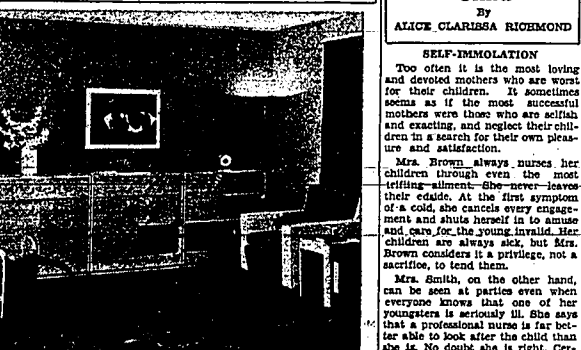

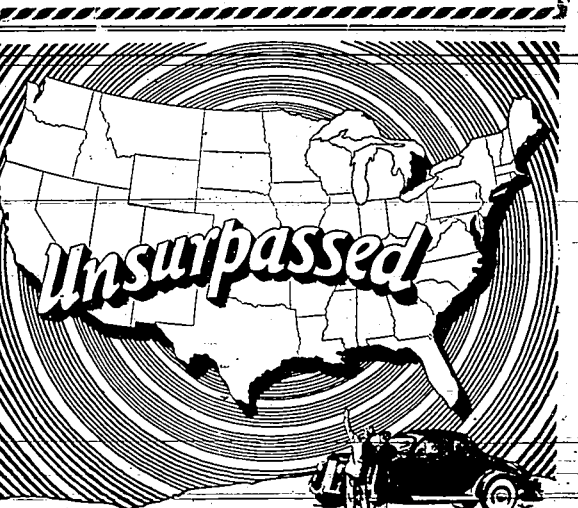

In line with the system practiced in England, where specialists are designated as the "medical minds" of the court, the plan will be to have a trial in the federal courts in Boston next week.

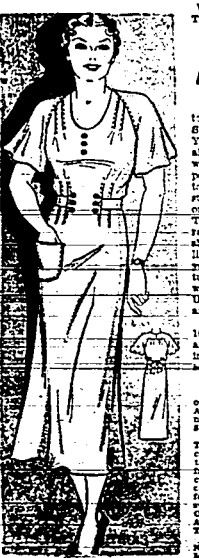

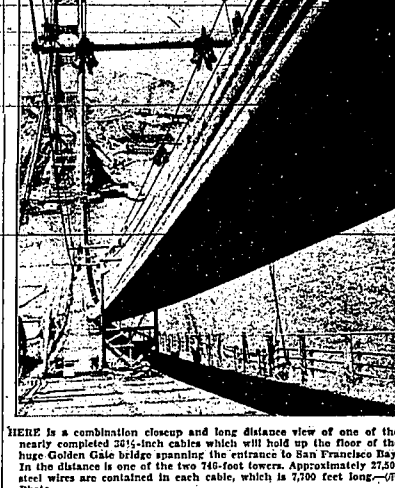
