Dean of Ohio College Named President-Elect of A. M. A.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 14 (AP)—The American Medical Association today elected as its next president, Dr. John H. J. Upham of Columbus, Ohio, a strong advocate of "keeping medical practice individualistic" and chose Atlantic City for the 1937 convention.

Dr. Upham, 64-year-old dean of the Ohio State university college of medicine, announced immediately he would strive to maintain independence of his profession. He will take office next year.

Dr. Charles Gordon Heyd of New York was elected vice president of the association, a choice commanding more than usual interest because of the crisis in this position. Dr. J. H. T. Mason of Seattle, the vice-president, cannot assume the title of president but will be the officer in case of the latter's death.

Methodists Complete Election Of Bishops (Continued From Page One)

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 14 (AP)—Dr. W. H. C. Brown, Columbus, president of the Methodist conference, was elected a member of the Methodist board of bishops tonight on the 11th ballot with a total of 201 votes.

Dr. Omann, who withdrew after the second ballot when he had 227 votes, only 87 fewer than the two-thirds majority needed, filled the fourth and last vacancy on the board.

The general Methodist conference gave him a tremendous ovation and he was conducted to the platform to join the three elected previously. They were Dr. Wilbur Hammar of Youngstown, Ohio, Dr. Charles Flint, chancellor of Syracuse university, and Dr. Alexander E. Shaw of New Orleans, the Negro member.

Dr. Omann's supporters reentered him in the race tonight when the 11th ballot failed to elect the fourth member.

The McNary-Nelson-Brown race has an interesting counterpart on the Democratic ticket. Willie Mahoney, mayor of Klamath Falls, and John A. Jeffrey, Portland attorney, are battling for Townsend support. An effort is being made to have the Republican nominee for the senate in the fall.

Ralph Williams, Portland, national Republican committeeman for a quarter of a century, is opposed by Ben Morris, Eugene, prominent legislator, and Charles L. Paine, Eugene.

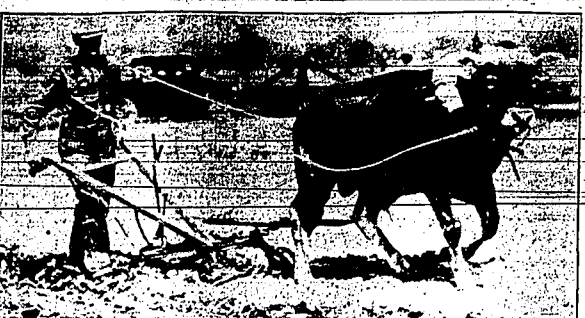

DEADLY SHOOTING CALLED ACCIDENT

Murder Charged Woman Tells Own Story of Harris' Death

Mary Hanson, Negro housemaid, accused of first degree murder of Charles Harris, Negro porter and shoemaker, testified in the district court here yesterday afternoon that Harris was the man she had expected to marry and that he was accidently shot and fatally injured while they struggled for possession of a .32 calibre revolver in her hand in a garage here the afternoon of last April 21.

Immediately before the shooting, the woman said, Harris had threatened her life with a knife the blade of which she said was "eight or nine inches long." He carried the knife constantly, she said. The gun, she said, had been in her possession since 1925.

Leading to trouble between the two women testified was the disclosure of Harris' interest in another woman, Elizabeth Wolfe, who testified as a witness Wednesday, that she had come here from Tulsa, Oklahoma, last April 16, following several months correspondence with him, and that she had expected to marry him.

Record of Devotion

The accused woman testified that she had loaned Harris money before joining him and had guaranteed payment of his room rent, and that she had advanced the money with which Harris paid Elizabeth Wolfe's bus fare from Tulsa to Twin Falls.

Notwithstanding knowledge of this, Mary said, Elizabeth told her she regarded Harris as a "much right" man, and explained that she had told her, "if you are not married to him I have as much right to him as you have."

Cross examination of the accused woman by Prosecuting Attorney Edward Babcock and Turner E. Blackman, special prosecutor, had not been completed when court adjourned last evening.

Defense attorney, W. L. Dunn, said he would offer testimony of three or four witnesses.

Mary Hanson testified Harris flew into a rage when she reminded him she had guaranteed payment of his room rent after he spoke of needing money for his car during a brief conversation that preceded the fatal affray.

Harris, she said, struck her twice in the face and then produced the big knife and held it against her breast, when he told her he had a "good notion to cut your throat."

The woman said she freed herself and picked up her revolver, and that was to be washed. Together, she said, they started toward the garage, Harris carrying the knife

and the woman carrying the gun. Harris opened his eyes and picked up the blanket, she said. He handed it to her and when she started to take it, she said, he seized the left hand and arm in which she carried the gun.

Willie testified she grabbed the gun but it went off. Harris fell forward on his left side and the woman stopped back. There was another shot, the woman said. Harris got to his feet, and both left the garage. Harris said she directed the woman and she said she turned again a moment later in the house where both were lodged. Harris said she grabbed her and she directed him through the house into the yard.

She had turned the gun over to a neighbor, Mrs. DeVault, believed to be the only eye-witness to the shooting and a state witness. The accused woman said she asked for the gun and Mrs. DeVault returned it.

Then, the witness said, the gun went off again, but it was pointed downward, and not toward Harris.

She said she left the scene then and went first to her former employer's home, and then to the sheriff's office where she turned the gun over to the officers and was arrested.

The accused woman denied that in an interview with Elizabeth Wolfe and her sister about two hours before the shooting she had told Elizabeth she was sure Harris would not see her that evening. What she said, she testified, was that Harris had promised to take her in a picture show that evening.

The accused woman was called to the witness stand immediately after her attorney outlined her defense at the opening of the afternoon session.

The state rested at noon after introducing testimony by Elizabeth Wolfe, sister, who had heard the interview that preceded the shooting, and by other witnesses to the effect that Mary Hanson purchased cartridges for her gun that day.

MEAT PRODUCERS ORGANIZE PROJECT

Murtaugh Man Heads Corporation in Support of Processing Plant

A plan for establishment of a \$174,000 meat processing plant in south central Idaho was launched last evening when approximately 50 farmers and business men from Cassia, Jerome, Gooding and Twin Falls counties met in Twin Falls.

The newly formed organization adopted the name, Associated Meat Producers, Incorporated, and 30 persons signed as incorporators and pledged to pay a \$1 membership fee. Elected chairman of the tentative board of directors was Oliver Johnson of Murtaugh, with P. L. Atkins of Buhl, secretary-treasurer.

Counties Represented

The executive board will be composed of two members each from Twin Falls, Cassia, Jerome, Gooding, Lincoln, Minidoka, Camas and Blaine counties, and upon establishment of the plant, Elmore, Owyhee and Power counties are also to be included in the set up.

A site for the proposed plant will be selected by the board members who are also making a study of cooperative organizations, articles of incorporation and financial possibilities.

P. Lee Johnson, state commissioner of agriculture, addressed the meeting, telling of the possibility of securing governmental funds to back the project.
