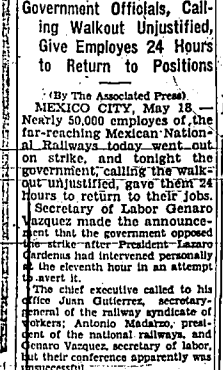

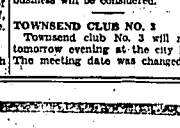

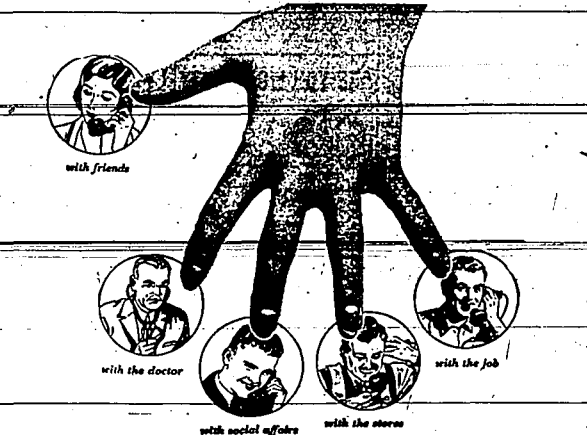

In the course of the flight the aviators took a dozen pictures including views of hitherto unexplored parts of the region.

"It was a great experience and something I may try it again—when I have enough nerve," Russ Mingo, one of the trio, said. Other members of the party were Daniel Pfaff and LeRoy Stevens.

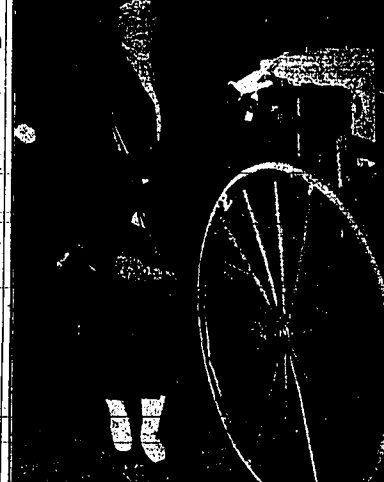
