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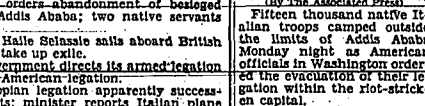
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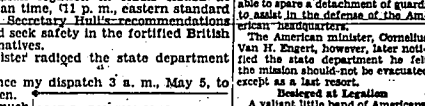
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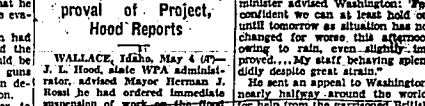
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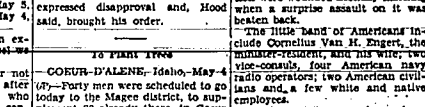
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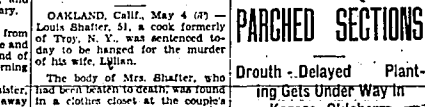
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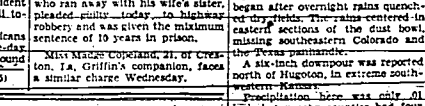
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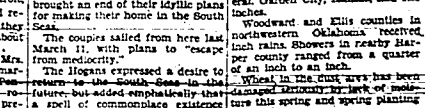
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ADJUTANT GENERAL VISITS GUARDSMEN

EXTORTION, FRAUD SUSPECTS JAILED

Federal Prisoners in Twin Falls to Await Day in Court

Accused of attempting to extort \$3000 from George King, Nampa, Idaho, packer, last Friday, Fay Edward Burrows, 20, of Seattle, Idaho, was lodged in Twin Falls county jail yesterday in default of \$3000 bond to await hearing in the federal district court.

Burrows was accused of threatening, in a mailed letter, to harm King or members of his family unless a demand was complied with, and he was arrested by Nampa officers when he assertedly put in an appearance at the place where he is alleged to have instructed the Nampa man to leave the money.
