Glenn Cunningham and Don Lash Race to New Records

Brevity, Kentucky Derby Favorite, Captures Prepping Event

Great Kansan Uses Finishing 'Kick' To Defeat Picked Field

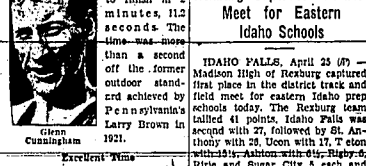
Veteran Miller And Indiana University Ace Brighten America's Olympic Hopes By Speeding To New Marks

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 25 (AP)—Glenn Cunningham, that grand old man of the American foot racing world, and Don Lash, welterweight Indiana university speedster, who may some day take Cunningham's place as ruler of the distance, gave America's Olympic hopes a shot in the arm today by racing to new American records in the 27th annual Drake relay games.

The great Kansan, whose failure to win mile races every time he started in the indoor season caused concern over his Olympic prospects, gave a highly reassuring demonstration in outdoing a picked field in the feature 1,600-yard run.

Glenn not only won, but showed a new dash in the feature, finishing "kick" to finish in 2 minutes, 11.2 seconds. The time was more than a second off the former outdoor standard achieved by Pennsylvania's Larry Brown in 1921.



Excellent time—Cunningham was credited with doing his half mile in 1 minute, 55 seconds and covered the remaining 600 yards in the shortest time of 16.2 seconds.

Lash's contribution to the smash-out of seven records in the 1,600-yard race was equally as convincing as Cunningham's fine job. Not only did he win, but he showed a new dash in the feature, finishing in 2 minutes, 11.2 seconds. Cunningham, who after the first 100 yards, Lash increased his lead so rapidly that he sprang 250 yards ahead of Wayne Slocum of Minnesota.

BRUSHING UP ON THE DERBY

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 25 (AP)—The 1936 Kentucky Derby, the longest running, ding-dong battle to the wire, with the crowd a seething wave of madrons—will be the sixty-second renewal of the Kentucky Derby on May 2 provide it?

Will another Spokane run the heart out of another Preakness? Will there be another jolting, fighting duel to the wire such as Broder's Tip and Head Play staged in 1933?

Nineteen times since the Derby was inaugurated in 1875 there have been heart-stopping finishes, an average of approximately one out of three.

They bring to mind the heroics of Lord Murphy in 1879, the out who fell to his knees in the stretch only to go on and win; of Apollo, Joe Cotton, Arns, Typhoon, Elwood, Pink Star, Paul Jones and Donerelli—to mention a few—all derby winners in dramatic finishes, and of Ben Brush, which carried on to victory in 1899 after stumbling at the start, to note out Ben Der.

Two Great Battles
But the finishes etched most deeply in the memories of turf fans were provided by Spokane and Proctor Knott in 1889 and Broder's Tip and Head Play three years later.

Proctor Knott lost his race before it was run, turf sages declare. Sam Brynner's great colt, the heavy favorite, broke away fast, milking an eighth of a mile each time, before Starter James B. Ferguson got the field away.

The colt was five lengths in front going down the back stretch and was leading by 10 lengths at the wire. Soon thereafter he began to wilt and his nemesis, Spokane, began closing the gap. Spokane was breathing on the favorite's flank and at the eighth pole nudged his nose in front.

He retained these positions to the finish, both held steady under the excitement. Some thought Proctor Knott had been judged the race to Spokane.

Rebounding to the Wire
The stretch battle between Broder's Tip and Head Play was a whiplash, brushing finish which saw Joe's tip win.

The 1919 Derby, in which the first four horses were separated by only a neck, was another dramatic slugged finish. Donohue, the winner, had to weather the fierce stretch drives of Joe Morris, Phishing Bird and Bookie Book, which finished in that order, and was victorious only by inches.

AUDITOR REPORTS HOSPITAL STATUS

County Institution's Total
Earnings for Year Show
Slight Increase

Twin Falls county general hospital, at the close of the fiscal year last January 12, showed a surplus of \$140,633.33. George B. Middleton, public accountant, reported to county commissioners following his audit for that year of all of the hospital's financial transactions and of the county poor fund with which the hospital is included.

Of the total surplus, the auditor reported, \$85,157.69 is capital surplus represented by plant, property and equipment, and \$55,475.64 in operating surplus—reserves, fund cash, accounts, inventories and other assets.

The audit credited the hospital with \$1,388.90 net earnings for the year.

Total earnings, \$93,525.06, showed an increase of \$1,029.90, or 1 1/4 per cent over 1935.

Services Earnings

Earnings from pay patients during the year, \$72,660.01, were 32-41.73 less than those of 1934, a decrease of 2 per cent, while county cases, \$24,865.04, increased \$3,863.63, or 18 per cent over the year before.

Receivables at the close of the year totaled \$41,522, including \$27,051.73 current, and \$14,470.25 delinquent.

Notes and accounts unpaid at the close of the year amounted to \$20,786.42, or 28 per cent of the total revenue from pay patients during the year.

Compared with prior years, there was \$2,537.00, or 30 per cent, unpaid at the end of 1934, and \$18,723.37, or 50 per cent of the total pay patient revenue unpaid at the end of 1935.

Encouraging Trend

"There is an encouraging and encouraging trend toward reduction of outstanding current accounts and notes at the end of each succeeding year, the auditor commented.

On January 12, 1936, the report showed, the hospital had a staff of 40 employees, 10 of whom were nurses, 10 and a ward capacity of 40, with facilities under emergency for as many as 40 more.

The data for the month of October was 33 patients and on October 24 the hospital cared for 73 patients in the rooms and wards.

The ratio of occupancy, based on a 40-bed capacity, was 110 per cent for 1935; 98 per cent for 1934; 77 per cent for 1933.

Hospital records show the following services in the surgical department: during the year, 1935, 1,000 operations; 678; minor operations, 553; transfusions, 145; caesal, 60; total, 1358.
