Hayden Bates of Boise, Mont., a member of the publications committee resigned two weeks ago. "If I hadn't they'd have got me too," he said today.

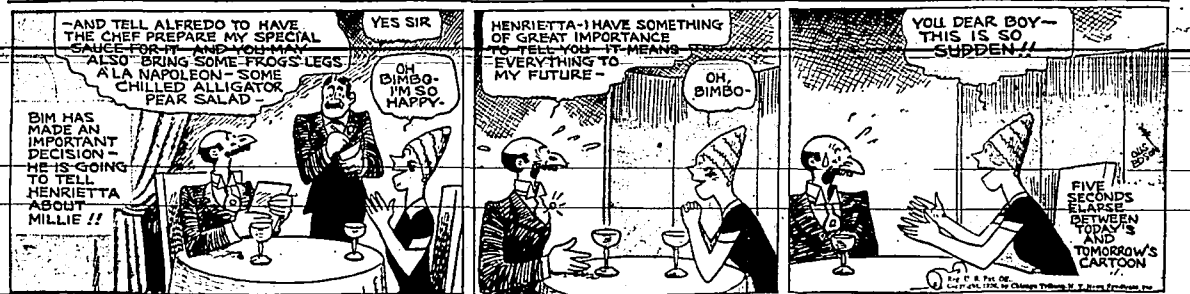

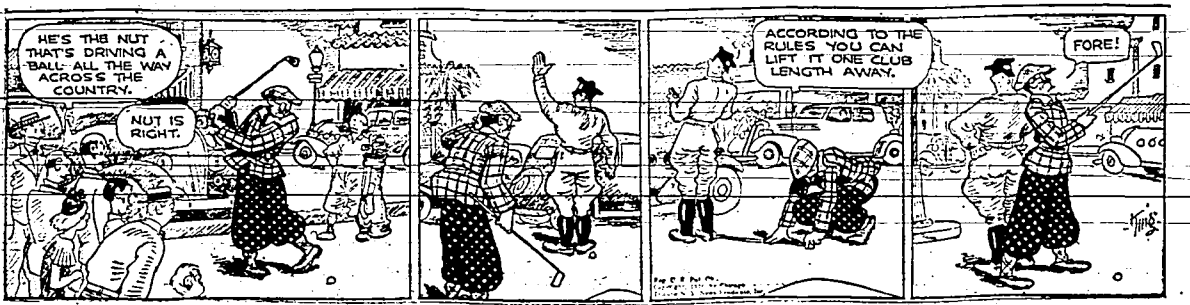

THREAT OF DEATH HINTED AT TRIAL

Charles Harris' Fiance Tells of Interview With Accused Woman

A personable young Negro woman, Elizabeth Harris, who came to Twin Falls from Tulsa, Oklahoma, last April 16 to marry Charles Harris, 23-year-old, only a month and a half, testified in the district court here yesterday that "Mary Hanson, 27-year-old Negro housemaid, told her about three hours before Harris was shot and fatally wounded last April 21 that he would not see her that night."

Tall, gaunt, ebony hued Mary Hanson, on trial for first degree murder of Harris, allegedly her sweetheart for a year and a half, heard the other woman's testimony without evidence of any emotion, big brother, Dave Turner, at her side her with something like a sneer, playing about the lips.

The Oklahoma woman's testimony marked a high point in the prosecution's case which began yesterday. Following the testimony, the jury late Tuesday, and which is expected to wind up early this afternoon.

State Morris Bapilly, attorneys introduced testimony of Mrs. Hanson, the only known eye-witness to the shooting; Mrs. Elizabeth Yarborough, owner of the residence where both Harris and Mary Hanson were lodged; Mrs. Pauline Yarborough who said Harris was shot; and Mrs. Mary Hanson, who said she saw Harris and then shot him.

The witness followed by Mrs. Hanson testified that Harris died from a shot in the back, and members of the sheriff's force who identified the calling revolver and cartridges that the accused woman turned over to the officers when she ran to the sheriff's office after the shooting.

Mrs. DeVault testified she heard two shots fired and that "this (Harris) was the same one who had a gun." The witness said Harris, wounded in the hand and arm, had wrested the gun from Mary Hanson and handed it to her, and that she had given it back to the Negro woman who demanded it.

The Oklahoma woman's testimony was admitted in evidence over strenuous objection to W. L. Dunn, defense attorney, who subsequently in cross-examination caused her to repeat it many times.

During the interview, she said her brother-in-law in Twin Falls had met Harris and that she and Harris began to correspond last November. She and Harris exchanged photographs, she said, and she agreed last November to marry him and came here in April for that purpose.

She said that she had received a letter from Mary Hanson about April 4, before she left Oklahoma. The letter was marked by the prosecution for identification, but its contents were not disclosed.

On the morning of the day Harris was killed, the witness said, Mary Hanson came to her sister's home and told her that "she was the lady who had sent me the letter" and that she had been referring to Harris in him as "no good" and "low grade" and "one who couldn't support a woman." Then the witness said, Mary Hanson told her Harris owed her money and had refused to pay it, and "every time he has come to see you."

"Did you give him permission to see me this evening?" the witness said she asked.

To which she said Mary Hanson replied, "You won't see him this evening."

The witness said she answered, "I think I will see him," and she said, Mary Hanson replied, "I can assure you that you will not see him."

"Did you see him that evening?" Prosecuting Attorney Edward Babcock inquired.

"No," the witness answered almost lamely.

Attorney for the accused woman, W. L. Dunn, of Twin Falls, asked during the evening "several points" developed in evidence support our theory of the case."
