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FORAGE POOR ON FOREST RESERVE

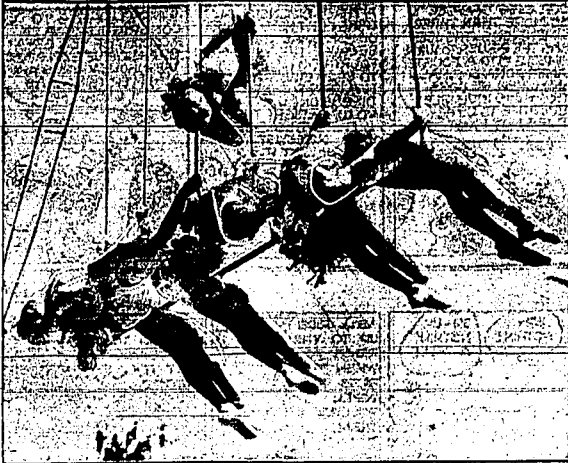
Cattle Turned-Out on Minidoka Range; Drenching Rain Needed

BURLEY, May 28 — Cattle from the Basin and Eba divisions have been turned into the Minidoka forest for grazing. Forage conditions are reported to be much poorer this spring than in years ago and the only salvation is said to be a drenching rain.

Settlers adjacent to the Raft river division are becoming apprehensive for the summer as the ground has dried rapidly in the last ten days with water supply meager and little or no chance of an increase as a result of melting snows in the higher ranges.

Sheepmen on the Snake river desert have been hauling water on trucks—for the past three weeks, to supply their herds. Lambs which ordinarily would be marketed early are fast becoming of the woody type due to short, tough grass and can only get back to normal by getting on to good succulent forage soon. This year's lambs will reach the market only a short time before the spring range lamb, with no doubt, will reflect in price reduction.

Union Pacific's President Sees Bright Outlook

OMAHA, Neb., May 28 (AP)—Carl B. Gray, Union Pacific president of the Union Pacific System, said in a talk here last evening that in Union Pacific territory, conditions present "an encouraging picture."

"I feel we will have a satisfactory year, regardless of the election," he said. "I don't expect anything spectacular, but in my judgment, better than the same month last year."

He pointed out recent rains have aided greatly Nebraska wheat and corn crops. The Great Western Sugar company, he said, has contracted for 120,000 acres of sugar beets, as against 95,000 last year.

"The nature situation in Wyoming is better than for a long time, and the animal population is increasing. In states like Idaho and Montana, where crops depend almost entirely upon stored water, the situation is the best ever known," asserted Mr. Gray.

"Sample credit is available for mercantile enterprises," he added. "The banks are full of money. If we could only move money by freight, we would have a shortage of cars."

IDAHO CROPS ESCAPE DAMAGE FROM FROSTS

BOISE, Idaho, May 27 (AP)—Idaho crops escaped damage from scattered frosts during the week ended last night. H. G. Carter, federal weather bureau meteorologist, reported today.

Northern Idaho experienced lower temperatures than normal but crops continued to make good advance; fruits were in fair condition. Planting of all crops was well advanced.

Frost and freezing temperature struck southern Idaho where rain is needed. Planting is nearly completed, with fall wheat and beans making a good showing.

Southwestern Idaho temperatures were too low for best crop growth. However, most crops were "looking good." Apple and prune yields were reported less promising than earlier.

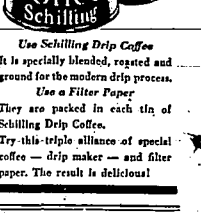
LEAFHOPPERS MOVING ON CULTIVATED AREAS
