been belied by developments.

The action taken, Borah headquarters turned attention to Oklahoma and Kansas for the first time. The Oregon election of district delegates tomorrow. Some of the senator's most active supporters had been campaigning vigorously there.

Both party headquarters in the national capital were looking for November. The Democrats boasted that registration in six big California counties was up to 100,000 votes against 77,482 to the Republicans, as compared with 713,922 and 1,039,002 respectively in 1932.

This was cited as illustrative of increased Roosevelt sentiment. "Entirely unopposed," an importer of a pamphlet issued by the Republican leadership contained imports increased 24 per cent last year. ## Heavy Losses Reported

TOKYO, April 1 (AP)—Heavy casualties in Mongolian-Manchoukuo border fighting were reported today in a Japanese military communiqué issued at Hankin which claimed a loss of 12,000 Mongolian soldiers had invaded Manchoukuo.

The communiqué issued in the Manchoukuo capital named a frontier guard on the Manchoukuo soil and that later a strong fight took place "40 to 50 kilometers (25 miles) north of Tzawian, inside Emperor Kang Teh's territory."

Mongolian dispatches claimed Japanese-Manchoukuo troops had invaded Outer Mongolia, only to be repulsed after a battle lasting for more than 24 hours.

The outcome of the fighting was not disclosed.

An intimation that Mongolia used poison gas in the battle was contained in a Domei (Japanese) news agency dispatch from Hankin.

Both the Japanese war and foreign offices said they were ignorant of a reported invasion of Outer Mongolia by Japanese-Manchoukuo forces.

### CONVICT ATTACKS U.S. KIDNAP LAW

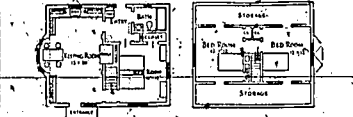
#### Arthur Gosch, Under Sentence of Death, Questions Lindbergh Act

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Conviction of the Lindbergh kidnaping act was challenged in the supreme court today by Arthur Gosch, who faces death by kidnapping two Texas police officers. Gosch is appealing from a ruling March 9 by the 10th circuit court which upheld the law's constitutionality.

Gosch was sentenced to be hanged at McAlester, Oklahoma, by the eastern Oklahoma federal district court. The officers were taken across the Texas line into Oklahoma.

In a previous supreme court hearing in the Gosch case, the high tribunal asked "yes" when asked by the circuit judges whether holding an officer in violation of federal law was an offense to kidnap and transport a person in interstate commerce for the purpose of preventing the arrest of the kidnaper.

#### Three Months' Payments to Idaho Blind, Aged, Children, \$926,250

BOISE, April 1 (AP)—Governor Boise estimated today that \$926,250 will be required for 7,000 aged, blind and 3,000 dependent children in Idaho during April, May and June.

His estimate was contained in figures forwarded to the federal social security board at Washington, D. C. The federal government will receive an average of \$24 monthly, or \$72,000 each month, of which the federal government will provide one-half, the state one-third and the counties one-sixth.

The blind will also receive an average of \$24 each monthly, or \$72,000 a month, of which the federal government will pay one-half, the state one-third and the counties one-sixth.

For the dependent children, who will average \$12.50 monthly, \$37,500 will be required, with the cost divided equally between the federal, state and county governments.

The administrative cost of the program during the fiscal quarter ending in June is estimated at \$50,000. It is in the hands of the Idaho cooperative agency for relief, of which Peter Coon is director-in-charge.

SOCIAL CREDIT
The province of Alberta, Canada, is
engaged in trying out a scheme known
as "Social Credit." The heart of the matter
appears to lie in the promise to pay to
every resident of Alberta over twenty-

social credit certificates which will in effect
be money.
Premier Abernethy of Alberta was
swept into office by reason of this
pledge, and from the day of his election
nearly two years ago until the
present time long lines of patient men
and women have waited outside the
Provincial capitol with eager hands
outstretched for their certificates.

Social Credit is said to have originated
in the fertile brain of one Major
Douglas, an English army officer dur-
ing the World war and an economist
and sociological student of note, the
author of a book on the subject of
social credit. A perusal of the book prior
to the last Provincial election supplied
the inspiration for Premier Abernethy's
promise of twenty-five dollars a month
to the adult population of Alberta. But
Major Douglas is reported to have failed
to accept any of his own theories or
ideas in the Premier's interpretation of
the book, and there the matter stands.

NO MORE "ARYANS"
In protesting sixty-six million Ger-
mans against four hundred and twenty
thousand citizens of Semitic ancestry,
the Nazi government is now going to
drop the "Aryan" and "non-Aryan"
terminology, and hereafter to distinguish
these two classes. Instead of "Aryan,"
the Nazis will refer to their Teutonic
majority as "of German or related
blood."

This is less definite, and therefore
less absurd. For as scholars throughout
the world have been insisting for years,
"Aryan" is one of the vaguest terms
ever used to explain racial origins and
types. The Century dictionary defines
it as meaning:

A member of the Asiatic division of
the Indo-European family, occupying
India and Persia, of the whole Indo-
European family, comprising chiefly the
Hindus and Iranians (Persians), and
the Greeks, Italians, Celts, Slavs and
Teutons, whose languages are all akin."

them up for the other. The one who is
armless reads the textbooks aloud.
One of the pair is the high
ranking scholar in the class. He insists
on sharing the honor with his friend,
without whose help he says he could
not have succeeded. They plan to stick
together and keep up the cooperation
when they start to practice law.

tly well without the other. The fact that
each planned a law career and started
to law school in spite of his physical
handicap showed courage and determi-
nation. The fact that they have been
overcoming their disabilities and have
added comradeship and mutual help-
fulness to their equipment.

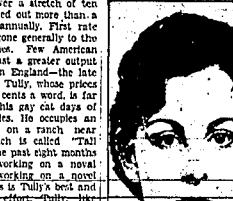

# World's Amateur Golf Champion Turns Professional

## Fast Denver Team Ruled Out of Olympic Basketball Tournament

### Lawson Little And Bob Jones Partners In Promotion Venture

### 'Siege Gun' to Enter Tourneys As Cash Player

By ALAN GOUT (Associated Press Sports Editor)  
AUGUSTA, Ga., April 1 (AP)—W. Lawson Little, Jr., world amateur golf champion for the past two years, tonight announced he has turned professional.

Relinquishing his amateur status in a sudden decision made on the eve of his participation here in the third annual Augusta national invitation tournament, Lawson Little will join Robert T. Jones, Jr., former world champion, in a golf promotion venture sponsored by a leading national sports goods firm (A. O. Spalding and Brothers).

As outlined by Jones and Little, the proposition is a country-wide "education program," including demonstrations, exhibitions and general golf promotion. Lawson Little will sign contracts involving a return of at least \$10,000 to him for the first year, apart from whatever he may make in open competition.

Plays As Pro  
Little's departure from amateur ranks, which has been contemplated for some time, is effective at once. He is now a professional in the tournament scheduled to start here tomorrow.

"I have decided upon a step which will make it possible for me to give up my amateur status, so that I shall not be eligible to defend either the British or American amateur championships, which I have won for the past two years," said Little in a preliminary statement.

Little's competitive plans, beyond his intention to seek the United States open championship this June, are indefinite. He hopes to play in England, late in June, for the British open. Where desirable or practical, he will engage in open competition at home, on a "casual" picking up prize money on an even basis with fellow professionals.

Open Tourneys  
Although he has completed in only a handful of open tournaments in his relatively brief career, the 23-year-old San Francisco, Calif., golfer won the 1934 and 1935 U.S. Open in 1934, with 288. He was low amateur the same year in the American open at Merion, finishing at 147. In the British open he was sixth in the Augusta tournament, with 288, and fourth in the British open, with 290.

"Now that I'm going to make a business of it, I'm going to be tougher and I'll probably get some good back-swinging and counter-rotated the broad shouldered Little.

Agreeing with Jones that the professional work will be "heavy" work, Little added: "There's a big field for the enterprise, including the clubs, public courses, schools and colleges. Only about one person in every 100 is interested in golf now in the United States whereas one out of 27 plays in England."

Jones, although serving as titular head of the new venture, will furnish only his name and name. Little's touring partner this spring and summer probably will include Jimmy Thomson, the long hitting Californian, and Horton Smith.

**GOVERNOR APPEALS FOR BEET ACREAGE**

Ross Predicts Price of at Least \$7; Asks for \$30,000 Acres

BOISE, April 1 (AP) — Governor Ross in a statement issued today appealed to South Idaho farmers to sign sugar company contracts to produce 30,000 acres of sugar beets during the coming season.

Judging from present prospects, prices will be the best in recent years for beet growers, the governor said, predicting that it will be at least \$7 a ton.

The Amalgamated Sugar company is spending several hundred thousand dollars, he said, in repairing and improving machinery in its factories at Paul, Burley and Twin Falls and officials are anxious to get contracts signed as soon as possible.

Beet growers as well as any crop would, production of sugar beets will provide employment for hundreds of men next fall in the harvest season.

At the three factories, the chief executive commented.

**Meeting Scheduled**

Governor Ross is to address farmers interested in growing sugar beets this season at a meeting to be held in Twin Falls high school auditorium at 8 o'clock next Friday evening, under auspices of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and Twin Falls-Jerome District Beet Growers' association. It was announced last evening.

The meeting has been arranged with the purpose of urging an increased acreage of sugar beets for the 1936 season.

Approximately 20,000 acres are covered by contracts already signed for growing of beets in south central Idaho this season, R. H. Trailman, Amalgamated Sugar company manager, announced here last evening. Of the total signed acreage, Twin Falls-Jerome district was credited with 9,131, and Rupert-Burley-Paul district with 9,819 acres.
