CHEAP MONEY

Officially there is no more inflation in Alaska than there is any place else in the United States but the colonists who are endeavoring to wrest a living from the frozen ground of the Matan-uska Valley are undergoing just such an experience just the same.

"Any man in the valley with a ton of alfalfa hay may exchange it for sixty dollars. If the hay be timothy it will trade for forty dollars. A sack of grain will buy up to three dollars and a half. Of course the colonists have no hay or grain with which to acquire money but the content of the country of the the government is supplying them with these commodities and charging them up to the buyer at the prices quoted. Whether the debts will ever be liquidat-

The situation sheds light upon the matter of inflation and the way inflation works. Money becomes so cheap that it is almost valueless except as a that it is almost valueless except as a means of paying off indebtedness. With hay at sixty dollars a ton only thirty-five tons would be required to pay off to two thousand dollar mortgage, with a hundred dollars over for legal fees. The man who owned the mortgage could then trade his hay for twenty-one hundred dollars, had the hay rather than the money changed hands, after which he would have twenty-one-hundred-dollars in money which, it standards of value remained unchanged, would probably be swallowed up in living expenses within a period of a few months—And yet there are persons who argue

within a period of a rew months—
And yet there are persons who argue
for infiation. Infiation would supply an
easy way or canteeling the country's
indebtedness, public and private, atter
which a little handful of people would
control all the credit of the country and the rest would have exactly nothing.

"Cheap Money" has fooled men and nations before this, and may again. There is evidence today of something of the sort in the offing for those who are not too blind to see.




