Eager Fascists Stage Advance Celebrations As War Nears Climax

(By The Associated Press) ROME, May 1.—While unexpected difficulties retarded an Italian army's descent upon Addis Ababa, pent-up fascist eagerness to celebrate the war's climax tonight burst its bounds.

Premature demonstrations and a widespread display of the national colors in many cities gave the nation its own version of America's first Armistice day celebration in 1918. The conviction that a dramatic climax of the war had arrived was particularly widespread in northern Italy.

As a motorized column approached Addis Ababa its progress was retarded by great holes blasted in the road by retreating Ethiopians. There had been fierce battles—three days ago—near the city.

Badoglio's headquarters, it was reported, had been moved 20 kilometers (62.5 miles) south of Dessie.

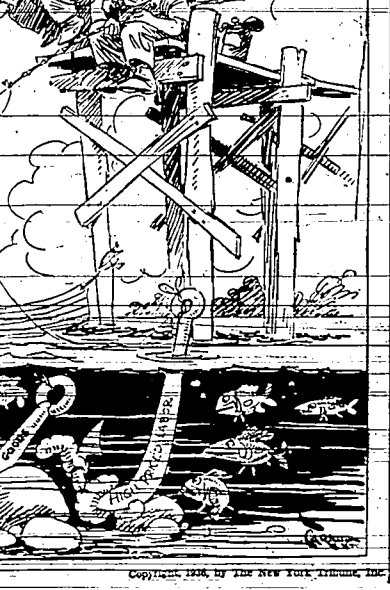

Wooden Salad Bowl Is Emblem of Hospitality

Although a comparatively newcomer to the household, the salad bowl is ready to become an emblem of American hospitality. Generous of size as a rule, and filled with attractively arranged and appetizing combinations of fruits or vegetables, it bids fair to make a place for itself in the American tradition of hospitality similar to that achieved by the samovar in Russia.

Wooden salad bowls are the most popular here and whether yours is made of pine, matched woods or naturally heavy, the bowl should be treated according to the traditions which have been established for it. First, rub the bowl on the inside with a little real mayonnaise. Then, for flavor, rub a tiny piece of garlic around its inner surface. The bowl should never be washed. Instead, wipe it thoroughly with a dry towel.

Orange Salad
Line the salad bowl with crisp lettuce. Alternately arrange orange slices and salad.

- Soak gelatin five minutes in cold water and dissolve in remaining juice. Chill until slightly firm, beat until frothy and fold in remaining ingredients. Pour into tray in mechanical refrigerator and freeze four hours or until stiff. Cut in squares or slices. Serve on crisp lettuce and top with more dressing. This salad can be frozen by backing in mold and burying four hours in four parts chopped ice to one part coarse salt.

- Strawberry Filled Cake Dessert
- 1/2 cup fat
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2/3 cup vanilla
- 1 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups pastry flour
- 2 cups sifting baking powder
- 1 pint vanilla ice cream
- 1 cup confectioner's sugar

- Cream fat and sugar. Add eggs, milk, extract, salt, flour and baking powder. Beat two minutes. Pour into two layer cake pans and bake 40 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and berries mixed with confectioner's sugar as filling. Cover top layer with cream and berries.

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Springtime Is Season For Fruit Shortcakes

Windows full of ripe red strawberries, red raspberries and other typically spring fruits conjure up a picture of big rich shortcake heaped with whipped cream.

Not Just Sponge Cake
There's a goodly number of people to whom sponge cake means simply plain sponge cake with berries and cream, but to those of us whose mothers have handed down the good old-fashioned recipe from grandmother's kitchen, shortcake has just one meaning, extra rich, extra crisp biscuit crust with melted butter baked between the layers. This crust absorbs less fruit juice and gives a more delightful contrast of flavor and texture than a sponge short cake. It's easy to prepare, quick to bake and has endless possibilities of variety in service.

For filling, use your family's appetite as a guide. Strawberries, blackberries, sliced pineapples and strawberries, sliced oranges or even whole unseeded fruit make delightful fillings. Crush them enough to draw juice and heap them between the layers. Use the whipped cream as a garnish with a few whole berries for garnish.

WHEN SUNDAY NIGHT SUPPERS ARE CASUAL

A rarebit is one of the simplest yet the most successful dishes for the casual Sunday night supper. Diversifications of the customary recipe, blending the flavor are easily acquired. Use this as a foundation:

- Melt in a double saucepan, two lumps of butter, half a pound of grated cheese, a dash of pepper and salt; then add slowly half a cup of onions, or, preferably, cream. For variations:
 - Add two tablespoons of tomato ketchup and a drop or two of Worcester sauce.
 - Add one onion, finely grated; one chopped green pepper; and a chopped pimiento.
 - Add a cupful of left-over, broken up white fish, such as haddock, halibut, swordfish.
 - Add half a cupful of chopped stuffed olives.
 - Add a cupful of diced, cooked corn and dried-lard-baked-egg-slices.

SWISS JAM CAKE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs

- 2 1/2 cups pastry flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
