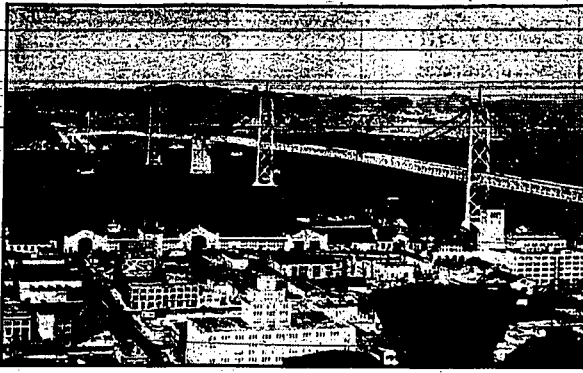

Depression 'Back-To-The-Soil' Movement Brings Biggest Farm Increase To East

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The restless portion of America's population may again be on the march in a reenactment of western migrations of the past three centuries.

A hint of this possibility is seen in a new census bureau report showing that the depression-born population movement resulted in an increase of 233,702 farms in the United States between 1930 and 1935.

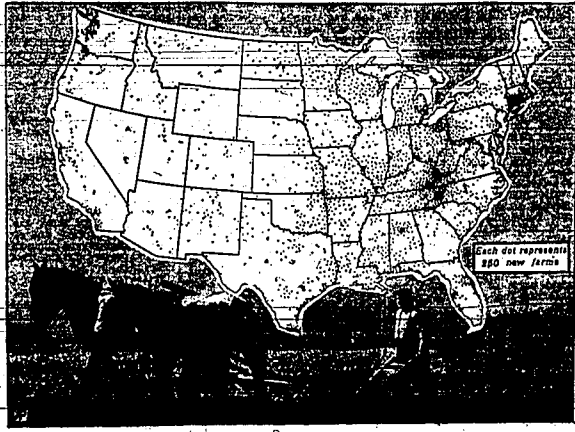
Most of the increase is confined to the poor and overworked lands of the east, the report declares, leading Secretary Wallace to ask:

"What will the maps for the census of 1940 and the farm census of 1945 show? Will we have a continuation of this movement back to the land, a second settling on the soil, steadily sweeping westward like the currents of migration of the past thousand years and more?"

Largest Farm Population

The report on 1935 tabulations declares that a "back-to-the-farm" movement of depression refugees, plus a large number of young farm people who remained on farms instead of migrating to cities, has increased the number of farms from 6,238,445 in 1930 to 6,472,147 in 1935 and resulted in the largest farm population in the history of the country—32,779,000 people.

This movement is believed to be still under way. Some agricultural economists believe population pressure in the cities and inability of the new farmers to make a living in the New England and southern Appalachian-hill-and-mountain areas will force them gradually westward in a new conquest of the soil.



As the dots on this map indicate, the New England and Appalachian regions acquired the greatest number of new farms between 1930 and 1935 when the nation's farms increased 233,702, or 3.7 per cent. A census bureau report says the depression has caused a "back-to-the-farm" movement, boosting the farm population to the largest in history. Possibility of another western migration is seen.

In many of these eastern areas, federal and local government agencies, according to estimates of the department of agriculture, from one-third to three-fourths of the rural families are receiving relief from
