Twin Falls city council and Police Chief Howard Gillette last night served notice on Twin Falls younger generation and parents that shooting of air rifles within the city limits will not be tolerated.

For several weeks complaints have been coming into the police station of how small boys have shot out windows, plastered other children at play in jeopardy and destroyed street lights, but last night the most serious report came in.

A small boy shooting a high powered air rifle, shot through an automobile window, narrowly missed the driver, and his shot passed through the pane of the window on the other side of the car.

The police chief pointed out that the air rifles, many of which have the power of a 22-caliber rifle, are a menace to the community and announced that the department will start immediate action.

The city ordinance, governing the use of firearms within the city limits, specifically forbids the shooting of air rifles within the city's boundaries.

FRENCH PACT WITH SOVIET CONDEMNED

Marshal Petain Predicts Re-attendance Over Approach to Communism

PARIS, April 30 (AP)— Marshal Philippe Petain, asserted in an interview, published today by Le Journal, that the Franco-Soviet mutual assistance pact was responsible for the swing to the left in last Sunday's parliamentary elections.

Accusing communism as the enemy of France and of liberty, the marshal, one of France's most distinguished military leaders, spoke in praise of Colonel Francois de la Rocque's nationalistic war veterans organization, Croix de Feu.

Marshal Petain declared the treaty by which France and Soviet Russia agreed to defend one another against any unprovoked aggression "does us a very bad service."

"Offering the hand to Moscow, we offer it to communism, and we have lowered the flag," he was quoted as saying. "It was wrong to go to whom, up till now, it has been anathema," he said.

"We have admitted communism into the realm of respectable doctrines. Truly, we are going to repent having done so."

COUNCIL SETS UP \$139,586 BUDGET

Increased General Fund Appropriation Ready for Final Passage

Twin Falls city council members met last night and whipped a \$139,586 general fund budget into shape for the new fiscal year, beginning today. The budget will be formally adopted at the regular meeting next Monday evening. Budget for the past fiscal year was \$117,475.

Due to needed improvements and increase in Twin Falls population, appropriations for all major divisions, funds except administration were increased, but the figure still remains within the city's revenue for the coming year, estimated each receipt being \$160,048.12 and general fund revenue estimate being \$165,248.12.

Salaries increased

Salary increases, to go into effect June first, played a major part in the increased city expenses. Police department appropriation was boosted from \$15,830 to \$18,003, provision being made for employment of an additional patrolman. Fire department appropriation was raised from \$13,310 to \$14,615.50. City buildings from \$280 to \$310; street-cleaning and oiling anticipated, from \$23,950 to \$23,000; water, with additional pipe fittings, meters and labor needed, from \$13,800 to \$22,625; fire, with provision made for new chlorination equipment, from \$15,600 to \$18,400; parks from \$10,775 to \$6,000; meat and dairy, from \$2,170 to \$2,525; engines, from \$1,120 to \$2,000 to provide for possible discontinuance of government engineering aid; scales to remain at \$100.

Compensation Ends

Discontinuance of a \$200 appropriation for workmen's compensation needed under the IERA, permitted a decrease in the administration budget, from \$18,815 to \$16,642.50.

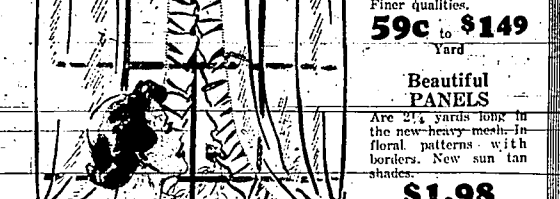

DESIGNER VISIONS BIGGER AIRLINERS

Sikorsky Says—New Giant Planes—Will Traverse Ocean Routes

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—For Sikorsky, designer and builder of airplanes and flying boats, announced tonight his organization is prepared to produce giant airplanes to meet every demand of oceanic flying.

"We believe it must be a flying boat—with four-to-six engines. Probably powered with a reasonable speed of from 150 to 180 miles an hour," he said in an address before the institute of aeronautical science.

"The ship will have excellent interior living quarters, fully comparable with the accommodations on board a small sized steamer, comfortable stateroom which will have nice sleeping accommodations, a large dining room which would be used for meals and also a lounge or dancing saloon during the evening."

A crew of eight to ten men will be needed and a passenger list of at least 20 must be carried. He would need a ship of 40 to 50 tons will perhaps become the smallest of the successor-developers.

"We will see much larger flying boats from one to several hundred tons gross weight," Sikorsky predicted.

"The biggest of the clipper ships flying the Pacific is 25 tons."

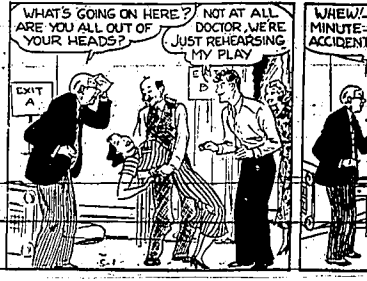

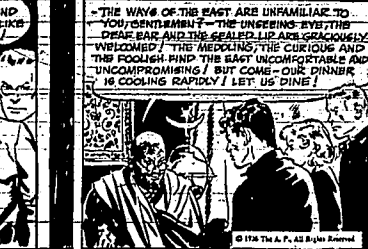


