There is no question but what Italy needed a military victory on foreign soil. A Fascist dictatorship may at one time have been Italy's only salvation but there are not-looking-signs which point to the conclusion that a growing restlessness has been gradually taking the place of the old enthusiasms.

It is a question if Italy will profit greatly from her acquisition of this rain soaked, sun drenched land, with its precipitous mountains, its narrow valleys and craggy canyons. Set up for show purposes at the beginning of the first campaign as a country of fabulous wealth...

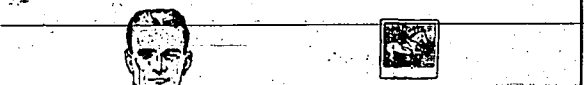

WOMAN FACES TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Mary Hanson Pleads Not Guilty in Shooting of Negro Porter

Accused of first degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Charles Harris, 23, Negro porter and bootblack in Twin Falls last April 21, Mary Hanson, 37-year-old Negro housemaid, will go on trial in the district court here next Monday.

After the trial was set yesterday by District Judge Adam B. Barclay when the accused woman pleaded not guilty after the court overruled her demurrer to the prosecutor's information.

Judge Barclay ordered drawing of 50 jurors to be in attendance on the court next Monday.

Overruling a demurrer in the case of Harry Noh, Twin Falls sheepman convicted of herding sheep on lands designated as cattle range under state law, Judge Barclay denied the contention of Noh's attorneys that the federal government, through the Taylor grazing act, has superseded the state grazing laws. Noh appealed from judgment in the prothonotary court where he was found guilty of the misdemeanor charge and sentenced to pay one dollar fine and costs.

Judge Barclay also overruled demurrers in three actions for abatement of alleged liquor nuisances, wherein defendants asserted their claim of right to resell liquor purchased from state liquor stores.

The murder-charged woman, who has been held without bail since arrested at her office and gave herself up shortly after the alleged shooting, was in the district court yesterday for a second time. On the first occasion when she was arraigned she asked for two days to enter her plea.

Turney K. Hackman, Twin Falls attorney, was entered as associate counsel with W. L. Dunn of Twin Falls in presentation of the woman's defense.

SALMON CANAL DATES 14-DAY RUN OF WATER

HOLLISTER, May 6—Salmon River Canal company will begin a 14-day water run May 12, according to announcement here today by W. M. McDaniel, superintendent.

A reservoir range feeding tunnel was 20 1/2 miles with a grade of .0273, 200 feet. A year ago the gauge reading was 1820 with storage of 20,000 acre feet.

Three-tenths of an acre foot of water per share has been allotted to date.
