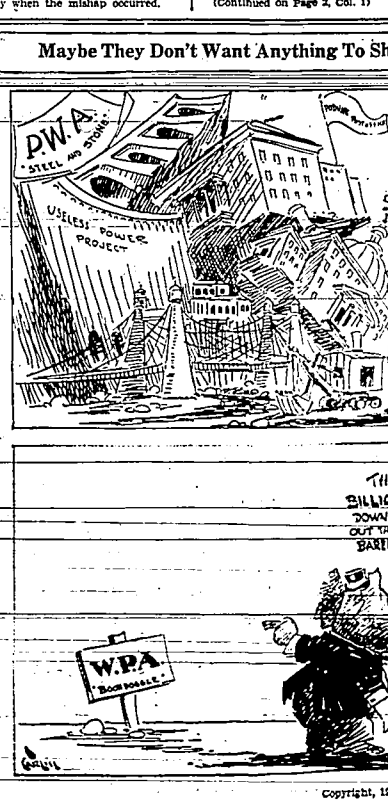

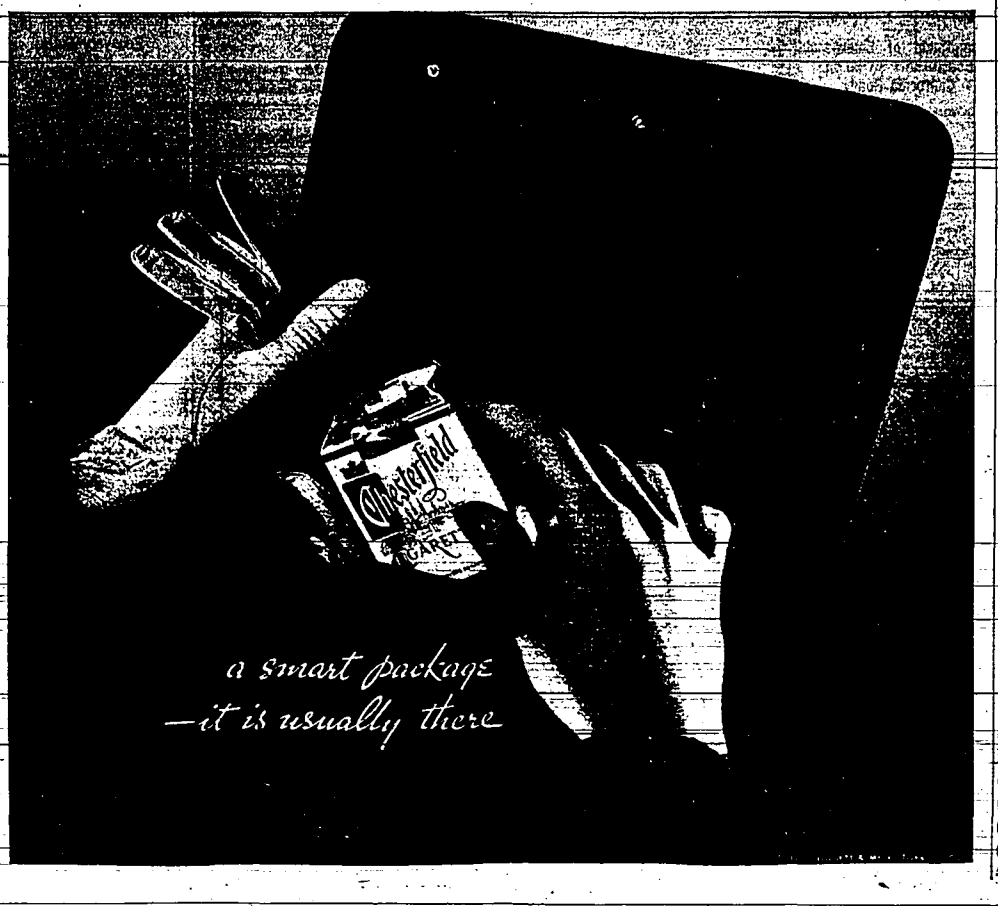

IDAHO MAPS NEW HIGHWAY PROGRAM

State Provides \$1,020,000 for \$2,559,000 Fund for Next Few Months

BOISE, May 21 (AP)—J. H. Glemmer, state highway engineer, said today that \$1,020,000 will be expended during the next few months on highway construction, a traffic survey and beautification.

Of the amount the state will provide \$1,020,000, and the rest will come from the federal government. The traffic survey will require \$38,000 and highway beautification \$26,000.

There will be 131 miles surfaced and 60 miles graded; 8 miles paved with concrete and 49 miles surfaced and graded.

POCATELLO, May 21.—The chief justice of the Idaho supreme court, Raymond L. 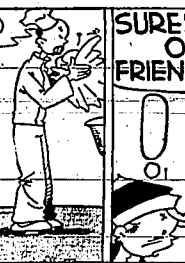
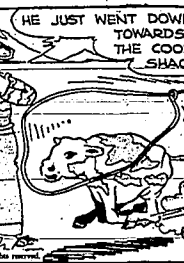
They were facing each other in Martin's little room on the third floor. Dirk's thousand speculations swirling through his mind, could not help observing that Martin himself looked ill.

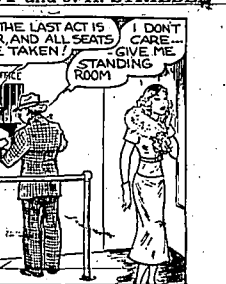




