SUPREME COURT KILLS NEW DEAL BANKRUPTCY ACT

Measure Designed to Aid Municipalities in Cutting Indebtedness Declared in Violation of State Rights

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—In a sharply divided 5-to-4 decision which "killed" another law enacted under the new deal, the supreme court today declared unconstitutional the 1934 municipal bankruptcy act.

DISSENTING OPINION

A dissenting opinion, written by Justice Cardozo, and concurred in by Chief Justice Hughes and Justice Brandeis, was sharply challenged by the majority and spoke of the care with which the governmental power of the state and its officials maintained inviolable the constitution.

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STUDY OF NEW TAX MEASURE CONTINUES

Demand for More Information Delays Action on Relief Bill

WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—Despite a day of slow progress made on the vital relief and tax bills, hopes for adjourning congress by the end of next week diminished somewhat tonight with forecasts of action for tomorrow.

The senate Democratic leader, Senator Robinson of Arkansas, contended there was still a good chance for adjournment before the Republican national convention.

Search for additional revenue tied up the tax bill in the finance committee, as administration financing of the new revenue bill, \$200,000,000 of annual revenue asked by President Roosevelt.

Relief Bill Delayed

Republican demands for additional information blocked the action by the appropriations subcommittee on the \$2,544,000,000 relief-deficiency bill. Chairman Adams (D-Colo.), although he remarked that some members of his group did not seem in a hurry about acting on the bill, forecast the bill would be approved tomorrow by the subcommittee.

Twin Falls Caravan Views Extensive Operations of El-Koro Company

That they were entertained royally at Jarbridge Sunday was the word brought back to Twin Falls by approximately 100 business members of a good will caravan who made the trip to the Nevada gold mining center, to view extensive mining operations there as guests of the El Koro Mines Operating Company.

The Twin Falls delegation was shown through the mine and was entertained in dinner in the company dining hall.

Twenty-six automobiles made the trip, sponsored by Twin Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce. Chamber officials on their return, announced immediate plans for road improvements between here and Jarbridge.

At an annual loss of \$10,000, they report that 18,000 head of lambs are raised in the Jarbridge country instead of being moved by truck, due to bad roads, and more than 20,000 head of sheep and 8,000 head of cattle are grazed annually in the Jarbridge forest from the 42 ranches between Salmon dam and Jarbridge.

4-H CLUB MEMBERS TAKE LEADER JOBS

BURLEY, May 25—An interesting feature of the 1938 4-H club program in south central Idaho is the large increase in the number of 4-H club members who are taking over leadership of 4-H clubs.

One of the aims of club work is to develop leadership among rural boys and girls. It is highly desirable for those who have had 4-H to pass on to others the benefits they have derived. Even as a farm's productiveness can be maintained only by turning back the soil at least part of what is removed by cropping, so does the 4-H club program tend to maintain or increase permanent effectiveness with an increase in the number of members who turn back in the form of 4-H leadership what they have gained under the leadership of others. Earl R. Stansell, district club agent, announced:

Twenty-two former members have been secured to date as local leaders. Gooding county leads with eight such leaders, Twin Falls county having six—Lincoln six, Cassia four, Jerome four, Minidoka three and Blaine one. DECLINE OF COMETS
There seems to be a sort of cosmic depression, too. Astronomers have noted that there has been a serious shortage of comets in the last few years, particularly of big comets. There used to be fifteen or sixteen comets per century large enough to be seen with the naked eye and get into the historical records. So far in this century there are said to have been only three such comets, and there was nothing to brag of. It is twenty-five years since appearance of the last comet worth looking at. That was Halley's. And it is sadly reduced in size and splendor from its last previous appearance.
It seems as if the celestial visitors are wearing out. This is one of the most interesting things about them. Comets usually have a more or less solid nucleus, but are largely gas and dust—cosmic rubbish picked up somewhere in space. Their fiery tails, which used to be considered permanent parts of them, only appear as they near the sun. The tails are fine dust, blown backward by the sun's light as they approach.
Apparently most of that gas and dust is pushed outward and lost in space, so that the comet's mass keeps shrinking. It is only recently that light has been known to have such power. The "corporeal" theory seems to explain it. Light, if composed of infinitely small particles of matter, can act like a continuous discharge of fine shot from a gun, or like a great wind, blowing away the comet's tail and leaving it finally only its shrunken head.

Flows Cuts Path Through Snowdrifts to East Entrance

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., May 23 — Yellowstone national park's snow-plow reached the east entrance today night with a cold way track through the deep snow at Sylvan Pass, Park Engineer C. A. Lord announced today after a trip to Cody, Wyoming, the east entrance gateway, but motorists will not be permitted to enter via this route until May 27. The warm sunny weather of the past three weeks has caused the snow to melt rapidly and the original date of June 10 set for the opening of this entrance has been advanced two weeks.

A number of aides and soft spots on the highway will be marked with white trucks which will be permitted to use this road until it has had time to sufficiently dry out.

South Route Uncleared

The more flow has already reached to the south gate but there still remains uncleared a section between Moran and the south gate. Because of the new construction on this road a number of places exist where the road is soft and will not permit of travel. Park authorities announce that travel will be permitted through this entrance beginning June 5. It will probably be July 1 before the northeast entrance road from Hot Springs to Cooke's can be opened to permit travel.

The north and west gates are already open and the park travel to date is indicative that the 1938 season will surpass all previous records. Accommodations are now available for early motorists at Old Faithful and Lake Meale alone are obtainable at Mammoth Hot Springs. The general stores and gasoline stations are open at Mammoth, Old Faithful, Lake and Canyon while the large swimming pool at Old Faithful is already open for the season.

Followers of Isaac Walton are lining the park streams and lakes to enjoy the fishing season officially opened.

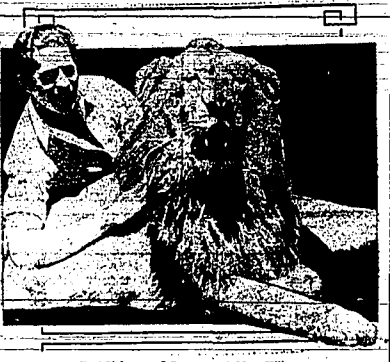

IDAHO'S LARGEST CLASS GRADUATES

Degrees Granted by Moscow Institution Total 5382 This Year

MOSCOW, May 23 — Degrees granted by the University of Idaho will total 5382 after the 430 members of the newly recruited "jungly" breed farewells to the university at its 40th annual commencement, June 8, 1938. The 430 graduates of the 1937-38 had only four members, two men and two women. This year's class will be the largest in Idaho's 44-year history, exceeding by 59 the largest previous class, 404 in 1923. This record-breaking class of 1938 is composed of 352 candidates for bachelor's degrees and 68 for master's degrees.

"When the class of 1938 joins Idaho alumni ranks, the total of living graduates will be just short of the 5000 mark," the difference between this figure and the gross total of 5382 is accounted for by graduates with two degrees, a small proportion of men and a handful of honorary degrees.

First Degrees

Lack of consent upon whom to confer degrees in 1938 did not deter university authorities when the institution was two years old. Records show that the first degrees granted by the university were a pair of honorary LL.D.'s conferred in 1869 upon W. J. McCall, then governor of the state, and R. Z. Johnson, then attorney general.

The first living members of the class of 1938, Idaho's first, have been invited as guests of honor at the alumni banquet which is to be held here at the city club on commencement. Baccalaureate services will be held Sunday, June 7, with Bishop Julius L. Lowe of Pocatello as pastor. Commencement exercises will be held Monday morning, June 8, at Alexander McMillan gym, San Francisco sociologist, will deliver the commencement address.

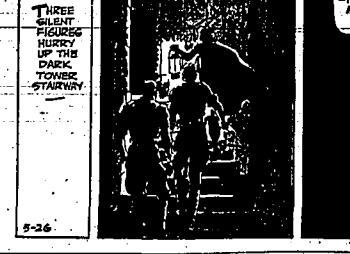
