Americans Jingoized in Loot of Addis Ababa

Tension Tightens In Republican Camp Over Choice For President

Uncertainty Prevails Over Trends In Forthcoming Votes In 10 States; Recorded Results In Dispute

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The capital welcomed a respite from politics tonight with the significance of recent primary results in dispute and uncertainty over what trends might be shown in ten states voting next week.

Of the 1,100 Democratic delegates who will renominate President Roosevelt and Vice President Garner, 482 have been chosen. They are expected to meet in administration, but possibly not without opposition, to abrogate the traditional rule requiring a two-thirds majority to nominate.

Clashes Conflict With 527 Republican delegates instructed of the 620 so far selected, claims on how they stand conficted. Encouragement drawn from the Massachusetts primary and reports of Alf M. Landon accounted for the greater interest with which the group is abating.

Former Senator Moses of New Hampshire noted, however, that control at Cleveland will be divided by the huge uncommitted majority, of those already said to be, he claimed, 160 for Colonel Frank Knox, the Illinois publisher.

Landon headquarters have made no claims reaching into the nominally uncommitted delegates. But Senator Charles McNary reported to reporters that Landon would "unquestionably" get the nomination.

The Moses claim for Knox represented an increase of 18 from the 153 claimed before. McNary's supporters in Pennsylvania, where Borah was unopposed, his backers said at least 30 of the 75 delegates elected were pledged to Landon.

Karpis, the nation's most widely sought criminal, had been taken to the scene of the crime here by airplane, said Karpis was "so damned scared he couldn't talk."

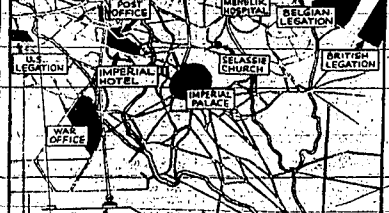

Plunderers Range Unrestrained

Foreigners Take Refuge In Legations As Situation Gets Out Of Control When Royal Family Flees



ETHIOPIA bullet struck the American legation where more than 20 foreigners took refuge when rioting started and fire broke out yesterday in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia's capital, which was abandoned by the government when the invading Italian armies approached.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Fire, pillage and riot raged in Ethiopia's ancient capital of Addis Ababa tonight as the Italian government, bands of plunderers poured through the town.

The royal family had fled the city in the anticipation of an attack by advancing Italian troops. The American legation, where more than 30 foreigners were taking refuge, was struck by stray bullets.

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Staff Editor) CHURCHILL DOWNS, LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 2 (AP)—Bold Venture, the longest shot winner in 18 years, survived a rough and tumble thoroughbred battle as well as a thrilling stretch drive to capture the sixty-second Kentucky derby before the greatest crowd ever gathered for America's most spectacular horse race.

To the astonishment of the overflow through of 62,000 spectators and confusion of the form players, Bold Venture stood off a terrific stretch challenge from Brevity, the 4 to 5 favorite, and won by a scant half inch, equivalent to \$250.00 on the dollar, was the biggest since Terminator finished home in front in 1918 and paid the equivalent of \$23.60 to one.

Bold Venture's victory, worth \$177,250 to his owner, was the total derby purse of \$48,150, eliminated a startling sequence of events, all packed into slightly more than two minutes of thrilling excitement, stunning surprise and uncomprehending tactics.

So bitterly-waged was this battle of speed and stamina, as the 14 horses sprang from the stall gates that William Woodard Granville, one of the prime coaches, lost his jockey, while the highly-favored Brevity was nearly knocked off his feet at the outset, and Ira (Babe) Hanford, the winning rider, was promptly suspended for rough riding, along with two other jockeys.

It didn't alter the outcome of the race, but it capped the climax of another highly disputed running of the Bluegrass classic as the riders—of three—the first four horses were set down, each for 15 days, suspended along with the youthful Hanford were George Burns, who rode Indian Broom, and the late, late...

Into third place, six lengths behind Brevity, and Nick Wall, who took a similar place with C. B. Shafter's Goldstream, three lengths further back.

Most of the rough riding and bumping took place in the first dash down the stretch while the field battled for positions before reaching the first turn. Brevity, knocked to his knees within a few strides of the start, got all the work of the early going and lost many lengths before jockey Willie Wright of Rexburg, Idaho, could settle the favorite into his stride, Indian Broom, and absorb a share of bumping and race paced past the stands for the first time, with He did and Goldstream on top.

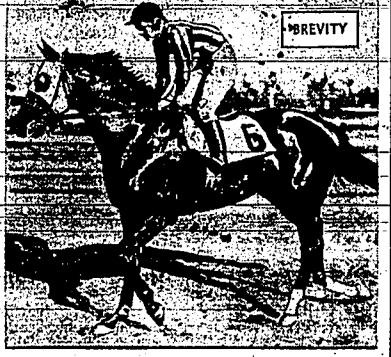
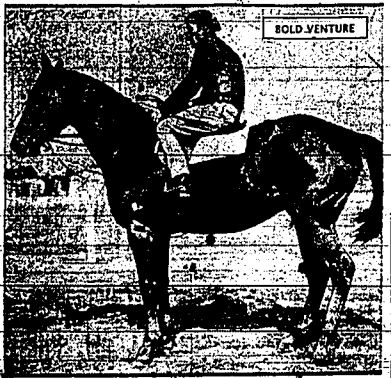
Quickly Sprints Forward Bold Venture did not slowly but quickly sprinted to a forward position, gained command in the long run down the back stretch, and had sufficient margin to meet the final stretch drive to stand off Brevity's gallant challenge.

With both Hanford and Wright riding the place with a two-horse finish over the last quarter mile, Bold Venture had the lead and was bumping out for the long run home, and looked like a decisive winner until the last eighth. Brevity had already closed a heavy lead and was pulling into second place, coming into the last 1/8 and the favorite.

With a sixteen-to-one to Bold Venture was a half length behind and gaining with a stride, Bold Venture hung on to his lead until the wire first—Brevity was flying, striking the stronger of the two, but he was not to be deterred.

On a track that was like lightning, the place with a 2:02 3/5, fastest time for the derby since Twenty Grand lowered the record to 2:01 4/5 in 1911 and the third fastest of all time.

In the "Pink" trained acutely by Max Hirsch and unobscured by his tie to the proverbial "pink" for today's race, Bold Venture needed to have no apologies to his equine rivals. Brevity may have been the best horse in the field, but Bold Venture's performance, under the best of circumstances, was something to write about.
